Needed in PCs: Less Noise

PERSONAL COMPUTERS CONTINUE to improve at a breakneck pace. Clock speeds are pushing 500 MHz. Prices for well-configured systems are breaking the \$1000 barrier. And specifications for future machines promise continued blazing progress. For a comprehensive survey of the PC's bright future, read Michael Desmond's "Your PC in the New Millennium" on page 104.

Already we can glimpse the future in the new crop of sub-\$1000 LCD monitors for desktop PCs, and a wider selection of flat displays is on the horizon. Candescent Technologies is building a factory in San Jose to make what it calls ThinCRTs—8mm-thick displays with separate microscopic electron guns for every pixel.

Reflective semiconductors may also figure in future monitors. These technological marvels make pixels by bouncing light off microscopic mirrors on the surface of silicon chips. The leader is Texas Instruments with its digital micromirror device, already common in presentation projectors. Other contenders include Silicon Light Machines with its grating light valve technology, and Colorado Microdisplay with its DNLCOS (dynamic nematic liquid crystal on silicon). Whichever technology wins, the triumph of flat displays seems assured. The elegance of their design will call for other changes.

FLAT SCREENS WANT FLAT SPEAKERS

PUT BESIDE FLAT DISPLAYS, today's fat speakers look like guests at the wrong party. Affordable flat speakers are beginning to appear; the most intriguing employ NXT technology from New Transducers in the United Kingdom. The radical design features flat panels ranging from 3mm to 25mm thick that vibrate randomly rather than moving like pistons. They require no enclosures. Other possibilities for flat speakers include cost-reduced versions of older technologies such as ribbons and planar magnetics. PC speakers using NXT flat panels are already available from several companies, including NEC, Gallant Computer, Kodex, and Benwin. Harman International is a major American licensee of NXT technology. Planar magnetic speakers are available from Monsoon Audio Systems. May the best sound win!



A five-fan PC has no more chance of landing in a family room than a B-29 bomber—and is almost as noisy.

But neither the look nor the sound of speakers will matter if the PC itself drowns them out. When trying out new flat speakers on a system at home, I could draw few conclusions because of noise from the PC's two fans. Despite the obvious problem, noise draws little mention in Intel's and Microsoft's specs for future PCs. Intel's "Anywhere in the Home" literature says nothing about noise, and Microsoft's OnNow specification focuses on quieting the PC while it sleeps. The mundane problem of minimizing fan noise is clearly a low priority for industry leaders. Do they think information appliances must sound like dishwashers or refrigerators?

Regardless, fan noise is more than a nuisance. It interferes with any activity requiring close attention to sound. This limits the uses of the future PC in both home and business. Watching DVDs and listening to music require clear sound. So will the use of Internet telephones and videoconferencing systems. The industry would do well to heed the admonition given in *Peter Pan*: "A little less noise there!"

LIKE A B-29-OR WORSE

THE OPPOSITE SEEMS to be happening. Since microprocessors get hotter as clock speeds rise, PCs inevitably require more cooling, not less. One new Katmai-equipped PC will have four fans, matching the number of propellers on an old B-29 bomber.

The fans, noise and all, don't keep me from wanting the Katmai system. I might even add a graphics card that carries yet another fan. But fan noise would limit the system's use. The noise level would be acceptable only underneath the laser blasts, engine roars, and crowd noise of computer games. The five-fanner would be too loud beside an office desk, and it would have

no more chance of landing in a family room than a B-29.

Most of us can't do much about PC noise. Few will sacrifice speed for silence, or surround our systems with acoustic baffles in decorator colors. The do-it-yourselfer has not yet been born who will move the PC's fans outdoors and run an air duct inside the building to the machine. Products like the HushKit from Silent Systems can help, but not many users will personally replace power supplies. The noise cancellation technologies used in special headphones on airplanes may hint at a solution.

One thing is coming through loud and clear. If the vaunted technical geniuses of the computer industry can't solve the noise problem, the barrier to wider use of the PC may be measured not in megahertz, megabytes, or dollars, but in decibels.

I hear this argument with increasing frequency: If a company charges money for buggy crashware that cannot do what it's supposed to do with reasonable reliability, who is stealing from whom?

Every "End User License Agreement" I've seen declares that the vendor is unconditionally excused from any and all responsibility for the quality of its software. Unless users can get better assurance that the higher price of legitimate software buys real, functional value, the pirates will flourish. Yes, strictly speaking, what they're doing is illegal. So was dumping all that tea into Boston Harbor.

PC RELIABILITY AND SERVICE

THE USER SURVEY for your November cover story on PC reliability and service could have told the world some very useful things and addressed some serious industry problems. Unfortunately, the star system it used to analyze the data is simplistic to the point of being seriously misleading, since the number of stars means something very different in each category. Though you give no information on the number of responses in each statistical cell, nor a margin of error based on that sample size, my statistical intuition suggests that in many categories the differences between the ratings are not statistically meaningful.

I am also left to puzzle over the result that, for example, in the five-star category for home computers, just under 40 percent of the


PCs had at least one problem requiring repair, yet in the worst (two-star) category there were less than 3 percent problems per year, leading to the absurd conclusion that the average PC in your survey was about 11 years old. Such discrepancies needed to be addressed, but unfortunately were not.

The saving grace of the article is that none of the systems received an overall five-star rating. The article emphasizes the seriousness of the reliability and service problems, but the cover headline unfortunately suggests that you've uncovered at least one manufacturer that sells a "problem-free" system. Alas, even Diogenes, masquerading as *PC World*, cannot find one.

However, for the Photoshop and Quake tests, the performance of the 233-MHz iMac with 64MB of RAM looks similar to that of the 333-MHz Celeron machine with 64MB of RAM. The big difference sur-

faces with Word and Excel. I once compared these programs on identically speed-rated Mac and Windows machines. For many repetitive tasks, performance was equal down to the second. But for other tasks, the Mac was much slower. My conclusion: Anyone who thinks Microsoft would let its Mac versions run as fast as its Windows products probably believes in the tooth fairy.

ratings to point out differences that we think will be significant to PC buyers. When analyzing the raw data, we took into account sample size, statistical correlations, and other standard research tools to come up with ratings that are both valid and meaningful to readers. We chose not to publish all supporting raw data simply because of its sheer volume.

Your confusion about the results for the "Percent of PCs with problems" and "Problems per year" scores is due to our error. The "Problems per year" score is based on a straight number of problems per year, not a percentage, as published. For example, five stars in the Work PCs category was awarded to those companies whose PCs had less than one problem per year on average, as reported by survey respondents.

KEYBOARD CLEANING: STAY ON THE WAGON

DAVID CHARLAP [*Letters*, December] is incorrect in saying that computer keyboards should be cleaned with alcohol rather than with water. After 30 years of maintaining electronic equipment, I can tell you that if you spill coffee or soda on your keyboard, warm water is the only thing to use. If you clean it with alcohol, you'll be left with a sticky, gummy mess. If your keyboard contains ferrous metals, you should scrap it and get a good one. 





Will a Y2K Bug Blow Up in Your Face?

Finding out whether your system can repel the millennium bug may be harder than you think.



AS THE CLOCK TICKED ever closer to 2000, Jim Reid, a document control supervisor from Florida, had a simple question: Would his two-year-old NEC Ready computer fall victim to the millennium bug? First he checked NEC's Web site but found no mention of his specific PC. Then he sent an e-mail to the company's technical support department and received a terse and rather distressing response: "We do not have a BIOS that will make your computer Y2K compliant. We regret any inconvenience this may cause."

That's when Reid panicked. "Do I throw my machine in the garbage on January 1?" he asked. As it turns out, his situation is less

dire than NEC's first message implied. His model PC hasn't been tested for Y2K compliance, so NEC has yet to decide on a fix. (The technician who answered his first query evidently wasn't aware of this.) In the worst case, he'll have to manually reset the computer's internal date on January 1, 2000. He won't, as he once worried, have to toss out his \$3000 PC.

Reid's uncertainty about his computer illustrates the Y2K problem's potential to strike fear in the hearts of computer users everywhere. With all the press surrounding the issue and the countless gloom-and-doom predictions of an end to life—computing and otherwise—as we know it, tensions are running high.

Some panic is inevitable, given the scope of the problem. But solid information, plus a commitment by vendors to help customers through the maze of compatibility issues, can go a long way toward stabilizing this volatile issue.

INFORMATION WANTED

NOT SURPRISINGLY, consumers want to get their computing houses in order. Though the "easy solution"—as one industry executive told me—is to buy a new PC and upgrade your software, that fix is not a practical or affordable answer for most of us. The next-best alternative is to figure out whether each product you use is Y2K compliant. (For tips on how to do this, see last month's "2000: The Year of Living Dangerously," www.pcworld.com/jan99/y2ktips.) This is where hardware and software companies come in. Sure, you can buy a software tool to test your system's exposure to the millennium bug. But shouldn't you be able to get that data from the companies whose products you're using?

Many companies supply updates about their products' Y2K-compliance status on their Web sites. Most major PC companies explain the problem clearly and provide an exhaustive listing of their systems, stating whether each model is compliant and identifying the available fixes. Dell, Compaq, and Packard Bell have especially informative and easy-to-follow online resources. On the software side, Microsoft, Lotus, and Corel offer similar product information. But many other companies haven't addressed Y2K compliance publicly, heightening customers' concerns (some call it hysteria).

To encourage all companies to share Y2K-compliance information with their customers as soon as it becomes available, President Clinton signed the Year 2000 Readiness and



CONSUMER WATCH

Disclosure Act last fall. Under the new law, any businesses that post Y2K-related information between July 14, 1998, and July 14, 2001, that later proves to be inaccurate cannot be held liable for their error, provided that the misinformation was unintentional.

Such protection seems reasonable. But critics of the new law are justifiably worried that companies will hide behind some vague statement about year 2000 compliance in the event that consumers sue for having received inaccurate or misleading information. (Of the hardware and software company Web sites I visited, Corel's was the only one that specifically cited the new law.)

SHOULD VENDORS OFFER FIXES?

SHARING COMPLIANCE information with consumers is a crucial first step. But it's not enough for a company to say that a product will not function properly in 2000. The vendor must also tell customers what it plans to do about the problem. Will it offer an upgrade? Are there work-arounds for products that won't be made Y2K compliant? At a minimum, a company that doesn't have a fix should inform customers about the status of its investigation. Consumers need this information to make decisions about when and how to prepare themselves for D Day.

Here's where several companies have run into problems. At this writing, nearly a dozen lawsuits have been filed against hardware and software companies, including Intuit, Micron, Quarterdeck, and Quarterdeck's new parent company, Symantec. The facts in each case differ, but the issues they raise can be boiled down to three questions: Should a software developer or PC maker be obligated to tell its customers if its products are not Y2K compliant? If so, should the company be forced to fix any millennium bugs before the ball drops? And perhaps the knottiest of all, who should pay for these upgrades?

Many companies are scrambling to test products for Y2K compatibility. Others

have yet to decide what type of fix—if any—to make available. One of the best ways to keep up with the latest developments is to visit www.year2000.com, which supplies links to year 2000 information on dozens of company Web sites.

Perhaps the knottiest question of all is the one with the price tag attached: Who should pay for these upgrades?

NO FREE UPGRADE?

SOME INDUSTRY leaders believe consumers should pay to upgrade their systems and software. But hardware and software companies shouldn't use the millennium bug to force a global upgrade on consumers. From where I sit—at an early-model Pen-

tium running software that's two generations old but works just fine, thank you—paying for an upgrade is an unreasonable solution. Why should consumers have to buy new products because of flaws that the manufacturer may well have known about when it released the product?

Corporate responsibility, however, only goes so far. Anyone still using DOS applications—or even Windows 3.1 products—can't realistically expect to be bailed out. Hardware and software companies are too busy fixing newer releases to correct problems in versions of operating systems no one sells any more. But how far back should they go? One year? Two years? Five? The courts haven't spoken yet, but don't hold your breath waiting for companies to fix old software.

Ultimately, companies must share information and, when reasonable, provide their customers with practical fixes. Should those fixes be free? Yes, if possible—particularly in the case of products released after companies had become aware of the Y2K time bomb. At the very least, consumers should be able to get guidance on when and how to correct their system and software.

Anything less is bad business.



Extended Warranties: Worth the Cost?

SHOULD YOU BUY an extended warranty for your PC? James Dodez of Middletown, Rhode Island, doesn't think so. Dodez got a brochure for a General Electric extended warranty when he got his CyberMax PC, but he wasn't happy with the service he bought. He laments, "GE promises

fast, convenient computer service, but dealing with GE isn't convenient and their idea of fast is measured in months." Chip Keeling of GE responds that if a technician comes on-site but can't fix the PC, average repair time is five days. He also says the technician will attempt some troubleshooting on-site.

While warranty terms vary, an extension often buys less than you might expect. At Quantex, for example, extended-warranty techs work for Philips Magnavox. Under the standard three-year warranty, a Quantex tech will troubleshoot problems on the phone and suggest replacement parts. With the extension, a Philips tech will install the part on-site; if the fix doesn't work, you're back to the phones.


Dell, on the other hand, provides its own extended service and trains its on-site

techs. There's no third party involved.

In any case, an extension shouldn't be your first choice when buying a new PC. Instead, buy a system with a three-year original warranty (a common option) that includes one year of on-site service. After that year, if you're scared to do your own repairs—and if you plan to keep the computer for another few years—buy yourself additional on-site service with an extended warranty.

If you purchase your PC with a credit card, check to see if the issuing bank will double the manufacturer's guarantee for no charge.

Regardless of your choice, however, consider whether your money would be best spent on a system that has better expected reliability (see our November 1998 report, "PC Reliability and Service: Who Can You Trust?" www.pcworld.com/nov98/service).



Heads Up...



ONE READER LUCKY enough to have @Home's cable modem service was told during his first tech support call that he'd have to pay \$35 for his next. True, says an @Home rep, but the first call is free and the next costs only if the caller caused a problem that requires support to reinstall service... I got a couple of letters alleging false advertising by PC maker **Unicent Technologies**. The company's Web site (www.unicent.com) claimed tech support hours of 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. EST, but support is actually open only until 8 p.m. A Unicent spokesperson explains that hours changed on October 1. The Web site is now fixed... According to the U.S. Bankruptcy Court, **JTS Corporation**, a hard drive maker in San Jose, California, has filed for involuntary Chapter 7. Unfortunately, I was unable to locate a trustee for the case. Stay tuned for further details... **Storm Technology**, makers of popular scanners, recently filed voluntary Chapter 7. Jerome Robertson, bankruptcy trustee, says that "the likelihood [that another firm will honor Storm's rebate or provide warranty repair service] is zero." Though customers can file claims at the bankruptcy court in San Jose, Robertson states that due to ongoing litigation it may be two to three years before claimants see any results—if they ever do.

I'D APPRECIATE ANY help you can give me in my effort to get Toshiba to live up to its warranty obligation. My problems started in June 1998 with the disk drive in my Toshiba laptop and desk station. Since then, I've hauled it to a Toshiba repair center and shipped it twice to a repair facility with no luck. I've asked Toshiba for a replacement, but haven't gotten it.


PC World responds: I contacted Toshiba on Brown's behalf and asked the company to replace the part or the notebook, as the warranty recommends. A spokesperson told me Toshiba would indeed replace Brown's laptop. In fact, the company went one step further and replaced it with an upgraded model.

A Tecra 730 was sent to replace Brown's Tecra 720; unfortunately, the new unit Brown received had a broken CD-ROM drive, which Toshiba says it will fix. ■

Home Networking Without the Network

PROBLEM You want to share files between two PCs without the expense and hassle of a full-blown LAN.

SOLUTION Make a simple, efficient connection by using low-cost cables and a Windows utility.



THE NUMBERS SPEAK FOR THEMSELVES: More than 15 million households have at least two computers, not counting the millions of company laptops used at home for after-hours work. So it's no surprise that companies such as Diamond Multimedia, Net-Gear, and Intelogis are introducing networking kits aimed at home users. But these kits aren't cheap—a two-PC setup can cost \$200 to \$300—and they're overkill for people with modest needs.

Take Dale Johnson, for example. Johnson, who videotapes weddings and other social events for a living, uses two Compaq Presario

desktops for his home-based business. He wanted to link the two PCs so he could store mirror images of vital data on both hard drives.

"I didn't look very hard at a network because I didn't know much about it, and I knew it meant adding another card to my machine," says Johnson. He found an alternative in Direct Cable Connect, an applet included in Windows 95 and 98. DCC lets a PC access another system's disk drive over a serial or parallel cable, creating a dirt-cheap (albeit slow) mini-network.

MAKE THE CONNECTION

THE ONLY HARDWARE you need to support DCC is a \$10 serial or \$30 parallel file-transfer cable to connect two systems. After establishing the link, you can use the PC you're working at to access the other system's drives through Windows Explorer or within apps. Besides its usefulness for quick-and-dirty networking, this capability is a lifesaver for installing software onto a laptop that lacks a CD-ROM drive—just connect the notebook to a PC that has such a drive.

Once set up, DCC is simple to use, but configuring it requires several steps. In many cases, you'll need to install DCC from the Windows 95 or 98 setup disc. Put the Windows CD-ROM into the CD-ROM drive, and click *Start•Settings•Control Panel*. Double-click the *Add/Remove Programs* icon, and click the *Windows Setup* tab in the dialog box. In the scrolling list, click the *Communications* item and then click the *Details* button. Click the check box next to *Direct Cable Connect* to select this option. Click *OK* to start the installation. Repeat this procedure for each PC you wish to connect.

To make data available to other PCs, you must tell Windows to share drives with other machines. The PC whose drives you want to share is the *host*; the one accessing them is the *guest*. On the host PC, right-click the *Network Neighborhood* icon on the Desktop and select *Properties*. On the Configuration sheet, click *File and Print Sharing*; then, in the resulting dialog box, check *I want to be able to give others access to my files*.

Now tell the host system which drives you want to make available to the guest. On the host PC, right-click each drive icon in Explorer or My Computer and click the *Sharing* menu item. In the Sharing sheet of the drive's Properties dialog box, click the *Shared As* button and enter a name for the drive in the Share Name box. Repeat this set of steps for every drive you want the guest system to access. ▶

GOT A PROBLEM?

Next, connect the PCs. Although serial cables are cheaper, a fast parallel cable works much better for installing software or moving large files over the wire. Just make sure you use a bidirectional parallel cable—older ones may not work.

Finally, launch DCC on both PCs (from the Start menu's *Programs•Accessories•Communications* folder), and identify the host and guest machines. Once the connection is made, launch Windows Explorer on the guest PC and choose *Tools•Map Network Drive*. Use the drop-down Path list to select a drive on the host machine. Repeat the process to map other drives. From then on, just connect the PCs and launch DCC. The host's shared drives will appear as local drives on the guest PC, and they can be used with Windows Explorer and other file-management tools.

DCC won't win any awards for speed: A 2MB file can take about 30 seconds to copy over a parallel cable, while a serial transfer may take nearly three times as long. "I'll click and drag to have the program start transferring, and I'll go and do something else," says Johnson, who moves about 120MB of data across a parallel cable once a week. "The time is not that big a concern to me."

NO LAN PANACEA

DALE JOHNSON'S work-around isn't for everyone. The more often you need PC-to-PC connectivity, the more you'll benefit from the speed of a real network. If your systems have free slots, you can set up a two-PC Ethernet LAN for less than \$100, though configuring it can be tricky. And unlike a full-fledged LAN, Direct Cable Connection doesn't provide a practical way to share a printer between two PCs. (Johnson manages the task of sharing one ink jet printer between his two systems by using a cable-switch box setup.)

Still, Johnson likes his setup. "It's a bit of a spider web to have all those cables set up," he says. "But it's very functional and easy to use. You don't have to crawl under the table to switch the cable around."



I Declare War on Telemarketers

"HI, THIS IS Stan. How are you today?" Oh, jeez, another intrusive telemarketer calling, shattering a brilliant thought. (Now where was I?)

"I'm terrific," I responded. "Can you hold a sec?" With a home phone and two business lines, I'm inundated with these calls. But this time, instead of following my usual modus operandi—saying something obscene in COBOL and hanging up—I turned to my PC and loaded Enigma. This slick program helps me thwart telemarketers and keep them from calling back. Best of all, it's free.

"What's the name of the company you're calling for?" I asked, reading from the monitor (and ignoring the mangled prose).

"San Gabriel Register," he said cheerfully. (Yep, I made up that name to protect the obnoxious telemarketer and keep me out of court.)

"Cool," I said supportively. "Could you please tell me your full name, Stan?"

Pause.

"Don't be shy," I prompted, a grin on my face. This was going to be fun.

"Did you know," I added, "the Federal Trade Commission says that a person or entity making a telephone solicitation must provide the full name..."

"Stan Schmendrick," he interrupted.

"Thanks, Stan," I said. "You realize that telemarketers have to keep and maintain a 'Do not call' list? And they can't call again for ten years?"

I stifled a giggle. See, just hanging up on the guy would get me nowhere. But

with Enigma on my PC, I felt like the Telemarketer Terminator. The program prompts me with eight precise questions based on the Telephone Consumer Protection Act, along with the text of the law. I ask each question, wait for the telemarketer to squirm, fill in the response, and keep a log. Simple. And I swear, it works.

"Can you wait a minute?" asked Stan, sounding like he'd swallowed his toothpick. I heard his headset hit the desk.

It gets better. If the company calls again within 12 months, you can sue for up to \$500 per violation. Nice. They must have a "don't call" written policy (no? the fine could be a whopping \$10,000), and then the FTC may hit them for another somewhat paltry \$500 if they don't send you a copy. Fun, huh?

Stan's supervisor came on the line. She took my number and promised not to call again (for ten years, pal).

THIS CALL'S FOR YOU

I HAD SUCH a good time tormenting Stan that I decided to get Caller ID and screen all my calls. (Don't worry, Mom, your tech support calls will still get through.)

Instead of buying a cheapie Caller ID gizmo, I splurged on Nortel's Meridian 9617, a two-line phone that connects directly to my PC's underused USB port. At \$330, the Meridian isn't cheap, but its features make the price tag easier to swallow.

With Caller ID, the Meridian pops information about each incoming call onto my PC screen. Most local

telemarketers don't block Caller ID, so once I have their numbers, I tell the phone to reject their calls. I've also set the Meridian to play different .wav files on my PC based on the caller's ID, so I can tell when my editor's calling by the sound—for example, the braying of a mule.

I can seamlessly conference two callers using the Nortel PC software or tell the phone to page me when I'm out of the office. Easily the coolest function is Meridian's Voice Dialer. It lets me place a call by saying the person's name; using voice recognition software, the machine identifies the person and then dials the number. Best of all, the Meridian works even if my PC's powered down.

Hey, I've got to go, the phone's ringing. I hope it's Stan—I could use the money.

McAfee Utilities Just Don't Get Along

MCAFFEE SOFTWARE'S McAfee Office suite is a tempting buy. For \$100 you get a grab bag of ten separate, free-standing utilities—including VirusScan, Nuts & Bolts 98, and Guard Dog—that would cost hundreds of dollars if purchased separately. McAfee Software's parent company, Network Associates, acquired almost all these products when it recently bought up competitors CyberMedia, Helix Software, and PGP (Pretty Good Privacy), and the company's unfamiliarity with its stepchildren shows. *Bugs and Fixes* readers report problems just getting the suite installed.

McAfee Software recommends installing one product at a time. But even then, a conflict can bite you. Guard Dog's File Guardian feature may lock up your system when you try to use Nuts & Bolts 98's DiskMinder, DiskTune, or Image tools. At press time, the 20KB fix for the Guard Dog lockup was tucked away in the company's Web-based discussion forums at support.nai.com/Forums/Attachment.cfm/GDFSHK.VXD?CFApp=23&Attachment_ID=71. McAfee Software suggests that you download the file and then copy it into your Guard Dog folder. (If you use Oil Change, it will put the file in the folder automatically.) When I downloaded the fix using Internet Explorer, however, the resulting file lost its .vxd extension—and the patch won't work without it. You may have to rename the file and add the missing file name extension back on. By the time you read this,

Is QuickTime Flakiness Apple's Fault?

IN THE COURSE of the U.S. government's antitrust case against Microsoft, Apple Senior Vice President Avadis Tevanian testified that Microsoft specifically sabotaged Apple's QuickTime software, preventing it from playing certain types of multimedia files embedded in Web pages. Not so, says Microsoft. It hired independent software testing labs Mindcraft and Sax Software to get to the bottom of the conflicts with Internet Explorer. Both confirm that the problem lies with errors in Apple's own QuickTime installation program. Mindcraft's online white paper (www.mindcraft.com/qtfix) explains it all and offers several different patches that vanquish the problem. As we went to press, Apple's QuickTime Web site had not yet supplied any update for dealing with the glitch.

you may also be able to obtain the update by using the Oil Change utility that comes with McAfee Office.

Another headache with Nuts & Bolts 98: The Registry Wizard's Tune Up option has various problems that can corrupt Windows 98's Registry in some situations. McAfee Software posted an Instant Update fix last November but withdrew it when the new code caused the same problem elsewhere in the Registry. As we went to press, the company said it planned to release a corrected fix shortly. To download and install Nuts & Bolts 98 Instant Updates, choose *Start>Programs>Nuts&Bolts 98>Instant Updates*.

THE SIEGE OF INTERNET EXPLORER 4

WHEN WE LAST left our browser insecurity drama (in last month's column), Microsoft had just patched Internet Explorer 4.01 to close a nasty security hole named after researcher Juan Carlos Garcia Cuartango. This flaw allowed Web page scripts to copy files from a user's hard disk to a remote system. Cuartango subsequently found another way to exploit the same flaw—a feat now renowned everywhere (except at Microsoft) as "Son of Cuartango." The problem affects IE 4.01 and 4.01 with Service Pack 1 under Windows 95, 98, and NT 4.0. Umax Scanner Driver: Death to Disks

BUGS AND FIXES reader Steven Paglierani is more than just miffed at scanner maker Umax. While building himself a new cutting-edge system, Paglierani kept encountering file-corruption errors that prevented him from running—or even installing—Windows on his new system. After months of troubleshooting and replacing memory, hard disks, and hard disk cables, he stumbled across a Microsoft Knowledgebase article (support.microsoft.com/support/kb/articles/q191/8/74.asp) that explained everything: One of Umax's scanner drivers randomly corrupts the hard disk's file allocation table. The problem occurs only with 300-MHz or faster Pentium II CPUs. Umax has posted a patch for the problem on its Web site. Point your browser to www.umax.com/graphsite/umaxen/support/download/scanners.cfm and refer to TechNote 7076. (You have to register first at support.microsoft.com to view the knowledge base.)

No compromise. Who says a great PC has to cost \$2000? Fast, full-featured systems based on Intel's new **Celeron-366** and **AMD's K6-2-400** could make you forget the Pentium II. ♦ **By Laurianne McLaughlin**

IF YOU CONSIDER \$999 desktop PCs too light on features and \$2000 PCs too heavy on price, you'll like the new alternatives. Machines based on economical chips from Intel and AMD provide an excellent balance of speed and features, at a price that's right on the mark—about \$1499 including a monitor.

FAST AND CHEAP

THE BEST CELERON-366 and K6-2-400 systems we tested for this review zipped through business productivity programs, in some cases running applications like Word and Excel faster than a Pentium II-350 system. Do you work (or play) with demanding graphics applications and games from time to time? No problem. Several of the new sys-

tems are strong graphics performers. (Note that graphics performance depends heavily on a system's graphics chip.)

Not only are these budget-friendly PCs great performers, they're feature rich. All five systems we tested came with 64MB of RAM, and only one had a hard drive smaller than 10GB. The most impressively loaded, CyberMax's Enthusiast KII 400, includes a DVD-ROM drive, a graphics card with 16MB of SDRAM, and a 19-inch monitor—all for an eye-popping \$1499 (see "CyberMax's Feature-Packed Enthusiast: Best of a Good Lot").

BUDGET GETS BRAWNY

HOW DID BUDGET PCs turn into such racehorses? For one thing, Intel's rivals, especially AMD, are keeping the CPU business as competitive as

ever. Meanwhile, Intel has been trying to build a strong reputation for its budget-oriented Celeron chips.

Moreover, Intel has learned that making Celeron chips too much slower than Pentium IIs is risky business: Reviewers panned the first Celeron, the cacheless 266, because it performed poorly. The Celeron-333, which tacked 128KB of secondary cache onto the chip, ran much faster. Now, Intel is trying to further improve Celeron's image by rapidly cranking up the line's speed. By the time you read this, some vendors will be shipping computers based on the 400-MHz Celeron, a product Intel had originally planned to ship much later in the year. (The chip was not avail- ▶



Free Software Suites

STAROFFICE 5.0 Personal Edition, the modest but capable office suite from Star Division, is available free to consumers via the Web at www.stardivision.com. (The offer doesn't apply to corporate users.) The suite can't match powerhouses like Microsoft Office feature for feature, but it's comparable to lesser products like Microsoft Works or Claris Works. It runs under Windows 95, 98, and NT; OS/2; Linux; and Solaris. The Windows version is a 62MB download. Likewise, Corel plans to offer its WordPerfect Suite 8 for Linux as a free download beginning on January 17. Visioneer Still Alive

Visioneer bought Xerox's ScanSoft subsidiary and will sell and support ScanSoft's Pagis document management and optical character recognition products as well as PaperPort software, under the ScanSoft name.

Rise Technology's MP6: Newest Chip on the Block

TALK ABOUT LOOKING your competition in the eye: Rise Technology, the newest CPU maker, has set up shop in Santa Clara, California, right across the street from Intel. This new company is jumping into a tough game—building low-cost CPUs for budget desktops and notebooks and selling them at

prices below Intel's. The first Rise CPU, the MP6, will appear in desktops by the end of the first quarter, the company says. For this article, Rise gave *PC World* an early peek at a reference system powered by the MP6. Rise faces four established players: AMD, Centaur, Cyrix, and Intel. AMD has made progress

recently, thanks to a generation of chips for desktop PCs that run as fast as 400 MHz.

LOW-END COMPETITION

CYRIX AND CENTAUR currently compete with Intel's low-end chips. That's where Rise hopes to fit in—by beating Cyrix's and Centaur's chips on performance. Rise says it has paid particular design attention to how quickly the MP6 chip executes MMX instructions

and how smoothly it handles soft DVD video playback. Those results remain to be seen; the MP6-powered PC we tested wasn't ready for a full round of graphics testing. The MP6 chip will debut in two flavors: One will have a 266-MHz performance rating and will be designed for a 100-MHz system bus; the other will have a 233-MHz performance rating and will be designed for a 95-MHz system bus. (A performance rating, also

able for testing at press time.) As a result of these changes, the once-lowly Celeron now packs enough punch to please even a power user.

CELERON VS. PII

FIRST CONSIDER the Celeron's performance. Two of the three shipping Celeron-366

machines we tested, the Hewlett-Packard Vectra VE Series 8 and the Micron Millennium C366, recorded PC WorldBench 98 scores of 188 and 186, respectively, on business apps (see the test report below). In comparison, the Pentium II-350 machines with 64MB of RAM that we've test-

ed earned scores between 178 and 188—almost identical to, if not a bit slower than, the numbers posted by Celeron-366 computers. And the average PII-400 machine snagged a score of 198, only about 5 percent faster than the HP Celeron-366 machine. It's unlikely you'll notice that


small a difference in apps like Word or Excel. The fastest PII-400 system with 64MB of RAM we've tested scored 203, an unexciting 8 percent faster than the HP system.

Now compare the prices: While the new budget PCs we reviewed range from \$1399 to \$1568, you'd have to pay at least \$1599 for many Pentium II-350-based PCs and at least \$1699 for many PII-400 systems. (Some high-end PII-350s and PII-400s sell for closer to \$2000.) You'd pay at least \$2200 for most PII-450 systems, but such machines are significantly faster (an average of about 13 percent) than the best Celerons.

For some people, a Pentium II-based computer offers advantages that go beyond clock speed. PII-350, -400, and -450 PCs incorporate a 100-MHz system bus, whereas the Celeron-366 and -400 system bus runs at 66 MHz. The faster bus speeds up some tasks, particularly those that involve large graphics or database files that don't

known as a "PR rating," represents the performance level of the Intel chip against which the MP6 will compete—in this case, the competition is the Celeron-266.)

Like the original Celeron-266 processor (and unlike the Celeron-333 and -366) the MP6 chip lacks on-board secondary cache. This design hurts performance.

MORE SPEED AHEAD

THE MP6 266-MHZ reference machine we tested came with 64MB of system RAM and 1024-

KB of secondary cache on the motherboard. It earned a PC WorldBench 98 score of 119, on par with scores turned in by Celeron-266 and AMD K6-266 systems on productivity apps.

If Rise Technology achieves its goal of delivering better graphics performance than Cyrix and Centaur, however, MP6-powered machines will be more competitive. But even then, MP6 systems would probably have to be ultra-cheap (certainly well below \$999) to be worth considering. Analyst

Nathan Brookwood of Insight 64, a consultancy in Saratoga, California, says we'll likely see the first chip only in systems from small, third-tier PC companies.

Rise's second planned chip, the MP6-II, looks more compelling, since it incorporates secondary cache. The first systems using this chip will ship in the second quarter of this year, Rise says. Though the company wouldn't confirm the speeds of this chip, it is expected to offer 333- and 366-MHz performance ratings. Stay tuned.

fit inside the secondary cache. So for work like intensive desktop publishing or database mining, a fast Pentium II-powered system is worth the extra cost.

Also, systems with a 100-MHz bus make it easier to upgrade the CPU later. And

users with demanding graphics needs, for whom every second counts, will probably want a PII-450 machine. Outfitted with good graphics cards, PII-450 machines run applications like Macromedia Director (a multimedia authoring tool) and games like Redline

Racer faster than machines powered by a Celeron-366 or K6-2-400 processor can.

SMART CONFIGS

BUT FOR MANY people, the new Pentium II alternatives from Intel and AMD offer plenty of speed. You'll see the


Celeron-366 in systems designed for corporations, small businesses, and homes.

At just \$1434 with a 17-inch monitor, the HP Vectra VE Series 8 is a smart midrange corporate system for running Microsoft Office-type applications. Like other Vectra VEs, it has a 3Com 10/100 network card; HP's manageability software, which lets IS managers detect hardware problems early; and theft-prevention features like a lockable case. It's not suited for image-editing work, but its integrated Matrox MGA G-100 AGP graphics chip with 4MB of SGRAM works fine for apps like PowerPoint. Our only quibble: HP's 4.3GB hard drive is the smallest of the bunch.

goodies like a V.90 modem and an integrated NVidia RIVA 128 ZX graphics chip (with 8MB of SGRAM) on the motherboard. The extra memory helped this machine play 3D games more smoothly than the other two Celerons did, and to run one game, Redline Racer, faster than some PII-400s (see "Micron and CyberMax Provide Solid Graphics for Under \$1500"). But remember, graphics speed often boils down to the graphics chip, not the CPU.

Compaq's Prosignia Desktop Model 310, part of a new line aimed at small businesses, costs the least of the five systems we reviewed—just \$1399 with a 17-inch monitor. Like the Micron, it carries a V.90 56-kilobits-per-second modem. The Prosignia 310 also has a Diamond Viper V330 graphics card armed with 4MB of SGRAM.

K6-2-400s: BRING 'EM ON

NOW ON TO THAT healthy competition from AMD. Based on our first look, AMD's K6-2-400 systems

hold their own against Celeron-366 machines and slow Pentium II-400s. Like previous K6-2 chips, the K6-2-400 includes AMD's 3DNow CPU instructions, designed to speed up applications specially enhanced for 3DNow or DirectX 6.0. Today, less than

These systems are **solid**, reasonably priced, and **don't skimp on features**—a good choice for **work or home**.

20 applications have native support for 3DNow, and most of these are games.

Of the two K6-2-400 systems we tested—the CyberMax Enthusiast KII 400 and the Compaq Presario 5240—the CyberMax was the clear winner. This \$1499 machine earned a WorldBench 98 score of 187, almost identical to the scores of the HP and Micron Celeron-366s. The two slowest PII-400 systems with 64MB of RAM we've tested earned similar scores (191 and 185), whereas the fastest PII-400 system earned a score of 203, or about 9 per-

cent faster than the Enthusiast (a negligible difference when you're running a word processor or spreadsheet).

The Enthusiast comes with an STB Velocity 4400 graphics card laden with 16MB of SDRAM. That supply of graphics memory, the most generous here, helped the PC outperform the other four systems on two of four graphics tests: It earned the best score when running a PowerPoint presentation with an AVI file

operating in the background, and when running a 3D game called Incoming. Considering that the Enthusiast also comes with a 19-inch monitor and a DVD-ROM drive, its price makes it a steal. To top it off, CyberMax earned good marks in our recent Reliability and Service survey (see "PC Reliability and Service: Who Can You Trust?" www.pcworld.com/nov98/service).

Compaq's Presario 5240 looks less impressive in comparison—\$1568 gets you a 15-inch monitor and a graphics card with 8MB of SGRAM. The system was noticeably

slower than the CyberMax on business apps, too, earning a WorldBench 98 score of 170.

CENTS AND SENSIBILITY

COMPUTERS BASED ON the Celeron-366 and K6-2-400 chips are right on the money for many PC buyers. They are solid, reasonably priced work and home PCs that don't skimp on features. They run business productivity apps quickly. And unless you regularly tax your system's CPU with such demanding work as database mining, or you live and breathe graphics apps that cry out for every bit of speed available, these \$1499-range PCs have plenty of power. (If you must have a high-end Pentium II, it pays to look ahead. See "Your PC in the New Millennium" on page 104.)

We can't make sweeping assumptions about K6-2-400 systems based on the two we tested here. But if there are more like the CyberMax Enthusiast out there, all we can say is, "Bring 'em on." Finally, you've got a great choice in between \$999 lightweights and \$2000 wallet busters.

Microsoft Office 2000 Offers New Apps and Web Tools

B E T A

MICROSOFT OFFICE 2000 is here—in spirit. True, the upgrade to the 800-pound gorilla of office suites won't ship until the second quarter of this year. But in the meantime, Microsoft's site is hawking a \$20 beta version it calls a "Preview." Available now, nearly feature complete, and surprisingly stable, the Preview provides a solid picture of what to expect in the final version.

If you want to create content for Web sites or a corporate intranet, Office 2000 looks like a winner—it's brimming with new Internet features. But mostly, this upgrade focuses on sensible tweaks to existing tools. Few of the changes will revolutionize the way you work; others may even annoy you. And while Microsoft hasn't made the wholesale changes to file formats that it did with Office 97, I ran into some compatibility problems in my tests when running PowerPoint.

Even experienced Office users may need to spend time adjusting to alterations in the interface. Some changes are sure to be crowd-pleasers. For instance, the clipboard can finally hold more than one item. It now tracks up to 12 elements, letting you paste them selectively.

INTERFACE CAVEATS

IN CONTRAST, other "improvements" are questionable. To re-


duce on-screen clutter, Microsoft has redesigned the menu system so that menus show a shortened list of commands. If the command you're looking for isn't listed in a menu, you have to hover the mouse pointer over the menu for a moment, whereupon it will expand to show all the commands.

As you use features, Office promotes them to the top-level menu. After two weeks, however, I still had some trouble remembering where commands would show up. (The old-style menus remain available as an option.)

Microsoft has greatly improved Office 2000's Web features. Word, for instance, is now a considerably more advanced HTML editor: It handles frame layouts with ease and has simpler tools for embedding hyperlinks. Excel's

Web Query feature, which was tricky to use in Excel 97, now lets you easily grab tabular data from a Web site, plunk it into a spreadsheet, and then

tell the program to refresh it automatically with new data whenever the Web site changes. Likewise, PowerPoint has new

Internet tools, including the ability to broadcast a slide show over the Web.

HTML SAVVY

CORE APPS can now open and save HTML documents as if they were native files. So, if you're creating Web pages, you can opt to work in HTML exclusively, rather than juggle multiple versions of documents. In my informal tests,

Word and Excel created HTML documents that looked good in both major Web browsers. The documents also retained all their formatting when I brought them back into Office. But PowerPoint rendered pages that could be displayed only by Internet Explorer 4.0 or higher. (The app creates HTML files that can be read by IE 3.0 and Navigator, but it can't open these files itself.)

Most of Office's native file formats remain unchanged. Only Access has a new file format, and it can export databases for use in earlier versions of

the app. That means you can still share most files with users of Office 97, Lotus SmartSuite, or Corel's WordPerfect Suite unless you

use the new HTML formats. Beyond the Web features, Microsoft has mostly enhanced existing features in apps as opposed to adding radically new ones. Word's on-the-fly spelling checker, already invaluable, now fixes more typos automatically: Type "editoin," for example, and Word corrects it to "edition" as you continue typing. And Excel's PivotTable data-analysis feature is both easier to use (you can lay out a PivotTable directly on a spreadsheet, rather than in a separate window) and more powerful (you can turn PivotTable data into interactive charts).



Office Adds FrontPage, PhotoDraw, and Publisher

MICROSOFT OFFICE isn't one product: It's a series of packages, each encompassing multiple programs. In Office 2000, Microsoft has shuffled the lineup and added a version called Premium to the existing Standard, Small Business, Professional, and Developer editions.



The company's popular Publisher desktop-publishing program is now part of every Office version except Standard. This is great if you create graphically rich documents; the program is packed with easy-to-use wizards for designing brochures, Web pages, and so on. Serious

Web and graphics types will want to invest in Office 2000 Premium, which includes the FrontPage Web site creator and PhotoDraw, a powerful business-graphics editor.

SOME BEEFS

FRONTPAGE, PhotoDraw, and Publisher are all welcome additions. But while Microsoft has

tried to integrate the new members, it hasn't gone all the way. PhotoDraw's user interface looks different from that of Office's other applications. Also, both PhotoDraw and FrontPage must be installed separately. Finally, the improved clipboard, one of the suite's best new features, doesn't work in these three apps.

These features show potential, but some will work only in organizations that standardize on Microsoft products. For example, Excel PivotTables look fine in Internet Explorer, but

because they rely on ActiveX technology, Netscape Navigator users won't see them at all.

Pricing for Office 2000 was not set at press time, but Microsoft says the suite will cost about the same as the current versions. (Office 97 Professional is \$349 as an upgrade

and \$599 for the full version.) At those prices, spending \$20 to take the Preview edition for a test drive makes sense. Except for Outlook, the Preview can be installed alongside your current version of the suite, which means you don't have to give up Office 97. If

that's too much bother, check back with *PC World*: Our April issue will have an in-depth, application-by-application review. —Harry McCracken

ROTH IRAS, capital gains changes, child credits—this year's tax law changes are so complicated that even the savviest do-it-yourselfers may need help. Fortunately, the two major tax preparation packages—Intuit's TurboTax and Block Financial's Kiplinger TaxCut—are better-looking and simpler to use than ever. Want to save money? A plethora of Web sites let you do your taxes for as little as \$10.

Electronic filing is easier and more worthwhile than ever. E-filers can now pay electronically simply by providing their bank routing and account numbers. You can even specify when your account should be debited—as long as

you hit the April 15th deadline.

If you used tax software last year, you won't even have to mail in a form with your signature. The IRS will send you a sealed postcard with a five-digit "e-file customer number" to authenticate your electronic

filed return. And the IRS promises to dispatch e-filers' refunds within three weeks.


TURBOTAX FACE-LIFT

TURBOTAX, the longtime market leader, has a new look. Two-thirds of the screen re-

tains the familiar layout of years past: interview on top, form on the bottom. But navigation is easier thanks to a new bar down the left side that lists all screens in the current section of the software and highlights those you've completed. To get to a screen, simply click on its description.

Other, less obvious changes abound. Both the fast-track interviews (which have fewer explanations) and the regular interviews have been condensed into fewer screens. FAQs appear on the interview screen, so you don't have to leave the interview to get help.

The basic federal 1040 edition costs \$35 (street price); the \$50 Deluxe edition adds multimedia help, a library of publications, tax and IRA planners, and free online filing for one return. TurboTax also offers business-







Tips for Safe Filing

AT A TIME when many people still balk at putting their credit card numbers online, how do Web-based tax preparation services hope to convince customers to entrust their financial data to a browser? The answer: by using as many security measures as possible and telling prospective customers about each one.

Thomson Investor's Network's OneTax.com Web site, for exam-



ple, lists security features on its home page. These include SSL servers, which encrypt data traveling between your PC and the firm's servers; encryption of all user-identifying data; and multiple firewalls to prevent illegal access. Even passwords are encrypted: Nobody at OneTax can access them. The safety net is a backup password for which OneTax employees can give you only a self-

oriented packages, including a \$90 version that supports partnerships and corporations. The one downside is that the software on state taxes is relatively expensive—\$28 for the first state and \$20 for each additional one.

Deluxe delivers multimedia help, a fast-track interview, improved navigation, Roth IRA assistance, and online updates. TaxCut also comes in a no-frills \$20 Basic edition, but that package leaves you having to pay \$25 more for the all-

supplied hint. Your completed return doesn't even travel the Internet: OneTax transmits it via private phone line to the IRS.

HOMEWORK TIME

INTERNATIONAL DATA Corporation analyst Chris Christiansen advises taxpayers to do some research before choosing a Web-based tax preparation service. At the very least, online filers should look for SSL servers and 40-bit encryption. Server-level data encryption and use of Diffie-Hellman or RSA encryption algorithms are also desirable. Privacy policies should include a commit-

ment not to sell your personal data without your permission.

Web sites have the same fiduciary responsibility as a local tax preparer to keep your data confidential. "Unlike credit card information, tax information is protected by federal statute," says Ed Murphy, director of business development and marketing at Thomson Investor's Network.

How can you tell if all this security is working? Short of hiring a hacker to attempt a break-in, you have to take the Web site's word for it. "If you're using a reputable software vendor, you should be okay," Christiansen says.

to find using the IRS Web site (www.irs.ustreas.gov). The three sites I previewed—Intuit's new WebTurboTax, Thomson Investor's Network's OneTax.com, and Universal Tax Systems' SecureTax.com—let you complete your return for free, charging only for printing your return in a usable form or filing it.


The most impressive—and expensive—of the three was WebTurboTax. It's a virtual twin of the retail package, but without the multimedia help and (a more significant gotcha) the ability to import data from a previous year's return. Fees run \$10 for a 1040EZ and \$20 for a standard 1040, and \$10 or \$20 for a state return, depending on complexity.

SecureTax.com's attractions include 4000 downloadable IRS forms, a 2-minute tax-refund estimator (suitable only for the simplest of returns), and a tax organizer. But you can import data from only last year's version of SecureTax. Fees are \$15 for a 1040 return and up to three state returns, and \$10 for a

1040EZ and state filing. OneTax.com looks handsomer than SecureTax and charges only \$10, but the site warns users with even minor complexities, such as home-office deductions, to go elsewhere.

Advice on SecureTax.com and OneTax.com is limited. The beta versions I tried out had annoying glitches: Resizing windows can force you to log in again; boxes unexpectedly turn up checked; and navigation can be difficult. In general, if you need solid advice, the deluxe CD retail packages are the best way to go, with TaxCut the year's best deal.







Software Prices Still Rising: Blame It on Microsoft

ANALYSIS

NO MATTER how the “anti-trust trial of the century” turns out, one verdict is already in: Consumers have lost.

According to system vendors, industry analysts, internal Microsoft documents, and a report by an independent consumer group, Microsoft’s overwhelming domination of the markets for operating systems (over 80 percent) and for productivity software (nearly 80 percent) has translated into higher prices and limited choices for consumers.

DOUBLING THE PRICE

PC VENDORS won’t say how much they pay for copies of Windows, and they’re understandably nervous about criticizing Microsoft. But ask them off the record, and they’ll tell you that Microsoft has more than doubled what it charges computer makers for its OSes—from \$15 to \$25 in 1991 to between \$40 and \$70 in 1998, depending on the size of the vendor (see “Fewer Choices, Higher Prices”).

Microsoft won’t comment on its pricing policies. But the company’s own internal memo entitled “PC Value Analysis,” written in 1996, found that the operating system accounted for 0.5 percent of a PC’s total cost to consumers in 1990, then jumped to 2.5 percent in 1996. According to Frederick Warren-Boulton, a former Reagan administration economist and a key government witness in the Microsoft case, the percentage

has doubled again since then.


Microsoft’s price increases have been equally tough on consumers who buy OSes off the shelf. According to the Software Publishers Association, in 1992 the stand-alone version of Windows 3.1 retailed for about \$100; such a version of Windows 98 now sells for about \$160.

KILL THE COMPETITION

“COMPANIES THAT make disk drives, monitors, and memory—those that have real


SINCE IT HAS achieved dominance in the market for operating systems, Microsoft has more than doubled the prices of its OSes to PC makers.

competition—have cut prices, while Microsoft, which has killed off its competition, has raised prices,” says Mark Cooper, consumer advocate and author of “The Consumer Case Against Microsoft.”



Cooper’s report, written for the Consumer Federation of America (a Washington, D.C.-based consortium of state and

local public interest organizations), sharply criticizes the software giant’s pricing and marketing tactics. “If Microsoft was like any other technology company,” Cooper says, “the price for its operating system should have come down 3 percent or in the worst case stayed flat.”

Compare prices in markets where Microsoft faces strong competition with those in markets it dominates. For example, Intuit’s popular Quicken Deluxe personal finance program costs about \$60, a bit less than it did a couple of years ago; Microsoft’s Money 99, which lags behind Quicken in market share, costs roughly the same. It’s a different story in the office suite arena, where Microsoft has a 78 percent market share. According to a

survey of online software stores conducted by *PC World*, Microsoft’s Office 97 costs an average of 33 percent more than its rivals. At one CompUSA store, Office 97 sells for \$450, while Lotus’ SmartSuite and Corel’s WordPerfect Suite can be had for \$400 and \$300, respectively.

HIGHER SHARE, HIGHER PRICES?

MICROSOFT’S CRITICS say the connection between pricing and market share is proof of Microsoft’s monopolistic power. According to International Data Corporation, Windows accounted for 75 percent of desktop operating systems installed worldwide in 1991; by 1998, that share had grown to 82 percent.

Microsoft acknowledges that it has pushed the boundaries on OS pricing. In a memo to CEO Bill Gates on December 16, 1997, Joachim Kempin, senior vice president of Microsoft’s OEM division, warns that the company’s prices for OSes could alienate such stalwart customers as Compaq. (Compaq alone pays Microsoft

upwards of \$750 million a year for operating system licenses.) "Our high prices could get a single [hardware vendor] or a coalition to fund a competing effort," Kempin wrote. In other words, those vendors might develop their own operating systems.

GOT COREL?

BUT KEMPIN'S CONCERNS that incensed vendors might form a coalition and develop a competing OS never materialized. Today, no major computer vendor, with the exception of Apple, preinstalls any OS but Windows on its systems. A couple of them may give you the option of special-ordering another operating system, but they won't make it easy. Likewise, most hardware companies will preinstall only Microsoft versions of popular applications, especially office suites. Consumers buying from Micron or Gateway can't substitute Lotus SmartSuite or Corel's WordPerfect Suite for Microsoft Office; Compaq will install those other packages on your new computer, but it won't remove—and it will still charge you for—Microsoft Office.

In fact, the only times you'll find non-Microsoft products preinstalled on a PC are when you're buying from a smaller vendor. Microsoft charges one second-tier PC vendor we spoke to (on the condition of anonymity) over \$150 for Office 97, while (according to PC vendors and analysts speaking confidentially) larger customers like CompUSA, Dell, and Gateway pay \$100 or less.


To be able to offer consumers a \$1500 computer on a par with those of its larger hardware rivals, the second-tier vendor we spoke to preinstalls Lotus's SmartSuite on its sys-

2.1GB hard drive these days for \$100 or less; you couldn't buy a 20MB drive for that much in 1990. Murray says that such trends don't apply to OSes. "The cost of the plastic

loomed from 3.1 percent to 11.8 percent during the same period. Which is one reason the Federal Trade Commission is investigating Intel's alleged anticompetitive behavior.

Microsoft Office Always Costs More

FOR YEARS MICROSOFT OFFICE HAS held the lion's share of the market for office suites. Competitors like Lotus and Corel (and formerly Novell) have slashed prices; Microsoft hasn't. Why? It doesn't have to.

DON'T BE SURPRISED


SOME INDUSTRY observers say nothing is surprising about Microsoft's pricing strategies. "Where there's competition, Microsoft prices aggressively and competitively; where there isn't, Microsoft doesn't," says Chris LeTocq, a software analyst at Dataquest, a market research firm in San Jose, California.

Microsoft argues that customers pay more for OSes now because they get more: Win 9x is more feature-rich than Win 3.x. "Windows 95 was a quantum leap in terms of features," says Microsoft spokesman Mark Murray. But critics counter that Microsoft's reasoning contradicts industry trends: You can get a

PLUMMETING PRICES

LARGE PC VENDORS defend their decision to preinstall Microsoft products, arguing that standardizing on one OS allows them to trim costs elsewhere and then pass the savings on to consumers. However, according to one analyst, if computer makers let consumers choose an office suite for their PC, the prices of suites would plunge. "For the

chance to build market share, Lotus and Corel would just about give their software away," says the analyst, who wished to remain anonymous.

Microsoft has contended throughout its trial that high technology is a tough business and that rivals like Apple, America Online, Intel, Netscape Communications, and Sun Microsystems behave in the same way when given the chance. Unfortunately, the business can be tough on consumers as well. Should PC buyers be paying less for Microsoft products? Should they have more choice? Lawyers on both sides of the Microsoft case can and will continue to argue about the "shoulds." However those arguments are resolved, one thing is clear: Consumers are paying higher prices for, and have less choice in, software products than they would if Microsoft didn't dominate that market.



AFTER YEARS of delays, DVD-RAM is finally hitting the market. Creative Labs shipped the first upgrade kit last year; now kits from LaCie and HiVal (both based on Panasonic's LF-D101 drive) and Hitachi's OEM-only GF-1050 drive are available.

The good news is that for about \$500 to \$800, you can buy a DVD-RAM drive that is fast enough to copy 315MB of data in about 12 minutes. These drives are flexible, too: They read and write DVD-RAM discs (as large as 5.2-GB), and can read CD-ROM, CD-R, CD-RW, and DVD-ROM discs.

Unfortunately, the good news is tempered by a slew of gotchas. In testing the LaCie DVD-RAM External SCSI kit and the Hitachi drive, we encountered three disadvantages to upgrading to DVD-RAM. First, DVD-RAM kits could be hard to find for some time. Second, these kits may not include all the hardware you need. Third, and most significant, DVD-RAM drives exist

for now on a virtual island, since the discs these drives create can only be read by other DVD-RAM drives and a few newer DVD-ROM drives. The DVD-ROM drives most people have in their PCs today won't be able to read DVD-

results: The Panasonic LF-D101 took less than 11 minutes to complete the transfer, while the Hitachi GF-1050 finished in just under 13 minutes. In contrast, a typical CD-RW drive spinning at 2X speed (or 300 kilobytes per second)

ing of 2.1X. (The first DVD-ROM drives transferred data at 1.385 MBps, thereby establishing the 1X DVD standard; all DVD "X" ratings are based on multiples of that.) Though the latest DVD-ROM drives achieve 5X DVD playback, no DVD titles are optimized for such high speeds. The Panasonic's 13.5X rating for playing CD-ROM discs beat out the Hitachi's 8X speed; each of

RAM discs at all. Moreover, DVD-RAM drives can't create discs in CD-ROM, CD-R, or CD-RW formats, so you can't share archived data with anyone who relies on them.

FASTER THAN CD-RW

THE NEW DVD-RAM drives are certainly fast. To measure recording speed, we copied 315MB of multimedia files and programs from the hard drive of a Dell Dimension 333c PC to each DVD-RAM drive. The

takes roughly 18 minutes to transfer the same amount of data. Both the Hitachi and the Panasonic drives restored our 315MB of test data to the hard drive even more swiftly—in less than 5 minutes.

Using TestaCD Labs' DVD Tach and CD Tach benchmarks, we next measured how fast the new units played DVD-ROM and CD-ROM discs. When spinning DVD-ROM discs, both drives earned a perfectly adequate speed rat-

these drives' speeds is entirely in line with its manufacturer's specifications.

SLOW TO MARKET

BUT YOU CAN'T GET those speeds if you can't find the drives—and so far, DVD-RAM drives are coming to market slowly. Currently, only Creative Labs, HiVal, and LaCie sell DVD-RAM upgrade kits, all based on Panasonic's drive; at press time, the Hitachi drive was unavailable in a retail kit. Both drive makers are negotiating with other kit vendors.

And kits are the only way you're going to get a DVD-RAM drive today: They won't be standard equipment in new PCs anytime soon. For one thing, they're too expensive, costing PC vendors two or three times as much as CD-RW drives to include in a system. More importantly, ►

DVD-RAM drives—like CD-RW drives—lack widespread appeal. PC vendors say they'll include DVD-RAM drives only in specialized configurations, such as graphic design workstations or corporate mass-storage file servers.

EXTRA HARDWARE REQUIRED

IF YOU DO buy an upgrade kit, be warned: It may not contain everything you need to get the drive up and running.

For example, the LaCie kit we looked at came with the drive, cables, one 2.6GB DVD-RAM cartridge, and software, but it didn't include a SCSI adapter, which the drive requires. (Creative Labs' DVD-RAM kit does include a SCSI card.) We used Initio's PCI-based FastSCSI-2 I/O Highway board to test the LaCie kit and the Hitachi drive.

Also, if you want to play DVD titles, and your PC isn't speedy enough for software

MPEG-2 decoding (most vendors recommend at least a 266-MHz Pentium PC), you'll need to buy an MPEG-2 decoder board. Finally, if you want to record video directly onto your DVD-RAM drive (which vendors say is an important application for DVD-RAM), you'll need compatible video capture hardware.

At least the software shines. LaCie's kit and the Hitachi drive both came with a copy of Software Associates' Write DVD software. Unlike the recording software that accompanies CD-R or CD-RW products, Write DVD integrates itself directly into Windows. The program creates two new drive letters for your DVD-RAM drive, visible from Windows Explorer and My Computer. One of the drive letters becomes activated when you insert any CD media or DVD-ROM disc; the other displays DVD-RAM discs. You can simply drag

and drop files to and from the DVD-RAM disc as you would to and from a hard drive.

BEST FOR BACKUP

IN THE SHORT term, because DVD-RAM discs are unable to play on today's DVD-ROM or CD-ROM drives, DVD-RAM drives are better suited for backup and archiving purposes than for data sharing. For the latter task, CD-R and CD-RW optical drives remain the devices of choice. As DVD-ROM drives that are capable of reading DVD-RAM media proliferate (products from Hitachi, Panasonic, Toshiba, and others are expected to arrive later this year), DVD-RAM drives will become more widely useful.

But another recordable DVD option looms large on the horizon, a second format called DVD+RW. Championed by the likes of Hewlett-Packard, Philips, Ricoh, and Sony, DVD+RW drives won't work

with DVD-RAM media but will be compatible with DVD-ROM, CD-ROM, CD-R, and CD-RW discs. They'll store a little more data than DVD-RAM cartridges, too (3.0GB per side versus DVD-RAM's 2.6GB). DVD+RW drives should arrive by this summer, priced at about \$600 to \$800.

Given DVD-RAM's shortcomings, our advice is to wait on rewritable DVD technology for now, unless your backup and archiving needs are dire. By the time DVD+RW drives hit the market, we'll be able to see more clearly which optical storage format has the best long-term prospects.

Despite its small size, the Freestyle's 16 MB of RAM and optional ProxiNet software, a dedicated graphical online browser, keep you connected to the Internet or your company's intranet.

AT A DISTANCE

One key to increasing productivity is leveraging the time usually spent commuting or traveling, or eliminating it altogether by having some employees work from home.

"Productivity measurements of employees who work from home or at unsupervised remote sites indicate that most spend between 10% to 15%, and some up to 25%, more time working than do people who work in a traditional office setting," says Jack Gold, an analyst at Meta Group. "If you're sitting home and have a brainstorm, you probably won't do much about it," says Gold. "If you're not remotely connected, chances are you will not drive to the office to follow up. But if you have a computer at home, geography does not constrain you."

Before mobile professionals could achieve an appreciable level of efficiency, however, hardware vendors had to punch up the per-

formance, features, and usability of their products. Software vendors introduced compact versions, as small as 75 KB, of their

flagship database and office automation software. For example, 3Com's (www.palm.com) Palm III and Windows CE-based machines can now run enterprise-class software from Oracle, SAP, Sybase, Microsoft, Computer Associates, plus others. The availability of enterprise resource planning software further validates the Palm III and Windows CE devices as true mobile productivity tools.

Fortunately, other products designed to help mobile professionals stay connected adhere to the Immutable Law of Technology: Hardware gets faster, smaller, better, cheaper, and friendlier. Here are some examples:

► Daewoo Industries (www.dwe.daewoo.co.kr) flat-panel, lightweight displays are easier on the eyes, especially for extended projects, than the smaller screens that weight-constrained portable equipment typically offers. When used with a docking station, they offer the traveler the best of the mobile and desktop worlds: a compact footprint display with a sharp, color-saturated image.


► American Power Conversion's (www.apcc.com) portable SurgeArrest can help reduce the odds that transient power problems or telephone voltage spikes will damage your equipment. 

On the road again

"Technology empowers me. I have the flexibility to choose when and where I want to do things. The choice is mine."

NOT TOO LONG AGO, A commuter tapping on a laptop keyboard provoked stares of curiosity. Today, it's more of a curiosity to see a business traveler passing time by idly staring out of a plane or train window.

Georgia Saranofsky, director of New York Life's Field Technology Team, Agency Department, spends almost as much time commuting (three hours per day excluding delays) as she does at a desk. To maximize the use of her time and whittle down her workload, Saranofsky routinely carries a laptop computer, beeper, and cell phone to help her transform the "quiet time" during commuting into productive hours. "I don't have the luxury of uninterrupted time in the main office," says Saranofsky.

It's during her long daily commutes that she can test new software programs and tweak the PowerPoint sales presentations she plans to deliver during her monthly visits to New York Life's

branch offices in Dallas and elsewhere.

"The world I live and work in is not 9 to 5 any longer. Staying on top of projects and managing all the things I do requires more time than that. This technology enables me to keep up and helps keep me from getting overwhelmed," she says.


DIGITAL AT DAWN

A typical day for Saranofsky starts at 5:30 a.m. "I download my messages before I leave the house and answer them while on the bus." After answering her daily E-mail, Saranofsky reads through company memos and routine interoffice correspondence. "When I get to the office, I connect my laptop to a port replicator and upload my responses and documents to the company's intranet for distribution." With her long commuting hours and busy travel schedule, she uses her Compaq laptop as her primary link to colleagues. "I don't have a desktop computer. At the office I use the laptop for everything."

Her primary software includes a calendaring system with a "nagger" to remind her of pending deadlines, contact management, Microsoft Word, and Presentation. Microsoft Project Manager helps her track and manage the 10 to 15 projects she typically juggles.

ONE OF A CROWD

Like a true road warrior, Saranofsky never leaves home on business without her ordnance.

"People wonder how it is that I never forget my 'gadgets.'" It's simple, I always keep them together and make it a point never to leave them lying around where

As well equipped as Saranofsky is, what more ordnance might she want? "I'd like a personal digital assistant. I know that a PDA would work for me because the sooner I write something down, the more complete and accurate it is." Saranofsky says her company is currently field testing PDAs, but she plans to buy her own. "I can take notes with the laptop, but sometimes, I'd like a PDA because it's smaller and lighter."

One other technology she plans to adopt is an automatic

we interact with our computer systems. Today we look at them as dedicated operations for word processing and other fixed tasks. But look three years into the future, and you will not be able to point to a single device and say 'this is my computer'."

Saranofsky maintains that the cost of acquiring the hardware is more than offset by the increase in productivity and reduced expenses. For example, she rarely uses a hotel's business centers when she travels, preferring to work from her room. "It's more

"I never knew it would be so easy to connect to people when I need to talk to them. People count on me for fast answers."

I might forget them." Many of her fellow commuters do the same so none of their commuting time goes to waste. "I'd say that 50% of the people I commute with carry a cell phone, laptop, and beeper. Most of them use them for business, but it's reassuring to have a cell phone handy for emergencies as well."

For all the many benefits of portable technology, it does have a downside. "Customers and colleagues know that I'm always accessible. If I don't call them right back, they wonder why not. Sometimes I can't stop what I'm doing and leave a meeting or disrupt a presentation."

voice transcriber. "I often use a small handheld tape recorder. I'm looking forward to the next generation of these recorders that can translate spoken words into written text." Dictaphone and Olympus have recently introduced such devices, and Sony says it will shortly release one. All three connect to a computer and upload the translated text directly into popular word processors.

Saranofsky's use of multiple devices exemplifies what Jack Gold, a mobile technology analyst at Meta Group, predicts will help shape the future of business travel. "Mobile technology has the potential to significantly change how

convenient and more economical. For example, it typically costs \$4 to have the hotel fax a one-page document. With my laptop, I can attach a Word document and send it as E-mail."

Will the proliferation of technology in Saranofsky's professional life eventually add to the problem instead of the solution? She thinks not. "Without this technology, I probably could not handle all that I do," she reasons. "I think that maybe I could do this job without this technology, but I hope I never have to." ★







QuickBooks Gets the Office Connection

ACCOUNTING

IF YOU KEEP the books for a small business, you're probably using Intuit's QuickBooks. Its simplicity, power, and attractive design have long made it the runaway market leader. The newest upgrade, QuickBooks Pro 99, simplifies routine tasks for users who also work with Office 97: You can now write letters to customers and turn financial reports into spreadsheets without having to leave QuickBooks.

But QuickBooks Pro 99

arrives only six months after the last upgrade, QuickBooks Pro 6.0, added long-overdue support for multiple users on a network. Why the big rush? Intuit is playing catch-up. Competitors Peachtree and Bestware, which also led the way in networkability, introduced Office integration in their small-business packages last year and the year before, respectively. QuickBooks Pro 99 boasts several other innovations, but anyone who bought last summer's upgrade

should think carefully about whether the added capabilities justify the hefty price tag.

TAKE A LETTER

THE INTEGRATION with Office allows QuickBooks to do some flashy tricks, including generating letters based on financial information. If, for example, you'd like to send debt collection letters to


customers whose bills are 30 to 60 days past due, the program will present you with a list of qualifying delinquents. You can edit the list before the program launches Word and performs a mail merge to generate the letters.

You can choose from three prewritten collection letters (friendly, formal, or harsh) or write your own. QuickBooks Pro 99 one-ups the competition by enabling you to produce other types of letters as well—thank-yous for bill payments received, bounced check notifications, contract transmissions, and so on. Or you can create your own templates for mailings to customers, suppliers, or employees.

Integration with Excel lets you turn a QuickBooks report, including formulas, into a new worksheet—or add it to an existing one—with a single mouse click. This is useful if you want to manipulate data in ways QuickBooks can't.

Users who bill by the hour will appreciate the convenience of the new, built-in Stopwatch, which enables you to track time spent on a job by clicking at the start of that job

and again at the end. Previously, you had to import this data from a separate QuickBooks Pro Timer application. (The Timer still comes with the program, incidentally, and it

remains useful for employees who don't have QuickBooks on their desktops but who need to generate time sheets.)

Other improvements apply to the \$119 basic edition of the package, QuickBooks 99, as well as to the \$219 Pro version (\$599 for a five-user pack). You can now fill out deposit slips from your keyboard—but you have to order blank slips, with your account information preprinted on them in special ink, from Intuit at a pricey \$35 to \$55 per 250-slip package.

More useful from the standpoint of business accounting: QuickBooks now permits you to track cash back on deposits and attach purchase orders to customer accounts and jobs.

Finally, though QuickBooks 6.0 too is supposed to be Y2K ready, the 99 editions go a step farther by expressing all years

in four digits rather than two.

Satisfied Peachtree and Bestware users will find no compelling reason to switch, but QuickBooks Pro 99 should help keep existing customers loyal—especially those with older versions who were thinking of upgrading anyway. But if you already use QuickBooks Pro 6.0, upgrade only if you need the Office integration and other new business management features.

At least recent upgraders get a bit of a break on rebates: QuickBooks Pro 6.0 owners can recoup \$90 (\$200 for a five-pack), compared to \$70 (and \$100 for a five-pack) for owners of earlier versions.



IF IMITATION IS the sincerest form of flattery, the Sony VAIO 505 ultraslim subnotebook should be blushing at the slew of knockoffs it has inspired. One of the newest, Dell's Latitude LT M266ST, slightly outdoes the VAIO, but is also a little more expensive.

Like the VAIO and other ultraslims, the Latitude boasts a svelte 1-inch profile, a touch-typable 10-inch-wide keyboard and a Pentium MMX CPU. Its light heft (4-plus pounds with AC adapter and external floppy drive) and its internal modem make it ideal for frequent travelers tired of lugging around a standard 8-pound laptop.

A preproduction unit with a PMMX-266 CPU, 256KB secondary cache, and 64MB of RAM chalked up a PC World-Bench 98 score of 118—about

average for this configuration and plenty fast for running basic work applications. The Latitude's battery life in our tests (1 hour, 51 minutes) was unimpressive for a conventional notebook but fairly typical for an ultraslim subnote. An optional second battery lets you work longer while on the road, but adds nearly a pound to the unit's traveling weight.

The Latitude LT ranks a cut

above the other ultraslims in several ways. Its active-matrix screen measures 11.3 inches diagonally, compared to a typical 10-plus inches (the VAIO 505's is 10.4 inches).

The Latitude LT's keys travel a bit more than the VAIO's, making typing a little easier. Dell's on-site repairs and toll-free tech support for the life of the product beat Sony's service policy.

The Latitude has two deficiencies, though: It ships with Windows 95, not Windows 98. And at \$2299, it's \$300 more than either the Sony or Toshiba's VAIO copycat, the Portégé 3015CT. No matter which ultraslim you buy, you'll probably want to spend another \$299 for an external CD-ROM drive. For that kind

of money, you could buy a bulkier Dell Inspiron notebook with the fastest mobile Pentium II CPU available. More ultraslim portables are on the horizon, so we'd advise you to shop around.



tions, which cost at least \$150 per month. Lexis-Nexis's new Universe service offers cheaper subscriptions and access via a standard Web browser.

For single users, fees start at \$55 per month for access to articles in the News database

going back 90 days. The \$250-per-month account that I tried out provides unlimited access to News, People, Companies, and Countries databases going back at least 25 years.

Results were mixed. On the plus side, Lexis-Nexis clearly

did its Web design homework. The Universe site is simple, pleasingly elegant, and dead-easy to navigate; I could even e-mail my search results directly from the browser.

But the mix of sources can produce unsatisfactory results, at least for general subjects. A search on "Microsoft court" brought up 72 articles on the Microsoft antitrust trial from such diverse sources as the *Irish Times* and the *Seattle Post-Intelligencer*—but nothing from the *New York Times* or the abstracts collection of the *Wall Street Journal*, both of which are listed in the index. Some major magazines aren't represented at all.

Universe might be the way to go for legal documents and public records. But for general research, you'll be just as well off (and a lot richer) sticking with a free search engine like HotBot, Lycos, or AltaVista.

Aiwa, Sony Offer Affordable 10GB Backup

TAPE BACKUP

TODAY'S BIG, inexpensive hard drives can store large programs and tons of data. But with the average hard drive capacity of a new PC now at 8GB, even half-full drives exceed the capacity of many tape backup devices. Two new tape drives—Aiwa's Bolt and Sony's SuperStation—use tapes that can hold nearly 10GB of compressed data. Priced at about \$150 (internal) to \$180 (external)—roughly the same as lower-capacity competitors—they're also eminently affordable.

Both drives come in internal

EIDE and external parallel port models; both use the same Aiwa mechanism; and both come with Seagate's fine backup software for Windows 95, 98, and NT Workstation.

As expected, my shipping Sony parallel port model (with printer pass-through) was the easier model to install; the shipping internal Aiwa drive required a bit more work to set up. I had to open my PC's case, screw in the drive, attach it to the second connection on my EIDE CD-ROM drive cable, and plug in a power lead.

But once installed, the internal Bolt drive worked faster,

taking only 38 minutes to back up my 400MB test drive and a mere 11 minutes to restore the files. In contrast, the SuperStation took about 46 minutes to back up and verify 400MB of files and about 22 minutes to restore them. Both units ran smoothly and quietly.

Each drive is protected by a two-year warranty, but Sony offers buyers longer phone support hours. You can buy storage media in two capacities: 6.6GB (\$25) and 10GB (\$35). Both drives are excellent, so Sony's longer support hours might be the tiebreaker.

Pictures Not Enough? Draw a Map

MAPPING

WORDS, GRAPHICS like bar or pie charts, and even emphatic hand gestures aren't always enough to get a point across concisely and powerfully. Sometimes, I feel the need to draw a *map*. Not just any map, but one that makes the geography meaningful. A map that can show me, for example, how many latte drinkers there are compared to smoothie fanatics, by zip code.

Microsoft's **MapPoint 2000** (\$109) and ESRI's **BusinessMap Pro 2.0** (\$130) do exactly that: They combine detailed geographic maps with demographics. You can geographically pinpoint U.S. census data that comes with the programs, or import your own statistics.



Mappoint 2000 HAS attractive maps and a familiar Microsoft interface, but its database isn't as robust as BusinessMap Pro's.

The resulting maps are useful for sales projections, expansion planning, and other research projects and proposals. I tested a beta version of MapPoint and a shipping version of BusinessMap Pro.

Microsoft's MapPoint 2000 is an easy-to-use program for those with basic mapping analysis needs. The interface will be familiar to Microsoft Office users, and MapPoint 2000 imports data from Excel, Outlook, Access, and text files, or other programs that support Microsoft Data Link (the Office 2000 counterpart to the ODBC protocol for databases). It also includes a useful demographics database that's derived from U.S. Census Bureau numbers and other sources, letting me do such things as display ratios of age groups by state; compare urban versus rural populations; or get a breakdown of minorities by county.

Once you've assembled your data, the maps are attractive and easy to work with. Drawing tools let you easily add high-

lighting, text boxes, and other annotations; and adding or embedding maps as editable objects in Word, PowerPoint, and other Office files is a snap. Our only major complaint: There's no undo feature.

BusinessMap Pro 2.0 is more powerful than MapPoint 2000, but with all the extra features, it is also more challenging to learn. Other drawbacks: The program lacks the comfy MapPoint 2000 interface; the maps are downright ugly; and its drawing and annotation tools are limited.

POWER ADD-ONS

BUT BUSINESSMAP PRO'S two optional extensions put the program, pardon the pun, on the map. Market Analyzer provides a wealth of U.S. demographics, including year 2002 census projections; Business Tracker has a helpful database of 11 million U.S. businesses. Both are included in the four-CD box, but you must call a toll-free number and pay \$350 to unlock the software; unlocking just Business Tracker

Use a Palm as a Pilot

MAPPING PROGRAMS for PalmPilot devices aren't new, but most only cover large areas with lots of single-screen maps. MarcoSoft's **Quo Vadis** (\$65) lets you scroll through street-level maps for most U.S. locations. Registered users can download all maps free from MarcoSoft's Web site. When you install maps of adjacent cities within a county, Quo Vadis seamlessly connects them like interlocking jigsaw pieces. Global Positioning System support provides real-time location tracking for users with a GPS antenna. You can zoom in and out on maps to show everything from street views to county views. A Palm's tiny memory limits the number of maps that you can store, and the small screen precludes large map views. Still, I found Quo Vadis a handy resource. MarcoSoft; 650/326-4727; www.marcoSoft.com.

costs \$50. You can import data from most common contact managers, databases, and spreadsheets, including Excel. Unfortunately, Outlook and the current version of Access are not supported in their native formats.

I would recommend MapPoint 2000 for those with basic, occasional mapping needs: It is inexpensive and easy to use. However, if you need to map data often for analysis or presentations; could use a wealth of ready-made statistical information; and aren't afraid of complex software programs, then BusinessMap Pro and its extensions are a worthwhile, if hefty, investment.



tion; the software then transcribes it into editable text.

As with most speech-recognition products, you have to begin by training it. I spent 20 minutes reading book excerpts into a preproduction version of NaturallySpeaking Mobile before using it to dictate e-mail, letters, and reports at my office, an airport, and a trade show.

Dragon says the recorder's compression of audio files hampers the software's speech recognition ability, at least initially, and my tests bore this out. While both recorder and software were super-easy to use, accuracy was disappointing at first. Scores of words were botched—"thanks" was interpreted as "flanks," "Lisa

Leno" as "let me know," and so on. The software understood most instructions ("new paragraph," "scratch that"), but it had problems with formatting requests like "bold that." Two more 20-minute training sessions improved accuracy, as did my editing

corrections. But it took a month of use for the product to become truly convenient.

You'll need at least a Pentium-133 computer with 32MB of RAM (I had a Pentium II-450 with 128MB of RAM). The chic 4-ounce recorder runs on two AAA batteries. Dragon also bundles a copy of NaturallySpeaking Preferred, its excellent \$160 desktop dictation program (see "Can We Talk?" January, www.pcworld.com/jan99/talk).

People who want to take notes or write drafts on the road will find Dragon's mobile product convenient, so long as they're prepared to do a fair amount of editing later. But for more formal work—like dictating letters—NaturallySpeaking Mobile has some catching up to do to keep pace with more advanced desktop programs like NaturallySpeaking Preferred.

NetZip Deluxe: Quick Web Unzip Fix

UTILITY

I'LL BE HONEST. I use WinZip all the time—not because it's the most feature-packed compression utility, but because I've always used it. Software Builders' **NetZip Deluxe 6.3**, which adds such features as the ability to resume an interrupted download, could break my WinZip habit. I tested a shipping version.

NetZip (\$30) offers WinZip's ease of use, intuitive interface, and support for multiple compression formats—and adds a lot of functionality for a bit more money (WinZip costs \$22 apiece for two to

nine licenses). The interrupted-download feature alone is worth the extra 8 bucks: If your Internet connection breaks during a download, NetZip lets you pick up where you left off, rather than having to restart from scratch. This feature works in conjunction with your browser for any Web download. Other utilities—GetRight and Download Butler, for example—can do the same but don't have NetZip's other attractions.

NetZip also simplifies the download-unzip drill. Click on a compressed file, and NetZip launches automatically, show-

ing the download's progress and displaying the archived files in your browser. When the download is done, you can immediately view, extract, and/or launch the archived files. (WinZip doesn't work directly through the browser.)

Like WinZip, NetZip lets you compress and decompress files to save on storage space or to e-mail compressed attachments. And as with Mijenix's ZipMagic, files in a NetZip archive look and act as if they were in Windows Explorer: You don't have to open up a compression utility just to use the files inside.

WinZip 7.0 is more customizable than NetZip, but NetZip's superior functionality makes it a good deal, even at its higher price. I only wish it came with better documentation than the included help files and FAQs.

Point, Shoot, Print: Digital Photos Get Easier

DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY

DOES YOUR DIGITAL camera keep you tethered to a PC? Sure, you need a computer to edit, e-mail, or post your digital photos on the Web. But three new products let you make quick printouts without hooking up cables and opening your images in a graphics program first—in short, without using a PC.

Syntran's \$150 **CamPrint**—a device about the size of your jacket pocket—connects compatible digital cameras directly to a printer. Push a few buttons to select photos and size; a switching device lets CamPrint and your PC share a printer. Yes, the idea is clunky—what, another gizmo, more cables? But my shipping version worked fine, even with my Olympus D-500L, which wasn't among the 22 cameras CamPrint officially supports.

More elegant in conception and execution is Lexmark's \$349 **Photo Jetprinter 5770**, a standard ink jet printer outfitted with an LCD-equipped control panel, slots for SmartMedia and CompactFlash memory cards, and a Zip drive adapter. Slip your camera's

media into the appropriate slot, then use the LCD settings to produce thumbnails, select images to print, and even add a few hokey special effects. Print quality of photos that I made using a shipping unit looked fine on ordinary ink jet paper, and striking on Lexmark's Inkjet Photo Paper.

Finally, Polaroid's \$299

hard-to-find ColorShot stock that delivers the same quality. Direct Connect wasn't ready for testing, but I tried a shipping version of the printer with a parallel port connection (a USB version is also available).

a Polaroid camera, saves images, you can make multiple copies or edit them on your PC. But if you dislike heavy, old-fashioned 3¹/₈-by-2⁷/₈-inch photos of conventional Polaroid cameras, you won't like ColorShot prints either—and

the small-format printer isn't really good for much else.

Each of these products eliminates the need for a PC to print digital photos. The CamPrint is the quick, easy, and relatively inexpensive fix—if you're happy with your current printer and if it supports the device. Polaroid's package may please fans of Polaroid photo who want to go digital. But if you plan to buy a printer anyway, Lexmark's integrated system makes the most sense, combining a good general-purpose printer with a digital-photography studio. You don't even need to attach your camera to it, because photos travel on wafer-thin flash cards.

One disadvantage, however, applies equally to all three of these products: They require AC power. That means you can simplify the process of getting to your images, but if you need the photos while you're out in the field, then a conventional Polaroid-style instant camera may turn out to be a more practical option.

Affordable, Easy Video Razzle-Dazzle

VIDEO CAPTURE

THE LAST TIME I tried to capture video on my PC, I cut two fingers jamming an ISA card into a free slot, banged my head on a shelf while attaching cables to the back of the box, and force-fed my hard drive so many motion-JPEG files that the system choked.

This time, things were different. With a shipping copy of **Dazzle Digital Video Creator**, all I had to do was plug a cable into my parallel port; I never had to crawl behind my PC again. All video and audio ports (in and out) come in a compact miniature tower that sits right next to my monitor.

Dazzle's software is even more appealing than the hardware. The sleek, intuitive interface looks like an electronic toy, with buttons that call up task-specific control panels for editing video and organizing multimedia clips.

Dazzle captures and saves video from a camcorder, a VCR, or any device with a composite or S-Video connector, in MPEG-1 format—a far more universal and compact video format than motion-JPEG or AVI. The only downside is that MPEG is not as

editable as M-JPEG. Dazzle lets you split MPEG clips, trim them, and splice them together—as long as they're in exactly the same format, down to their bit-per-second processing rates and window sizes. This is easy for clips captured using identical Dazzle format settings; blending in video

from the Web may be difficult.

Beyond cutting and splicing, you can do little editing with Dazzle (the company says the next version will offer more effects). But you can easily share your videos. Click one button to attach a clip to an e-mail message; click another to put it into a simple Web page

ready for posting on your site.

At \$249, Dazzle is one of the most affordable MPEG video capture packages available, suitable for a range of personal and business uses, such as training or Web marketing. Just make sure you get the latest software from the company's Web site: Dazzle released a new version in the middle of my evaluation.



SPSS 9: Picture-Pretty Statistical Analysis

STATISTICS

LONG POPULAR with scientists and statisticians, SPSS statistical analysis software in recent years has become useful for businesspeople as well. SPSS 9 (\$795) not only boasts visuals on a par with the best business presentation packages, it also provides wizards for importing all sorts of data and introduces powerful techniques that are moving from statistics cubbyholes into marketing departments. I looked at a preproduction copy.

Graphics, which can now be generated from tables with a few mouse clicks, include basics like the stacked-bar chart shown above. But new options abound. Sophisticated users will appreciate 3D spike charts for a detailed look at a proposed model's fit to data; business users will enjoy creating *USA Today*-style charts with bars made of symbols (flags, dollar signs, barrels, and so forth). Using features from the top-notch graphing program DeltaGraph (which SPSS now owns), SPSS 9 acquires a boardroom look to go with its business smarts.



STACKING UP: SPSS's new stacked-bar charts let you summarize and deliver complex statistics tables using an easy-to-read graphic.

SPSS's basic package now includes some advanced statistical topics from its series of SPSS modules (\$495 each). If you're still exploring statistical functions in Microsoft Excel, you may know little about things like multinomial logistic regression. But that function is a powerful business decision-making tool, and it's now part of the basic package. Advanced users should consider the Trends module for forecasting, and Exact Tests (or its industrial-strength companions StatXact and LogXact) for squeezing the most out of surveys and market tests.

Version 9's combination of powerful statistical methods

and graphic output, ranging from austere scientific to trade-show flashy, makes it the only program you need for finding patterns in business data and using them to convince people you're right.

Why would you want to do that? A commercial bureau not only can print large quantities far more quickly than an ink jet, but it also can provide much nicer print quality. Until now, these bureaus would accept only documents that were specially prepared for color printing with such high-end programs as Adobe PageMaker or QuarkXPress. With Publisher 2000, you can transfer a project to a Zip disk or other media using a new Pack and Go Wizard, and drop it off at the service bureau. The printer can whip it into shape using Publisher 2000's new Commercial Printing Tools. (Microsoft plans to distribute the program to service bureaus nationwide.)


Other improvements: A Measurement toolbar displays a selected object's size and

position, with clickable icons for rotating objects, adjusting text kerning and tracking, and changing line spacing. Publisher's template library now includes 50 new designs for one-page documents and 20 for catalogs and booklets. The program generates automatically bulleted and numbered lists the way Word does. However,

it lacks advanced alignment tools, and you can't open more than one document at a time.

Publisher 2000 will cost \$99 but will come bundled with the Premium, Professional and Small Business editions of Office 2000. It's worthwhile for anybody wanting to use professional printers without hiring a graphic artist or learning a more complex desktop publishing package.

Clean Your Clocks With Norton 2000

YEAR 2000

UTILITIES THAT CHECK to see if your PC is prepared for the much-dreaded year 2000 are a dime a dozen, but why stop there? It's just as important to make sure that your applications and data are secure. I looked at a shipping retail version of Symantec's **Norton 2000**, and found it significantly better than the earlier corporate edition (see "Software to the Rescue," January, www.pcworld.com/jan99/y2ktips), which provided cryptic explanations and missed potential problems.

Norton 2000 not only ensures that your BIOS knows what to do on the fateful New Year's Day, it also scans and analyzes applications and files that might contain time-sensitive data. Problem descriptions are in plain English, and the program can change the short-date format in Windows 95, 98, and NT from 2 to 4 digits. These improvements put Norton 2000 on a par with Greenwich Mean Time USA's Check 2000 PC Deluxe, the best of the Y2K packages that we reviewed in last month's issue.

Norton 2000 can't fix incompatibilities, but it does generate reports with suggestions. It excels at reporting potential problems in individual files, right down to specific cells and lines. It even makes color-coded annotations on spreadsheets.

Norton 2000 works with many popular business applications (Quicken, 1-2-3, Fox-Pro, Quattro Pro, Paradox, and Microsoft Access, Excel, Word, and PowerPoint). But it has nothing on home-oriented programs such as Quicken Family Lawyer, Quicken Es-

tate Planner, and Calendar Creator. Still, if keeping the data in your files is a priority, Norton 2000 should definitely be on your shopping list.

link that helps you manage paper forms in a busy computerized environment.

Teleform is a suite of modules that includes Designer, for creating forms; Reader, for translating paper forms into digital data; and Verifier, for correcting data entries. I examined a shipping version.

Think of the Designer module as a desktop publisher that's optimized to create business forms such as surveys, applications, and orders. The paper forms can accept either hand-printed or machine-printed characters and so-called mark-sense fields (blank circles or boxes filled in with marks as appropriate, such as *M* or *F* for gender). You can also easily convert the file for

your form into an HTML file for posting on the Web—a time-saver if you need paper and Web forms.

The Reader module interprets scanned and faxed images of completed forms. Optical character recognition is never 100 percent accurate, so Teleform passes the data from the Reader on to the Verifier, which highlights questionable characters. After entering the corrections, you can export the information to databases such as Microsoft Access.

Teleform Standard works with forms you design using the software. The Elite version also captures data from existing forms.

New in version 6 are a form wizard that makes it easier to

design forms; more form templates; and a spelling checker. This version is also Y2K compliant, so you'll want it if you plan to use the product in the next century.

Competitor JetForm's similarly priced Design 5.2 offers more design capabilities than Teleform, including greater multilingual support. But JetForm's app is oriented toward electronic forms and doesn't match Teleform's breadth of paper-to-database conversion features.

Teleform, which takes some time to set up and learn, is geared toward businesses that process 100 to 200,000 or more pages of forms per day. If you handle just a couple of dozen forms daily, you're better off sticking with manual data entry.

Flat Speakers Give Round Sound

SPEAKERS

NO DOUBT ABOUT IT: Thin is in. Along with flat-panel monitors and slimmed-down notebooks, wafer-thin speakers reflect that dictum.

Despite its name, there's nothing flat about Benwin's \$129 **Flat Panel BW2000** speakers, which deliver rich, full 3D sound. I tested a shipping version. Relying on licensed NXT audio technology, which uses complex vibrations in panels instead of the traditional pushed, pistonlike sound of conventional speakers, Benwin's units do not require enclosures to operate. The panels are mounted on sleek, sculpted plastic stands, and plug into a petite (but not flat)

desktop subwoofer that handles the deeper bass sounds. The subwoofer also includes the volume, tone, and power controls as well as a convenient headphone jack.

While the BW2000 speakers are designed for use with a computer, they can easily be attached to small stereo systems or radios. In my tests on a PC, I found the sound reproduction to be rich and crisp with excellent channel separation, particularly with popular music from audio CDs and the sound tracks of DVD movies. Classical music and some monaural .wav files, on the

other hand, sounded slightly muddy.

Because the flat-panel technology lacks a "sweet spot," I felt surrounded by sound no matter where I was in the room. And unlike many computer speakers, these devices come with enough cable to separate them by up to 15 feet, to create a truly panoramic soundscape.

With their attractively slim silhouette, which requires lit-

tle desk space, and their long cords, which let you place the units out of the way, Benwin's BW2000 speakers are ideal for cramped desktops—and they're reasonably priced. They will also appeal to the computer user who seeks 3D sound but doesn't want to invest in extra speakers.





IT'S NOT YOUR IMAGINATION: Things really *are* changing faster than ever. Take hardware, for example. The average new PC seems to have a shorter life span than a tsetse fly's. Office storage rooms are filled with great technological advances that never made it past version 1.0. As the unlucky souls who purchased them no doubt discovered, the road to PC hell is paved with good inventions.

But to paraphrase a certain software mogul, what about The Road Ahead? Can you avoid buying hardware that becomes obsolete before you've finished paying for it? Yes, you can—if you shop wisely. That's why we've produced this guide to the technologies and trends that will shape the design of PCs for the next three years.

Though predicting the future is a job best left to the Psychic Friends Network, it's safe to say you'll see smarter silicon packed into more stylish cases. More than two dozen new CPUs will appear in the next 18 months, along with fast new memory types and

data connections. PCs will look better (thanks to slim, affordable LCD screens) and listen better (using software that recognizes speech, gestures, and even eye position).

In fact, by 2001 you may not recognize PCs at all. Many will fit into the palm of your hand; nearly all will offer connections to the Internet and to each other. But the road ahead is also full of speed bumps, potholes, and blind curves. The following pages will help you navigate the hairpin turns of technology and show you what's on the horizon, as well as what's just around the bend. ►

More than Intel inside

CHIPS TAKE ON 3D, BUSES HIT 133, FAREWELL AGP?

By 2000, Intel's mainstream desktop CPUs will tick along at a torrid 700 MHz. But that's not the only change you'll find inside the box. The coming three years will see numerous new

processor families (see "CPU Road Map," below), a new memory standard, and perhaps an end to the motherboard as we know it. The enhancements will allow new PCs to handle the emerging tasks of the day—intense 3D graphics, full-motion MPEG-2 video, and applications like voice recognition.

The question is, will there be enough of these applications to justify the additional cost? "The amount of processing power that will be in place in systems at that point will be absolutely scary," says Nathan Brookwood, president of Insight64, a technology consultancy in Saratoga, California. "And if software developers

don't find a way to soak up all that power, it's going to be a really messy market. The performance available in low-end systems will be far in excess of what most people need for their jobs."

Brookwood adds that it could be years before apps that really tax the coming generation of hardware appear. "I expect that in 2002 we'll see the arrival of reasonable amounts of bandwidth making that last mile to the home and business. And in my mind, that will trigger a reevaluation of what people can do with PCs."

SWIFT SILICON

BROOKWOOD'S concerns haven't slowed Intel's rapid-fire introduction of new processors, nor will it keep the chip giant from making big changes to the PC platform. Later this year we'll see a new type of system memory called Direct Rambus DRAM (RDRAM) start to replace synchronous DRAM (SDRAM). Direct RDRAM memory uses a thin and fast connection to more than double the amount of data available to a PC's processor. MPEG-2 video, Accelerated Graphics Port-enhanced 3D graphics, and high-end imaging applications will all benefit from the faster RAM.

Alas, the performance boost will come at a cost. Brookwood expects both RDRAM chips and compatible motherboards to cost

CPU ROAD MAP WHERE THE CHIPS WILL FALL IN '99 AND BEYOND

YOU think the processor market is crowded now? Just wait. The next 18 months will see more than two dozen new CPUs from industry giants AMD, Cyrix, and Intel, as well as upstarts like Centaur and Rise Technology. These chipmakers will push speeds to a dizzying 700 MHz and beyond. Besides a blizzard of code names and buzzwords, consumers in 1999 will face a real choice: Pay more for performance or opt for cheaper chips that can still handle anything bread-and-butter business apps can throw at them. More buyers may choose the latter.

First out of the gate: 450- and 500-MHz Pentium II chips with Intel's Katmai instruction set, a successor to MMX that incorporates 70 new instructions to accelerate tasks such as 3D graphics and audio processing, speech recognition, and real-time MPEG-2

encoding and decoding. However, as with MMX, software must be optimized to take advantage of this technology. Don't expect such applications to appear overnight.

AMD FIGHTS BACK

AROUND THE SAME TIME, AMD will unveil its 400-MHz Sharptooth chip. Sharptooth may outperform Pentium II chips at equal clock speeds on productivity apps, thanks to an on-board 256KB secondary cache that runs at the CPU's full core speed. (The Pentium II's off-chip secondary cache runs at half the processor's core speed.)

Sharptooth and future AMD chips will also include the 3Dnow instruction set, similar to but not quite as ambitious as Intel's Katmai. 3Dnow is designed to speed up graphics in optimized applications such as games. In the second quarter of this year, AMD will ship its K7 chip, debuting at a speed of 500 MHz or more and supporting

a blazing 200-MHz system bus.

Meanwhile, Intel will bump Pentium II Katmai chips up to 533 MHz and introduce the 820 chip set, which will support a 133-MHz system bus. The following quarter, the chip giant will release a new line of Pentium IIs made with a smaller, 18-micron manufacturing process. These so-called Coppermine chips will run at 600 MHz or faster, and come with an on-board 256KB secondary cache that runs at full speed. Supporting chip sets will allow a 133-MHz system bus and memory.

FAST AND CHEAP

BUT IT'S NOT all about power. Expect plenty of action at the low end of the PC spectrum, as AMD, Cyrix, Centaur, and Rise Technology all try to undercut Intel's Celeron chip prices with low-cost processors of their own. The result? Surprisingly powerful desktops for \$699 to \$999.

Budget notebooks will also dip under \$1000 this year. Intel will release Celeron chips for laptops whose speeds start at 266 MHz; AMD and Cyrix will also ship low-cost notebook chips. But the major notebook news will be Intel's Geyserville technology, which will allow the processor to run at full speed when the machine is plugged in, and at a reduced speed on battery power. Look for Geyserville-driven notebooks to arrive in the third quarter.


As shown in the following pages, real competition—for price and speed—is brewing. If nothing else, the race among vendors to give you the most PC power for the money should be fun to watch. Expect glamorous speedsters to come and go, with no one processor lingering in the limelight. Consider this information carefully, whether you're shopping for a \$699 bargain or a \$2000 barn burner. —Laurianne McLaughlin

more than today's SDRAM technology, at least through 2000. As a result, he says, universal adoption of Direct RDRAM won't happen until 2001. Nonetheless, the technology has the support of key CPU players like Advanced Micro Devices and Compaq's Alpha division, making it a lock to succeed SDRAM.

Around the time that RDRAM gets its start, Intel will roll out a new version of AGP, the graphics-only bus that lets graphics cards call on system RAM to create highly realistic 3D images. AGP 4X will double the data rate of today's AGP 2X cards. The extra speed may help eliminate some delays that occur when AGP-enhanced games juggle detailed 3D scenes. Keep in mind that your mileage may vary.

Even though you'll need an AGP 4X graphics card to take full advantage of the new bus, most older AGP 2X cards should work just fine in the new slots, according to Niles Burbank, product manager for ATI Technologies, a graphics hardware maker based in Thornhill, Ontario.

By late this year, many lower-end machines will not have a separate graphics chip at all, as more tasks begin to fall directly to the chips attached to the processor. Intel's Celeron-based motherboards will begin using the company's forthcoming 810 chip set, which will include a built-in graphics controller. Likewise, Cyrix's MXi processor, which is expected to arrive this spring, will integrate a 3D graphics controller.

MOTHERBOARD MAKEOVER

THIS YEAR, for the second time in two years, Intel processors will boost the bus speed of high-end PCs. Newer chip sets like the one code-named Camino will rev the system bus from 100 MHz to 133 MHz for Pentium II lines, while Celeron PCs will be accelerated from 66 MHz to 100 MHz.

Even bigger changes are due in 2000 or 2001, when Intel is expected to shake up the current motherboard format, according to Peter Glaskowsky, senior analyst for MicroDesign Resources, a technology analysis firm in Sebastopol, California. The change will open the throttles on system bus speeds, further enhancing programs such as real-time natural speech recognition, advanced 3D modeling, and software-based MPEG-2 video playback. (Currently, you need an MPEG add-in card, but the speedier motherboards will handle video without the aid of extra decoder cards.)

Intel won't talk about its plans, but Glaskowsky envisions a motherboard that links components using thin and fast, point-to-point connections. Data will travel directly from system memory to the CPU, bypassing the chip set. The shorter wires and simpler data transfers will allow motherboard speeds of 200 MHz and beyond, says Glaskowsky.

The new type of motherboard will sport a high-end expansion bus that should run nearly ten times faster than today's PCI bus, Glaskowsky adds. This bus will likely supersede AGP and become the main conduit for graphics and even disk access. ▶

The shape of things to come

SHOEBOX PCs, SCREENS GO FLAT, PORTS GET FAT.

Your next PC will be speedier, more powerful, and better connected. Despite these improvements, you can expect these PCs to be smaller and less expensive than the one you now own.

The most obvious changes will be cosmetic. The iMac proves that PCs don't need to be boring and beige—but then again, not every Dell or Compaq box will be a translucent art piece either. Changes inside the case will give many systems a more svelte figure, says Carl Everett, senior vice president of the personal systems group at Dell Computer in Round Rock, Texas.

Everett says that by 2000, the archaic ISA expansion bus will be a not-so-fond memory. Freed of bulky ISA slots, vendors will be able to choose from smaller motherboards and experiment with stylish, space-saving PC designs. Miniaturization and market pressure will push the trend, says Martin Reynolds, vice president of technology assessment at Dataquest, a technology research firm in San Jose, California. He expects that by 2002, many desktop PCs will be as small as a shoebox.

GOOD-BYE CRTs: FLAT'S WHERE IT'S AT

THE PC'S SLIMFAST diet will really kick in with the next generation of displays, according to Everett. Today's bulky 17- and 19-inch CRTs can weigh 50 pounds and consume more than a square foot of desk space. LCD screens offer nearly all the dis-

play area of today's large CRTs, yet weigh one-fifth as much, take up a third of the space, and use half the electricity. They also display sharper graphics and induce less eyestrain than their CRT counterparts.

Today, a decent 15-inch LCD costs as little as \$900—cheap enough to make it an attractive buy for many desktop users. Unfortunately, a surge in flat-panel display sales will outstrip manufacturing capacity in 1999, says Ross Young, president of the research firm DisplaySearch in Austin, Texas. The result is that prices for 15-inch LCDs will drop only slightly—probably to around \$825—by the end of the year. Around that time, panel makers will begin to introduce 18-inch models, which will carry premium prices in the \$2000 range.

Another problem: The best LCD monitors connect digitally to your PC's graphics card to deliver crisp images. But you may have to wait before all graphics card vendors and LCD makers agree on a standard link. That means your next PC may need to use a proprietary connection to the graphics card.

"What you will see for the next year or so is the graphics cards and the flat-panel monitor will be sold together," says Micro-Design's Glaskowsky. A standard interface should emerge by the end of the year, says DisplaySearch's Young, making buying an LCD as easy as purchasing a CRT monitor today.

The future of displays looks brighter still: IBM Research Labs has demonstrated a flat-panel monitor that produces visual fidelity on par with printed paper. Phil Hester, vice president and chief technology officer for IBM's Personal Systems Group in Somers, New York, says the new technology will enable electronic display of high-resolution images for applications such as medical radiology and aircraft maintenance. "In two to three years, [the price for such a monitor] will drop to the point where you will consider it, but it will still be a premium display," he says.

PARING DOWN PORTS

YOUR NEXT PC will drop ports as well as pounds—and the ports that remain will run faster and act smarter than the ones they replace. Expect all new computers to ship with USB-compliant mice, keyboards, and other peripherals. Native support in Windows 2000 (aka NT 5) will also bring USB's benefits to many corporate and high-end PC users.

USB will have some company in the form of the IEEE 1394 bus, better known as FireWire. This ultrafast serial bus runs up to 100 times faster than USB, yet allows you to link multiple peripherals in a convenient, plug-and-play daisy chain. You will use FireWire for digital video capture, broadcast-quality digital video output, and high-speed disk drives.

In fact, the IEEE 1394 bus exists today: Both Sony and Compaq now ship consumer-oriented desktop computers with ports that support the bus. Sony has even added its own version of FireWire, called I.Link, to its newest VAIO PCG-505FX notebooks. However, Intel won't include support for the bus in its chip sets until mid-1999, says MicroDesign's Glaskowsky, and the cost of custom chips and connectors will make IEEE 1394 a bit player until about 2001. At that point, the new specification will replace both SCSI and IDE as the bus of choice for mass storage devices like hard disks and CD-ROM drives.

In the meantime, expect your next desktop PC to sport an updated IDE interface for internal drives. The ATA-66 interface—introduced by Quantum Technology to buy time until FireWire catches on—doubles the peak performance of current ATA-33 peripherals. But don't rush out just yet to get a new ATA-

66-friendly PC and compatible drives; today's ATA-33 storage devices provide enough performance for all but the most demanding applications.

USB and FireWire also set the stage for a standard called Device Bay, a modular, tool-free housing for plug-and-play peripherals. Need to work on that big 500MB presentation over the weekend? Just slide out your office PC's hard disk, as you would a removable car radio, and pop it into your home machine.

"I think that three years out we'll start to see a fairly significant penetration of Device Bay with IEEE 1394," says Dataquest's

Reynolds. "When we get down to just a couple of fast

tor of personal systems and advanced systems technology for IBM Research in Yorktown Heights, New York. "We are trying to bring the keyboard, the pen, the camera, and speech all together," he says. "There will be interfaces that observe you and track your eye position. One thing we're experimenting with at the moment is how to use cameras in children's educational games." Future multimedia titles will be able to detect whether children are paying attention to the game and then respond appropriately.

Users with disabilities will also benefit from interfaces that can recognize gestures. Smart software will allow PCs to separate normal human movement from command-specific gestures, says Morris.

Similarly, input devices will become more intelligent and more interactive. "We're definitely exploring what a mouse can do," states Dan Coyne, group marketing manager for Microsoft's Hardware Group. Coyne describes a mouse in development that lets users feel icons and links as the device is dragged over them.


As usual, gamers will get first crack at most of these new technologies. Microsoft's new Freestyle Pro game pad introduces motion detection to the mix. "When the game pad is tipped, it actually detects the movement," says Coyne. "So when you tip your controller to the right, the motorcycle actually turns to the right. As you instinctively move, it moves too."

NOTEBOOKS THIN IS IN

SEXY handhelds may get all the ink, but don't write off notebooks just yet. Stunning 15-inch LCD screens will entice many buyers to drop \$4000 or more on a notebook computer. But Peter Glaskowsky of MicroDesign Resources, a technology analysis firm based in Sebastopol, California, says such large-screen notes push the weight limit for most users. "[A 15-inch LCD] is physically too big for notebooks," he says. "The screens have to stay around 13 or 14 inches to give the notebook a manageable size and weight."

The 15-inch screen will find a home on desktop replacements—feature-laden notebooks that spend most of their time in the

office. For life on the road, buyers may opt for slick 3- and 4-pound portables such as Sony's magnesium-alloy coated VAIO PCG-505FX or Sharp's sleek, black, and brushed silver Actius. By year's end, 400-MHz Pentium II CPUs for portables with Katmai instructions will debut, while DVD-ROM and 100-MB floppy drives will become standard equipment.

But even though "thin is in," says Phil Hester, vice president

and chief technology officer of IBM's Personal Systems Group in Somers, New York, the need for touch-typeable keyboards limits how much notes can shrink. And don't expect big changes in battery life, warns Glaskowsky. Small gains will come from smart operating systems that turn off PC subsystems when idle.

Finally, Intel's Geyserville technology should enable processors to run at higher clock rates when notebooks are plugged in, allowing them to reach speeds that were once the sole province of desktop systems.

It's not for lack of alternatives. The Iomega Zip, LS-120 SuperDisk, and Syquest EZ Flyer drives have all tried and failed to replace the unsinkable floppy. Now Sony is pushing a 200MB floppy called HiFD, which is readable by new external and internal drives. "It's chaos," says Hester of IBM's Personal Systems Group. "The problem is that there are a whole bunch of very good disk storage technologies, many of which have reasonable market share. I think it's going to be something of a potpourri for quite a while."

According to Dataquest's Reynolds, CD-Rewritable is the most likely universal format, at least for the short term. CD-RW drives now sell for less than \$350 and will continue to drop in price, and nearly all PCs sold in the past two years can read CD-RW media. "My view is that eventually we'll see a DVD-ROM drive that's capable of recording CDs," says Reynolds.

One thing we definitely won't have to worry about is a storage

crunch. IBM's Hester says the data capacity of magnetic hard disks will continue to grow at its current torrid pace. By 2000 we'll see 50GB hard drives; by 2001 that number should increase to 75GB or 100GB.

Making the **right** connections

CABLE HOOKS UP, WEB APPS LOG ON, NET PHONES DIAL IN.

Yes, more and more users will retire their creaky analog modems in favor of fast cable modems and DSL (Digital Subscriber Line) devices. But the truth is, high-speed Net access will remain unavailable to most homes.

Even so, we'll all be doing more work online—from real-time banking and collaborative office apps to Web-based personal information managers and schedulers. And Internet phone service may finally become something to talk about.



In contrast, the other heralded high-speed network option—DSL technology, championed by phone companies—is expected to languish in the home market. “The [regional] Bell operating companies are trying not to cannibalize their T1 services, which are incredibly lucrative,” says Zia Daniell, an analyst in the telco and cable Internet strategies group at Jupiter Communications. Businesses today pay as much as \$1000 a month to lease a T1 line. Low-cost DSL services promise to deliver nearly equivalent performance for as little as \$40 a month.

Users in rural areas will rely on satellite services such as DirecPC for speedy Internet downloads, though uploads still require a slow modem connection. The picture gets brighter in 2003, when Teledesic launches the last of some 288 low-earth-orbit satellites; the low orbit allows upstream data to be sent directly to the satellite, resulting in cablelike data rates.

between the server and the client system are screen updates and keystrokes. Think of it as outsourcing IS: Small firms pay a low monthly fee to a provider, which manages the apps and servers. Meanwhile, Web-based services let individuals and groups post and share their schedules online. AT&T's PocketNet, for example, lets you upload data to the Web and then access it with a cellular phone. Pacifica Software's Web Calendar and Yahoo Calendar give you access to your Web-based schedules.

Applications will also become more Web savvy. Take Microsoft's Office 2000 suite: It offers HTML as a native file format; after you save a Word 2000 document to the corporate intranet, you can open the HTML file directly in Word to make changes.

Even your phone will go online, as telephone companies begin to deliver reliable, low-cost voice-over-Internet Protocol services. Once derided for its poor audio quality and lack of coverage, IP telephony is improving and expanding. More importantly, you no longer need a PC to make IP calls—you can dial a toll-free number, punch in your personal identification number, and then dial. Jupiter's Daniell says that consumers and small businesses will be the first to take advantage of Net phone services' lower rates. ▶


The incredible shrinking computer

SUBNOTES EMERGE, CELL PHONES AND HANDHELDS CONVERGE.

PalmPilot users display a cultish affection for their little handheld devices. Expect similar love affairs to bloom over the next two years, as cell phones, beepers, and personal digital assistants merge to form powerful communications tools.

But don't count out Jupiter machines yet. These small portable devices, which use the Windows CE Professional operating system, weigh about 2 pounds, provide 9-inch color screens, and

offer keyboards that are large enough to type on. At prices less than \$1000, according to Dataquest's Reynolds, these machines plug a gap between tiny handhelds and full-featured notebook computers that cost twice as much.

Hewlett-Packard, NEC, Samsung, and Sharp all market Jupiter devices (as they are code named) to traveling executives tired of hauling around an 8-pound notebook just to check their e-mail messages. CE Pro machines offer

instant-on operation and quick data retrieval, making them suitable for a wide range of applications.

HAND IN HAND

EXPECT TO SEE lighter, more powerful handheld devices equipped with sharper screens this year. For example, 3Com's next version of the Palm will reportedly offer a color screen in a case that is only one-third the thickness of its predecessors.

Cellular phones and personal digital assistants will also be getting cozy. Qualcomm's PdQ Smartphone, expected by the middle of the year, will combine a 3Com Palm III and a Qualcomm digital cellular phone. You'll be able to grab e-mail over the phone and dial directly from the Palm III address book.

The real breakthrough, however, may come in late 1999 to early 2000, when devices start using a wireless technology called Bluetooth. This industry standard will enable fast short-range communications between devices. Set your Bluetooth-capable palmtop device next to a similarly equipped PC, and they'll transfer e-mail and update contact lists at about 1

megabit per second. American Airlines and other airlines are talking about installing Bluetooth stations in airport lounges, so fliers can place their notebooks next to a transmitter and check their e-mail. Lee Green, director of corporate identity and design at IBM, envisions bigger changes: "At some point in the future, one version of a mobile device will be a wearable one." According to Green, everyone from surgeons

to archaeologists will be able to access critical information using such a PC. A tiny monitor mounted over one eye could display text and schematics, while navigation could be handled through voice recognition. Fairfax, Virginia-based Xybernaut is already marketing a wearable PC featuring a 233-MHz processor, 128MB of RAM, and a 4.3GB hard drive. You attach the 28-ounce processor unit to your belt; an optional keyboard can be strapped to your arm. The price? A fashionable \$5700.

Ultimately, new classes of portable devices will permeate our homes and workplaces, says Phylis Porio, IBM's director of marketing for pervasive computing. "[The lines between] people's business lives and personal lives are blurring more and more."

In areas such as entertainment, the lines may already be permanently blurred. Diamond's controversial RIO MP3 audio device plays back high-quality compressed music files that can be downloaded from the Internet. Recording companies, fearful that illicit downloads of commercially-available music will find a ready market in the MP3 platform, have tried to block the technology from getting to consumers. But digital content of all kinds will take similar paths to reach consumers in the coming years.

viruses in existence are variations on relatively simple themes. The most successful viruses either cause very little damage or include time delays that postpone their damage until days, weeks, or months after they infect your PC. One current example of the time-delay type—a variant of the CIH virus—activates on the 26th of each month and can destroy data on your hard drive. In part because of the widespread publicity it has generated, CIH has caused little damage so far.

Macro viruses are getting more destructive every year. Though most cause no systemwide data damage, macro viruses that affect Excel worksheets can wreak havoc. Case in point: XM/Compat searches Excel worksheets for unprotected data and then makes small, random changes to some data while keeping the number of characters the same. Though current antivirus software can easily detect XM/Compat and remove it, there's no way to fix the damage other than to restore the data from a backup—assuming you have one.

You probably hear episodically about new viruses, mostly via e-mail. But many rumored invaders are urban legends, and the warning message itself, as it gets forwarded and reforwarded, becomes like a virus. To distinguish the real from the mythical, check the U.S. Department of Energy's Computer Incident Advisory Capability Web site at ciac.llnl.gov/ciac, or the independent Computer Virus Myths site at www.kumite.com/myths.

COMMAND ANTIVIRUS, a simple product that does the job without a lot of fanfare, has one fatal weakness: It's so hard to update that we can't recommend it.

Formerly known as F-Prot Professional, this inexpensive (\$40) package matched McAfee and Norton in detecting 100 percent of wild viruses. Command ran into trouble repairing wild file and boot viruses, fixing the files only partially. But the

HELLO, CENTRAL: McAfee's VirusScan Central provides a handy remote-control-like panel that gives you easy access to program components and status messages through

program's performance with the common AntiEXE virus—which Command didn't automatically remove from the main boot record—emerged as a more serious deficiency. Though users can overcome the virus manually by booting from a DOS floppy disk and using the package's rescue disk, Command, unlike the other packages, doesn't create a bootable rescue disk at installation—an aggravating obstacle when you need fast help.

The Rise and Fall of a Macro Virus

Command's uncluttered, easy-to-use interface offers a solid set of crucial features, including extensive reporting options and a simple scheduler that lets you set up automatic, periodic, full-system scans. It's backed by nonstop toll-free support and one year of free updates. Alas, the complexity of Command's update process makes it a no-go for most users. The package reminds you when your virus signatures are out of date, but you must obtain a user name and password to access the latest code from the Web site. After downloading the updates, you have to wrestle with a complex definition-installation process that's explained only in the widely unread README file.

MCAFFEE VIRUSSCAN 4.0

PRO: Outstanding virus detection and removal, remote-control-like interface, easy to use

CON: Slowest scan time

AS MAKER OF one of the oldest and most popular antivirus packages, McAfee has a reputation for effectiveness and cutting-edge features to uphold. With the \$49 McAfee VirusScan 4.0, the runner-up to our Best Buy, it succeeds. VirusScan performed perfectly on wild virus detection (like Command and Norton) and repair (like Panda), and strongly on zoo viruses. Its one major drawback is scan speed; McAfee took two to three times longer to

scan a 1GB hard drive than the other packages. If you always schedule full-system scans for evenings and other off-peak times, this won't pose a problem, but if you want to scan during peak hours, you'll have a long wait.

A new remote-control-like interface called VirusScan Central makes navigating through McAfee's many features easy. Buttons that perform common tasks appear prominently in front, while other, less conspicuous buttons lead you to more advanced or specialized settings. Useful messages pop up each time you start VirusScan, reminding you to perform such common (and es-

sential) chores as updating your virus signatures. A simple wizard guides you through a multitude of settings and choices. The package actively scans all e-mail attachments and downloaded files before you open them, and it offers protection against the notorious ActiveX and Java applets; it even includes a miniature firewall that lets you block access to certain unwanted Web sites or IP addresses—a useful filter for parents. ▶

TIPS FROM THE REAL WORLD

Michael Brozovich, an Arkansas-based real estate broker, doesn't believe in using antivirus software. He thinks antivirus makers "use scare tactics to sell software" and is perturbed by antivirus software's "constant updates, potential conflicts with other software, and performance hits." Brozovich admits luck has contributed to his success in avoiding viruses so far. His "gospel rules":

- Don't accept disks from friends. Even well-meaning people can pass along contaminated files.
- Don't download Internet files, especially from newsgroups. If you must do so, take your chances with large commercial sites, which are more likely to check files for viruses before posting them.
- Don't open executable files attached to email. Just delete the messages.

TEST **HOW WE TEST** On a Compaq Pentium II-266 DeskPro PC, Joe Wells of the Antivirus Test Lab at Wells Research tested each package's ability to detect 80 wild boot viruses, 89 wild file viruses, 21 polymorphic viruses, 85 wild macro viruses, 6124 samples of 6124 zoo file viruses, and 4482 samples of 1736 zoo macro viruses; and to remove 17 wild viruses, including the 15 most commonly reported. Each test used the most current virus signatures available on the vendor's Web site as of October 6, 1998. Updating VirusScan is easy and automatic. A pop-up dialog box reminds you to refresh, supplying a button to connect directly to McAfee's Web site. If you want to receive updates as soon as they're available, McAfee will "push" updates directly to your PC via e-mail; none of the other reviewed programs has the same feature. The company claims to provide daily updates if the need arises and free signature updates "for the life of the product"—that is, until the next version of VirusScan comes out, when the format of the signature files may change.

NORTON ANTIVIRUS 5.0

PRO: Excellent virus detection and removal, effective new features such as Quarantine, improved interface

CON: Begins to charge for virus signature updates after one year

OUR BEST BUY in both last year's roundup and this year's, Norton AntiVirus remains a step ahead of its competitors with version 5.0. With top-notch protection, an idiot-proof interface, simple updating, and a wealth of truly useful features, it won easily.

Like Command and McAfee, NAV detected 100 percent of the wild viruses, and it found more zoo viruses than any other package (over 99 percent). The program produced two minor testing prob-

lems that shouldn't affect most users: It produced one false positive, reporting a virus when none existed. And it retains a design flaw we encountered last year: When we infected the main boot record, the package hung the system without telling us what to do. A working fix (which we tested) is available on Symantec's Web site.

Norton AntiVirus 5.0 includes several useful new features. The program now automatically detects malevolent ActiveX and Java applets—if they show up. The program's Quarantine

feature tucks infected files away in a protected area while you check online for a fix or contact Symantec tech support. Scan and Deliver encodes suspected viruses and e-mails them directly to Symantec's


AntiVirus Research Center for a possible fix. When the easy-to-install program finds a virus, it clearly shows you what to do; a new, cleaner interface puts major choices out in front, making its most frequently used features more accessible.

Updating NAV is simple: The program doesn't offer McAfee's push technology, but it will automatically download new signatures via the Internet or remind you when it's time to do so. Most conveniently, Symantec offers unique incremental updates, which download only the changes in signature files rather than the entire, time-consuming database. ►

TIPS FROM THE REAL WORLD

Larry Bridwell, product development manager at the International Computer Security Association, does research on viruses and anti-virus products. His advice:

- Be wary of e-mail attachments. If you're unfamiliar with the sender, don't execute them at all.
- If you download executable files from the Internet, Usenet newsgroups, or FTP sites, scan them in a safe area before executing.
- Keep your corporate policies up-to-date. Educate employees about virus dangers.
- Update your antivirus utility's signatures frequently—at least once a month.

One minor gripe: You get one year of free updates with NAV, after which you pay \$4 a year. Though this cost isn't wallet-busting—and you'll probably want to upgrade to a new version after a year anyway—it's a nickel-and-dime way to do business.

PANDA ANTIVIRUS 6.005 PLATINUM


PRO: Clean user interface, faster than any other package, easy to update

CON: Had problems detecting macro viruses, produced many false positives

ONE OF THE LEADING antivirus packages in Europe but new to the United States, Panda Antivirus fell behind the major domestic packages in our tests. Though the latest version of the product (6.005 Platinum) found every wild boot, file, and polymorphic virus, it detected only 94.1 percent of wild macro viruses, 81.3 percent of zoo file viruses, and 75.5 percent of zoo macro viruses—compared to zoo catch rates in the upper 90s (and 100 percent, or close to it, on wild macro viruses) for all the other packages. It also produced 19 false positives, far more than any other product we looked at. The company says it is working to improve the product's performance in connection with false positives and zoo viruses, and it will post a fix for the macro virus detection problem on its Web site by the time you read this.

On the plus side, Panda works quickly: Its scan time of just over 7 minutes was faster than that of any other product.

Panda Antivirus runs hot and cold in other

ways, too. Its well-designed interface features big, bright status screens that show you what it's doing at all times.

Unlike any other product, it scans at Internet protocol levels such as POP and HTTP, giving you extra protection. The company also provides all-hours toll-free support and free updates for the life of the product, and the simple updating procedure takes just the click of a button. But we found the main scanning screen confusing: It took us quite a while, for example, to figure out how to get the product to examine particular drives.

SOPHOS ANTI-VIRUS 3.13

PRO: Excellent virus detection, versatile scheduler, well-designed interface

CON: Expensive, complicated virus repair

SOPHOS CARRIES an excellent reputation for supplying antivirus software to large networked installations. But as a stand-alone product, Sophos Anti-Virus 3.13 proves a poor choice. Despite its high price of \$99—twice the competition's going rate—you get no updates. A version that does supply a single year of updates costs an outrageous \$249.


Sophos does a near-perfect job detecting both wild and zoo viruses, qualifying it as a top-notch performer in these areas. But when it comes to making repairs, the package is far less impressive: The company believes that you should never attempt to repair a file that's infected with a file virus (a belief few antivirus researchers share). As a result, Sophos Anti-Virus offers users only two corrective options: renaming the file (which makes it unreadable but stops the infection) or deleting it. In addition, Sophos's recovery from the boot sector virus AntiEXE was ugly, slow, and ultimately unsuccessful. After 45 minutes of complicated futzing, the product told us we had a virus—but it didn't offer any further instructions. The company says it is reviewing this problem. ▶

TIPS FROM THE REAL WORLD

Businessman David Allison, an inveterate computer tinkerer and "resident computer guru" for the Petal, Mississippi, Chamber of Commerce, reports that he's tried virtually every major antivirus program. He insists, "I've seen the cost of viruses and I don't want to pay it." His straightforward approach:

- Use common sense. You don't have to be careless because other people are.

- If you don't know the sender of an e-mail attachment, don't open it. Delete it right away.
- Immediately after you perform a full-system virus scan, make a full backup.
- Always scan a floppy disk as soon as you put it in the drive. If you find a virus, tell the person who gave you the disk.
- Be especially cautious about downloading files from newsgroups.

INDEFENSE

An Antivirus Utility With a Difference

BECAUSE IT'S A UNIQUE ANIMAL in the antivirus menagerie, we couldn't test Tegam International's InDefense like the other antivirus utilities. The product never needs virus signature updates—but even so, we can't recommend InDefense as your only line of defense.

InDefense builds on old techniques to protect your system against viruses. First it "vaccinates" all executable files on your PC, taking a snapshot of the file elements. This older technique is particularly good at detecting file viruses; since executable files shouldn't change, any modification is a strong symptom of infection. InDefense also looks for viral activity—a program's attempt to reproduce itself.

But InDefense has a catch-22. It assumes that you have a virus-free system before you install it, which is not always the case, even with a new PC. To use InDefense on any system you weren't sure was clean, you'd first have to run a scan with another antivirus utility.

Caution: Live Virus Tests. Because InDefense isn't a scanner, we couldn't use it to scan our system for viruses. Instead, we installed InDefense, activated a suite of live viruses, and then ran the program. InDefense stopped all 15 wild boot, macro, and file viruses we used. But unlike

other antivirus programs, the package assumes a high level of user knowledge, and often asks you to decide whether you've got a problem. For example, during our tests, one warning message read, 'If you know that the partition sector of your hard disk has been changed for normal reasons (i.e. OS upgrading), then press [A]. If it is due to a virus, press [R].' In dealing with macro viruses, InDefense presumes that all "uncertified" macros are viral and that all certified macros are clean, but this isn't always so. (You can certify specific macros that you've created yourself or that you otherwise know are safe; companies such as Microsoft also certify macros.) Though InDefense's interface is fairly straightforward, its dialog boxes and manual are almost impenetrable, written in a combination of technical jargon, marketing-speak, and bad grammar.

Not the Solution. Though we recognize that current scanning-style antivirus products aren't perfect and that they necessitate an endless parade of updates, we remain uncon-

vinced that InDefense offers enough protection for the average desktop computer.

TREND PC-CILLIN 6

PRO: Great interface, strong features, low price

CON: Prerelease version had trouble repairing a particular boot virus


EVEN IN ITS PRERELEASE state, PC-cillin's latest revision impressed us. Version 6 presents a clean, usable interface; several handy features; a competitive price (\$40 for a hard copy, \$30 for the download), and near-perfect virus detection. The only testing problem we saw was the program's failure during repair of a wild boot virus: The real-time monitor detected

the virus but offered no repair option, and a manual scan found no virus at all. Trend Micro sent a patch that fixed the problem; the fix will be included in the final version, due to reach store shelves in mid-January.


PC-cillin is packed with useful features. It's the only package we've seen that includes a wizard for setting up custom scan tasks, and the only one that uses Internet Explorer 4.0's Active Desktop for virus information. (Alternatively, you can obtain updates via the straight-

forward Update Now or Update Later buttons, or you can instruct the program to check for updates regularly at a preset time, such as 10 minutes after you start your system.) Like McAfee VirusScan, PC-cillin protects against destructive applets and blocks access to unwanted Web sites; like Norton, it offers a quarantine feature that shunts infected files into a protected and isolated area from which the infection can't spread. All this is especially impressive when you consider that the downloaded version of PC-cillin is the cheapest product here.

DVD for a spin

SAY DVD, and most people think of movies on disc that you rent at your local video store—but this new format means business, too. The same technology that paints the *Titanic* vividly across your TV screen is also surfacing in PCs; one out of five desktop computers that *PC World* receives each month for review has a DVD-ROM drive. And we're finally seeing business software shipping on this high-capacity format.

"The trickle of DVD-based productivity programs will become a steady stream in the next few years," says Dataquest's Mary Bourdon. We found that you can prepare for the influx ►

DVD isn't for everyone. But if you want your PC to be ready for the software of the future and the latest Hollywood blockbuster movies, we'll steer you in the right direction.

with little effort or expense. DVD-ROM discs have over seven times the capacity of CD-ROM discs (4.7GB compared to 650MB)—enough space for vendors to include appealing extras like multiple camera angles and language tracks. And based on our tests with real-world applications, the latest DVD-ROM drives play CD-ROM discs with no performance hit. If you install an MPEG-2 decoder (either a PCI board or a software package), you can even watch DVD movies. The cost can be minor: You can upgrade to DVD-ROM for as little as \$50 over the price of a CD-ROM drive.

If you are like many people, you're probably overwhelmed by all the optical options: Should you stick with your CD-ROM drive, or move to a DVD-ROM drive that also read CDs? Should you opt for a writable drive, such as CD-Rewritable or DVD-RAM? If DVD-ROM makes the most sense, should you get a kit with an MPEG-2 decoder card, or one with software decompression? Which kit is the best?


We speed-tested the bare DVD-ROM drives from Creative Labs, Hitachi, Sony, and Toshiba (prices range from \$102 to \$135). We also installed and tested DVD-

ROM kits (which include a DVD-ROM drive plus an MPEG-2 decoder board) from Creative Labs (\$250), Hi-Val (\$279), Newcom (\$229), Pacific Digital (\$229), and Sony (\$349). Finally, to compare DVD per-

DECISIONS, DECISIONS

DVD-ROM MAKES good sense if you're a business user who wants to be ready for the next generation of DVD-savvy software,

though, it's not for everyone. Despite reports of CD-ROM's imminent demise, many people will be perfectly content sticking with that venerable format. Very few business titles are available on DVD; at press time, we found only three: Phone-Disc's PowerFinder, a nationwide phone directory; DeLorme's AAA Map'n'Go, a

route-planning program; and Microsoft's Encarta multimedia reference title. Furthermore, if you want to cut your own disks or use your drive for system backups, neither CD-ROM nor DVD-ROM will do; you'll need a writable format such as CD-RW (see "Write On"). Finally, you pay an extra premium for DVD-ROM. You can get a fast CD-ROM drive replacement for \$50; even a bare-bones DVD-ROM drive costs at least \$100.

If you use your PC for business only, and your 4X or faster CD-ROM drive works fine, sit tight—and check DVD-ROM prices again in six months. Ditto if you're buying new PCs in volume (say, ten or more) on a tight budget. But if just a few of the CD-ROM drives in your office fleet need replacement and you have a little extra in the budget, consider DVD-ROM drives without add-ons such as an MPEG-2 decoder, especially if you'll be installing the drives in newer PCs. If you want to play games or watch movies after business hours, and your PCs are equipped with a 333-MHz Pentium II or faster processor, look for DVD-ROM drives with software-based MPEG-2 decoders (\$149 and up).

MY OFFICE, MY HOME

IF YOU RUN A SMALL OFFICE or home office, DVD-ROM holds even more appeal, especially if your PC doubles as an entertainment station. You might play an occa-

nightmare, so make sure the vendor you buy from offers good support. That's the main reason Sony's DDU-220E/H5X DVD-ROM kit captures our Best Buy, in spite of its hefty \$349 price. Sony offers around-the-clock help, and it's the only company whose support technicians answered our calls right away. This kit also produces near-flawless DVD video and audio output and gives you the best software bundle, which includes Funk & Wagnall's Unabridged Encyclopedia on CD-ROM.

sional DVD game while you wait for a late-night fax to arrive, watch a movie on your PC, or even attach a cable to your TV so the family can enjoy the movie (see "Battle For the Boob Tube"). And since you're probably outfitting only one PC, you may not mind paying a little extra for cutting-edge features—especially if you're looking to replace a slow or broken CD-ROM drive.

Once you opt for DVD-ROM, you must figure out whether you need a hardware or a software decoder. If you plan to watch DVD movies on your TV, consider spending the \$229 to \$349 on a DVD-ROM drive kit with an MPEG-2 decoder board. The kit is especially recommended for PCs running at 300 MHz or slower, since effective

software decoding requires a Pentium II chip running at 333 MHz or faster. Also, a decoder board sends sharp images to your TV via a cable; software-only decoders force you to use output from your video card, a setup that often yields poor video quality. But if you've already shot your budget on a fast PC, consider a DVD-ROM drive with a software decoder, particularly if you don't need to display video on your TV.

If a new PC figures in your small- or home-office plans, we suggest spending an extra \$150 to \$300 over the standard CD-ROM configuration to get a DVD-ROM drive and a preinstalled hardware decoder board. You can't usually choose which make of DVD-ROM drive your vendor puts into your PCs, but chances are good you'll get Toshiba's SD-M1202 or Hitachi's GD-2500, both of which performed very well in our tests. ▶

Even if you don't need hardware-based MPEG-2 decoding now, we still recommend paying the extra money if you think you'll *ever* watch movies or play DVD games during the computer's lifetime. Installing these boards yourself can be a harrowing experience.

AND THE WINNER IS . . .

OF THE FIVE KITS we reviewed, the Sony earns our Best Buy, despite its high \$349 price. It installed without a hitch, ran perfectly, comes with the best software bundle

here, and puts out great video and audio. And Sony delivers the best support of the bunch—a crucial consideration, in light of the setup hassles you may encounter.

That said, the Sony's not the top pick for *all* users. Tech-savvy users on a budget—especially those who don't mind spending time on the phone troubleshooting—should look at the Newcom and Hi-Val kits, too. The \$229 Newcom is one of the lowest-cost kits in the roundup, and Newcom offers a software MPEG-2 decoder as a \$149 alternative to the hardware kit. The \$279 Hi-Val also yields first-class images and sound. On the other hand, Pacific Digital's kit is simply not ready. Until the company upgrades its hardware and support quality, pass it by.

Anatomy of a DVD-ROM Kit

CHOOSING THE top DVD-ROM drive kit means balancing price, features, performance, ease of installation, and support. Prices vary considerably—from \$229 for the Newcom kit to \$349 for the Sony. The most expensive kit, the Sony, turns out to be the best buy for most people.

Kit features don't vary significantly. All kits contain a DVD-ROM drive, a hardware decoder board, and an assortment of software titles. The Hi-Val, Newcom, and Sony kits all use Sigma's Hollywood Plus MPEG-2 decoder board. (Hi-Val also offers a \$428 version of its kit that lets you transmit video from your PC to a TV screen that's located elsewhere in the house.) ►

Write On!

THOUGH DVD-ROM and CD-ROM are the most popular optical drive formats today, neither of them let you burn your own discs. If you need to back up data files, create distribution discs for your own software, make audio CDs, or copy CD-ROM discs, check out two writable formats: CD-Rewritable and DVD-RAM. Both formats are gaining presence in the marketplace, both let you read from and copy to optical discs, and both are great for making backups.

Still a CD World

BY FAR THE MORE MATURE and prevalent of the two drive formats, CD-RW makes the most sense if you want to distribute discs now. CD-RW drives sell for as little as \$300 and let you burn both write-once CD-R discs and rewritable CD-RW optical discs. CD-R discs hold special appeal because they can cost as little as a buck apiece, and most PCs can read them. Rewritable CD-RW and DVD-RAM discs cost a lot more (\$10 to \$15, and \$20 to \$50, respectively), and you'd be hard put to find other machines they work in.

But a CD-RW drive isn't everybody's solution. These drives don't support the DVD-ROM format or play DVD games and movies. In addition, although they're fast readers, CD-RW drives are relatively slow writers: Copying a CD-ROM can tie up your PC anywhere from half an hour to half the afternoon. Even so, if you're interested mainly in creating your own discs, the slow writes won't cause much



of a problem, and restoring data from a CD-RW backup is often faster

than using a tape or Zip drive. But if you want to back up very large files or make an exact copy of your hard disk, you may be happier with a higher-capacity solution such as a tape backup drive or a DVD-RAM drive.

Since DVD-RAM's arrival last summer, it has offered many of the advantages of DVD-ROM, including the ability to run CD- and DVD-based software. It stores up to 2.6GB (296 minutes of audio) per side, more than four times the capacity of CD-R and CD-RW discs. These capabilities make DVD-RAM tempting for users who could really sop up the extra space, such as those who back up lots of data files or who want to create large multimedia files (training applications, say) with different languages and multiple

views or camera angles. But get ready for sticker shock: These drives sell for a steep \$500 to \$1000.

DVD-RAM's main competitor, Sony's DVD+RW format, promises excellent backward compatibility with DVD-ROM drives, faster writing speeds than DVD-RAM, and up to 3GB of storage per side—slightly more space than DVD-RAM. The first DVD+RW drives are due out this summer; industry experts predict

that prices for the drives and discs will be similar to those for DVD-RAM. But

you won't be able to read a DVD-RAM disc on a DVD+RW drive, or vice versa. In addition to Sony, Hewlett-Packard, Mitsubishi, Philips, and Ricoh plan to ship DVD+RW drives.

DVD Will Dominate

RIGHT NOW CD-RW boasts the most talent: It's the only drive able to burn cheap CD-R discs that are readable by almost any PC. But if you want to perform big backups, have a big budget, and don't need to distribute discs, take a hard look at DVD-RAM. Which format will prevail? With demands for faster, higher-capacity drives growing every day, the eventual standard will almost certainly be based on DVD technology. For more information, see this month's *Top of the News*.



matching connectors. You may have to change the preset master-slave jumper on the new drive when you're first installing it. Otherwise, setting up your DVD-ROM drive is a breeze.

Installing MPEG-2 hardware decoder boards is another story. When you choose a kit, we strongly recommend you buy one backed by the best support available and a no-fee, unconditional money-back guarantee. For the most part, our installations went smoothly, but we tested the kits on a new Dell Dimension PII-333 with plenty of empty slots and two or three free hardware interrupts. In a more typical scenario, a *PC World* editor encountered so many problems trying to install the Hi-Val kit on his own Dell Dimension PII-300, his ten-day money-back period expired before he could get them resolved. In that instance, reps suggested a wide range of complex fixes, from upgrading the PC BIOS to upgrading the DVD-ROM drive BIOS, to swapping around IRQ and memory ad-

resses manually. He never got the problem resolved. Vendors themselves confirm that your experience could be nasty: "Even people with engineering backgrounds have problems," said one vendor spokesperson. "It's supposed to be plug and play, but far too often it's plug and pray."

Of the kits tested for this review, Pacific Digital's gave us the most headaches. The company failed to in-

clude a cable needed to connect the decoder board to the system video board. (A not entirely helpful support rep told us to count the pins on our video feature connector and buy a cable at Radio Shack.) Pacific Digital includes a driver disc, but when the installation crashed, a different rep explained that some driver discs had been shipped without drivers. After we grabbed the drivers off the company's Web site, the player loaded, but it crashed again as soon as it tried to play a DVD ▶

But when we played movies through a software decoder, they stuttered, froze, and dropped frames while the CPU struggled to keep up. Now, finally, high-octane processors make watching movies on a PC through software DVD an enjoyable experience.

Software DVD MPEG-2 decoders, which include movie playback controls, offer many

benefits. For starters, they're a lot cheaper than hardware decoders. Some vendors, like Dell, even include a software player gratis when you buy a new PC with a DVD-ROM drive. Better yet, software DVD spares you the installation woes associated with a decoder board. And if your PC has a fast CPU, a software decoder can work *better* than a board-based kit. Its main drawback: You may not be able to send decent DVD images to a TV screen. Most images from video boards with TV-out connections lack the crispness of video from a dedicated decoder board.

Many of the most popular movie playback utilities, including the one from Newcom that we tried, are based on Zoran's SoftDVD Navigator. We installed the software easily, and it worked perfect-

ly from the get-go. Movies and games looked terrific on our Pentium II-333 system: no lost frames, distortions, or jaggy patches. To our eyes the image looked virtually identical to the one produced by Sigma's Hollywood Plus MPEG-2 decoder board, and the stereo sounded fine.

SoftDVD Navigator controls functions such as play, stop/pause, fast forward/rewind, and audio volume. In fact, some functions worked smoother on the Zoran player than on DVD kits we tested that use hardware decoders.

Bottom line: If you've got a high-end PC and don't need to display video from it on your TV screen, go for a software-only DVD solution. Software DVD costs less, is easier to set up, and—if you can supply the processing power—offers impressive image quality.

disc. After two days of struggling, Pacific Digital's support department gave up, compelling us to do likewise. We ultimately tested the drive's performance without the decoder board installed. (A decoder board doesn't affect drive performance; it only decodes the MPEG-2 video that the PC reads off the disc.)

WHAT PERFORMANCE ANXIETY?

JUDGING BY THIS CROP of kits, optical-drive speed isn't an issue for most buyers. It's just as well, because vendors' speed ratings don't always match what you'll get. As long as the DVD-ROM drive is rated at 2X or higher for DVD, you'll be fine.

Most software titles ship on CD-ROM discs, so you need a DVD-ROM drive that measures up to standard CD-ROM performance. Not to worry: The most-common CD-ROM drives do perform slightly better than the DVD-ROM drives we tested (with the notable exception of the speedy Hi-Val), but the differences are too small for most people to notice. We also found no great differences in DVD-ROM performance among the kits.

In the CD-ROM realm, each X represents 150 kilobytes per second of data transfer from the disc; each DVD-ROM X equals 1350 KBps. In theory, the more X a drive offers, the faster it transfers data—

but you'd never know it judging by the results of some of our real-world application tests. For example, the drives rated at 20X and 24X for reading CD-ROM discs generally outran Creative Labs' PC-DVD Encore 5X kit, rated at 32X.

To see how CD-ROM drives and DVD-ROM drives stack up against one another, we timed how long all the drives took to complete our CD-ROM application tests (we included times for our CD-RW and CD-ROM baseline units). We installed Microsoft Office 97 Professional, timed the creation of a cross-country trip using DeLorme AAA Map'n'Go, searched for phone numbers on PhoneDisc Power Finder, and ran a 100-photo slide show from Corel Photo-CD Labs 2.0. For the DVD-ROM drives, we repeated the PhoneDisc and AAA Map'n'Go benchmarks using these applications' DVD-ROM versions. ►

Battle for the Boob Tube

YOUR VCR HAS been doing the job for years, but who doesn't want better video quality? Dedicated set-top DVD players provide great images and sound, but they cost \$400 and up. What about a PC-based DVD kit, which promises the same video quality for less than half the cost? Hook up a few cables from your computer to your TV set, and you can start a collection of DVD movies with the \$200 you save. And you get a nice PC upgrade in the bargain.

Tape Versus Disc

TO TEST THIS ALLURING scenario, we arranged a shoot-out between a VCR, a DVD player, and a DVD-ROM PC with a Sigma Hollywood Plus MPEG-2 board. First we threw some popcorn into the microwave. Then we dragged a small jury of *PC World* editors away from their deadlines and forced them to watch Jim Carrey's *The Mask* on a TV screen in three formats: VHS, DVD player, and PC-DVD. We compared sharpness, steadiness, color saturation, and ease of control.

The DVD player emerged the victor. Viewing a DVD film, regardless of the source, is vastly superior to watching it on a VCR. The VHS tape, fresh out of the shrink-wrap, still produced much fuzzier pictures than DVD.

To our surprise, the quality of the video reeling off the PC-DVD drive matched what



we saw from the stand-alone player, except for a small band of jiggly video at the bottom of the frame. It was the humble remote control, however, that swayed us to the stand-alone player. The player comes with a remote, something we wished we had with the PC-based DVD-ROM unit—especially since our PC wasn't in the same room as our TV set. To take a break during the movie, we had to run into the den, hit the pause button, and rewind a little to make up for the time it took us to pause. When we were ready to resume watching, we had to go into the den again and then race back to the living room. We also found

that switching video output between the PC monitor and the TV sometimes caused trouble. Occasionally we lost the DVD menu, menu choices quit working or disappeared, the PC's monitor went blank, or the PC crashed. Another time we had to reinitialize the Hollywood Plus player defaults. If you've got a roomful of kids waiting to see *Lion King*, this is not the way to run a movie theater.

TV Versus PC

IF YOU DON'T MIND watching movies on your PC's monitor, so much the better. DVD movies look great when played on a 17-inch monitor set for 1024 by 768 resolution, viewed from a distance of 5 or 6 feet. When you display DVD on a TV, you see scan lines, and tiny chromatic flaws where one bright color moves across another; the PC monitor displays a perfect image, much like a movie screen does. On the other hand, colors on the monitor appear paler than those on the TV. And of course, if you and your family prefer to sit more than 6 feet from the screen—say, on a sofa across the room from a bright, big-screen TV—your PC monitor can't compare.



In the Photo-CD Labs and two Phone-Disc tests, all drives finished their tasks within a few seconds of one another. We found greater differences in the Office 97 installation tests: Creative Labs' drive took over a minute more than the average bundled CD-ROM drive to install Office 97. While this difference is noticeable, it usually doesn't matter. Most users spend very little time installing large applications.

We did see a big speed gap when plotting travel routes using the CD-ROM version of DeLorme's AAA Map'n'Go. If you use travel-routing software frequently, either stick with a fast CD-ROM drive or upgrade to the DVD version of this route planner. Using the CD-ROM disc, the Hi-Val DVD-ROM kit aced this test, plotting our route in a little less than 3 minutes; the average CD-ROM drive took a little under 4 minutes. Meanwhile, our Best Buy Sony DVD-ROM kit took almost 6.5 minutes to complete the same task. Using the DVD-ROM disc,

however, the Sony drive finished the same task in only 48 seconds—the fastest time of all the drives that we tested.

OPERATORS NOT STANDING BY

WE GOT THE DVD kits working without much hair-pulling, except for the Pacific Digital. But numerous factors affect how easy or hard it is to install decoder boards, including the video card you use and even the BIOS versions of the PC and DVD-ROM drive, so many users won't get off so lightly. Many of you will need support—and our own calls show most of you will have a tough time getting it.

cases, getting through to a live person was an ordeal. Even Sony, which answered all our calls instantly, accidentally dropped us once and never called back.

Still, that's better than our experiences with Sony's competitors. When we called Hi-Val's support, we always had to leave a message, even during standard business hours. The first time, a rep called us back 2 hours later; our next call was returned after 7 hours. We fared worse with Creative Labs: After many busy signals, we final-

The support policies look solid. Sony offers round-the-clock help, and all the companies but Pacific Digital provide at least some weekend hours. But looks can be deceiving: We called each firm at least twice and found that even the best support—Sony's—is far from ideal. In most

ly got a voice-mail menu that kept us on hold for 16 minutes before a rep picked up. Newcom was worse still: After three calls, one disconnect, and nearly an hour and a half on hold, we got voice mail telling us to leave a message. We finally heard back from tech support the next day.


Almost all the technicians we spoke with were courteous, but some of them provided little or no help. The Sony, Creative Labs, and Hi-Val people were on the money every time; Newcom's reps were right once, wrong once. Pacific Digital's support technicians spent two days trying to help us get the decoder board working before they finally gave up, muttering vaguely about undocumented Windows error messages and incompatibility issues with our video board.

BUY NOW, PLAY LATER

WHEN YOU GET DOWN TO IT, few people really need a DVD-ROM drive—yet. But if you're buying a new PC or have to replace your CD-ROM drive, DVD-ROM's appeal grows stronger by the day, thanks to dropping prices and the imminent arrival of more business-oriented DVD titles. And if DVD games and movies make your heart beat faster, so much the better. Many people today routinely pop audio CDs into their PCs. Before too long, you may be doing the very same thing with your favorite movie.





ALMOST EVERY PHOTOGRAPH can benefit from a quick fix. If your company's CEO has bags under his eyes, you can make him look more alert before you pop his image onto the Web site. If an overexposed photograph makes your home's paint job appear washed out, you can tweak its brightness before you print the real estate brochure.

Thanks to photo-editing software, you don't have to hire a graphic designer to make simple changes to a photo; now you can fine-tune images to your liking. But the range of features each tool offers (and the quality of the finished product) can vary widely, and there's no fair way to compare the simplest applications with office-oriented tools. So we looked at nine programs—from basic packages designed for non-graphics pros who occasionally need to touch up digital photos, to high-end designer tools with additional features that cost far more—and we awarded two Best Buys: one for the top basic-level tool, and another for the program that offers practically every feature an intermediate user would want, for a great price.

Each application underwent the same testing. Here we categorize each program by how well it performed the tests, how much hand-holding it does, and how

FOR BASIC IMAGE EDITING, we recommend Microsoft's \$49 Picture It 99. Its numerous how-to wizards not only assist in the completion of tasks but also educate users about the process of basic photo editing. Picture It's bargain-basement price and ease of use compensate for its inability to perform some tasks in our advanced tests.

Intermediate users willing to trade hand-holding wizards for finer control will appreciate the \$79 Paint Shop Pro 5 application from Jasc. This useful tool easily completed all our tests, and it offers the intermediate user a wide variety of design features that go well beyond simple photo cleanup.

much control it offers. We classify seven products as basic-level tools: They offer a simple, friendly interface and wizards to guide users through a touch-up process, but they may not be able to perform some tasks. The other two—Jasc's Paint Shop Pro 5 and Ulead's PhotoImpact 4.2—are intermediate packages; they're designed for experienced image manipulators who would rather have a finer level of manual control than wizard-based automation.

If you need (and can afford) more than these packages provide, take a look at "Kings of the Hill: Pro-Level Tools" on page 174 for evaluations of three advanced utilities that are appropriate for graphic designers.

CHEAP DOESN'T EQUAL EASY

THE GOOD NEWS FOR small-office and home-office users: None of the programs we evaluated will set you back more than 100 bucks. Adobe PhotoDeluxe Business Edition and Ulead's PhotoImpact 4.2 top the price list at \$99 and \$100, respectively. At the low end, The Learning Company's PhotoFinish 4.1, which costs a mere \$40, is the cheapest of the bunch.

But price is a poor indicator of a tool's abilities. The \$49 Picture It 99 earns a Best Buy, while MetaCreations' \$44 Kai's Photo Soap is one of the toughest programs to use. Photo Soap's deceptively beautiful interface can (initially) distract you from the fact that most of its slider controls have no identifying text or tool tips; finding the desired control involves a lot of trial-and-error. (MetaCreations says that an upgrade to fix some of Photo Soap's deficiencies should be available soon after you read this.)

Adobe PhotoDeluxe is a remarkably versatile tool for basic photo editing that also

contains a significant amount of built-in wizard assistance. The package is relatively expensive at \$99, but PhotoDeluxe handily completed our range of basic and intermediate tasks, and it also includes templates that allow you to tackle common design projects like creating business cards and brochures.

But despite Adobe's years as the leading maker of photo-editing software, we found that unless you rely heavily on its wizards, PhotoDeluxe is not very easy to use. Most of its powerful tools are fairly

well hidden within layers of menus. On the other hand, Jasc's \$79 Paint Shop Pro 5 includes comprehensive documentation that shows you how to get to every tool. And Microsoft's Picture It 99 uses a practically idiotproof interface to point you to tools that are every bit as full featured as those in PhotoDeluxe. Other basic-level products made certain tasks easier, but Picture It performed consistently well in all our tests—and it costs about half as much as PhotoDeluxe.

Adobe's product is one of several moderately priced applications that can perform more-advanced tasks. Corel's Photo House 2.1, Jasc's Paint Shop Pro 5, and Ulead's PhotoImpact 4.2 also give you freedom to grow. The Best Buy contest in the intermediate category was a fairly close call between Paint Shop Pro and PhotoImpact. A superior manual and somewhat better price earn Paint Shop Pro the intermediate user's Best Buy. PhotoImpact follows closely behind.

Nearly every package we tested can finish simple tasks like these, though our tests show significant differences in the ability of basic-level programs to perform even the most elementary jobs. Jasc's Paint Shop Pro 5, our intermediate Best Buy, did the finest job, but among basic tools, Picture It did best consistently.

All the programs offer some level of automatic picture adjustment, but we found that most automated processes produced images that looked worse than the original. The automatic tool in Picture It yielded washed-out images, but you can customize its changes with sliders.

Jasc's Paint Shop Pro 5,

MGI's PhotoSuite 8.0, and Ulead's PhotoImpact 4.2 all provide one feature we like—a thumbnail-image preview of your changes shown alongside the original image. By comparing pre- and post-change images side by side before you adopt the change, you can decide whether the modifications you're making to the image are excessive. Surprisingly, this convenient before-and-after comparison isn't a standard feature among low-end photo-editing tools. Picture It, for example, shows you a preview of the post-change photo but doesn't display the original.

All nine programs make short work of flipping the image horizontally. But PhotoDeluxe complicates the process a bit by placing its Flip Horizontal option in the ominous-sounding Advanced Tools section. And if you want to rotate a photo, you also have to root around in Advanced Tools instead of using PhotoDeluxe's intuitive Size/Orientation tool. Organizing basic tasks like these in the Advanced Tools category might discourage some beginners from trying them.

SHARPEN AND TRIM AND TRANSLATE—OH MY!

MOST PACKAGES' tools couldn't sharpen a specific area of a photo—they could only modify the entire image. Unfortunately, sharpening the whole photo often worsened the overall visual effect, by giving ▶

HOW WE TESTED IMAGE EDITORS

TO PUT EACH OF THE PROGRAMS through its paces, we shot task-specific digital photos with an Olympus D-500L digital camera set at 1024 by 768 pixels, the camera's

highest possible resolution.

Our first series of tasks consisted of common jobs like adjusting the contrast and brightness of an image, and creating a mirror image. Our basic tests used a digital photo of a woman, taken in bright sunlight in front of a plain white wall. Intermediate tasks involved



touching up blemishes in a photo of a car, and adding text along the bottom to create a for-sale flyer. Advanced tasks included removing the image of a palm frond from a photo of a building, pasting a resized cutout image of the woman from the first photo so she appears in front of the same building, blending the images together, and then optimizing the photo for Web publishing.

the image a rough, grainy character. Post-op pictures sometimes looked as if they had been rubbed against a stucco wall.

But that wasn't the case with either of our Best Buys. Picture It can sharpen images beyond the recommended range, but it doesn't make the whole image grainy—instead it leaves a hard, dark line around objects. Paint Shop Pro's sharpening tool works like a dream: Finished images look crisp, even when subjected to the highest sharpening setting.

Of the basic assignments we gave these programs, the task of performing cutouts proved the most challenging. Among lower-price programs, only MGI PhotoSuite and Picture It made managing cutouts easy: As you move the cursor around the image you want to cut out, the program deduces where you'll likely cut the image, and places an outline accordingly.

Paint Shop Pro includes a Smart Edge tool that automatically molds itself to the outline of a figure as you click around it. (Higher-end products like Micrografx Picture Publisher and Adobe Photoshop 5 offer similar features; for more information, see "Kings of the Hill: Pro-Level Tools." In Photoshop's supremely simple solution, you just move your cursor around the figure—without clicking—and the program calculates the edge.)

The remaining tools use one of two cutout methods. With the "anchor" method, featured in LivePix Soho, Paint Shop Pro, PhotoDeluxe, and PhotoImpact, you click at points around the edge of the image, and the program adds adjustable anchors

that let you create a clean, fine-tuned outline. A less-appealing method has you select a lasso (or outline) tool and then precisely drag a line around the object—a tedious, near-impossible mousing task with all but the most basic shapes.

Converting our test image into a GIF file tended to be a more straightforward task. GIF images are blessedly small, thanks to a relatively small palette of colors, and therefore load quickly, making the format a favorite of Web producers. Most programs handle this job exactly as we expected: Using the *Save As* menu item, you pick the file type you want from a list.

Some programs have features dedicated to fine-tuning files in a specific format. For example, PhotoImpact's Web Smart-Saver converts files to GIF and other Web-based formats, and allows for all kinds of

need to perform minor touch-ups to photos, or want a tool that has templates for work projects like business cards

an intermediate program like Jasc Paint Shop Pro 5.

dream of artistic creation but have a limited budget to work with

a less-costly advanced program like Micrografx Picture Publisher 8.

have the eye of an artist and the wallet of a Rockefeller, or plan to create or edit high-end photos and graphic art

a super-advanced program like Adobe Photoshop 5.0.

important color and file adjustments.

A few programs make file conversion unnecessarily difficult. Saving a GIF file in Corel Photo House 2.1 requires you to drop the color palette manually down to 256 colors using Print Office (another program in the Corel suite); most programs perform this task automatically. If you need to do more editing, you have to reopen the image in Photo House—an annoying detour that Corel says will be unnecessary in the next version of the product, due out by the time you read this. And Metacreation's Kai's Photo Soap can't make the conversion at all without special plug-in software (MetaCreations says the capability will be integrated into an upcoming version).

Midrange Magic

OUR INTERMEDIATE-LEVEL touch-ups centered on a picture of a red sports car. Our test—preparing a for-sale ad flyer—required two steps:

- ▶ removing visible evidence of the car's dings, dents, and scratches
- ▶ adding attractive "For Sale" text across the bottom of the photo

Though neither of these tasks is terribly complex, both take more photo-editing firepower than you might suppose. Most of the programs were equal to the occasion, but some offer the user substantially more control than others. Ulead's PhotoImpact took the crown in this category of tests.


PAINT MAGIC

EVER TRY MATCHING PAINT in real life? You think you've selected the right hue only to discover after it dries that it's just a shade off. Well, it's exponentially harder to match colors in a photo, mainly because there isn't just one color. The red of our test image's car, for example, actually consists of thousands of different shades that commingle on its surface, making it hard to select one color for fixes.

Fortunately, all the programs we looked at come with robust tools for repairing scratches on your photographs. Some packages, such as PhotoSuite and Photo

House, can correct scratches and dents automatically, but manual tweaking produced better-looking results (as it did with their automatic contrast and brightness wizards). The custom tools fall into two general categories: touch-up and cloning.

The touch-up tools allow you to choose a shade from somewhere on the photo—generally using an "eyedropper"—and then select another tool (such as a paintbrush) to place a droplet of that color in the right location. But unless the color that you designate with the eyedropper matches the surrounding area exactly, the repair will look like a large block of the same color—and be obvious to the eye. A smudge tool often works better on the more uniform areas of an image than the eyedropper does. Rather than selecting a specific color first, you use a smudge tool to wipe across the area you want to fix with a color from an adjacent part of the image, as if you were applying a damp sponge.

Paint Shop Pro's unique smudge tool lets you smudge with any color, whether it's adjacent or not, giving you increased control; most of the other utilities just pull the color from the pixels that surround the smudged area. And if you want to use

the color that's right next to a fix-it spot in Paint Shop Pro, you can always select a pixel of color from the surrounding area with the eyedropper tool.

CLONING AROUND

CLONING TOOLS let you select one section of a photo and copy it to other sections—a particularly handy option when a fix requires a range or gradation of colors. All cloning tools operate in much the same way: You set the cloning origin location, then paint a clone of that area in the destination. In our tests, we selected a part of the car that roughly matched the area

near the scratch, cloned it, and painted the clone over the scratch. The best cloning tools—such as those in PhotoFinish, Paint Shop Pro, and PhotoImpact—allow you to change the size and shape of your brush to make detailed repairs.



TOUCH-UP TRICKERY: Picture Publisher lets you select a color from the image to touch up the digital paint job. But you may have some explaining to do when the buyer sees the real thing.

Some programs' touch-up tools are irksome. PhotoDeluxe, for example, requires you to navigate interminable menus to make each individual fix. LivePix Soho's troublesome cloning tool didn't always work as we expected: Sometimes the original cloned area maintained the proper relative distance from the destination, but often (and unpredictably) it would zoom off in a different direction, painting a black patch on our image's red car. ▶

The jury's still out on the superiority of cloning versus touch-up. Picture It includes two kinds of touch-up tools that, when used in combination, cleaned up our image with ease. The program's automatic touch-up function allows you to attempt a patch simply by clicking on the area that you want to fix; the program then estimates a correction. This feature makes acceptable fixes over large areas,

but it encounters problems when it undertakes smaller types of touch-ups. For these more-exacting repairs, the Remove Scratch tool enables you to draw fine lines over parts of the image.

Nearly all of the programs include straightforward text tools: Click on the text button; enter your message; change the font style, size, and color; and voilà!—you're done. Some of the packages, how-

ever, present additional hurdles and oddities. In PhotoSuite, for example, you can't create text in the same window where you edit your photos; you have to make the change in the Project window—an unnecessary inconvenience. And you can't change the color of text in Paint Shop Pro once it has been added to the image. So choose wisely: If you pick the wrong text color, there's no going back.

KINGS OF THE HILL: PRO-LEVEL TOOLS

BESIDES EVALUATING tools that specifically target small-office and home-office users, we looked at three photo-editing and design applications intended for use by graphics professionals. Adobe Photoshop 5.0, Corel's Photo-Paint 8, and Micrografx's Picture Publisher 8 all work hard to woo design pros and technically adept hobbyists.

So what's the big difference between these Olympian rivals and their reasonably priced cousins? Not surprisingly, with advanced tools, ease of use often falls by the wayside. The pro applications offer several layers of menus that amount to literally hundreds of options. And while these packages permit an impressive number of adjustments, the programs seemed confusingly complex: Even when we were sure a photo editor could perform a specific function, we couldn't always figure out how to activate the feature. These packages also require a more solid understanding of the technical aspects of digital imaging and image editing.

If you plan to create high-end art and photographic images, Adobe Photoshop emerges as the clear winner in the features race. Even though we tested a relatively narrow range of photo-editing capabilities, it became clear that this package offers great depth: Leonardo would have been satisfied with the fine-tuning and tinkering it makes possible.

Even our most advanced photo-editing tasks didn't scratch the surface of the pro tools' capabilities: All three offer high-level image design functions, as well as features for touching up and manipulating pictures. But to compare these high-priced marvels of technology with their country cousins, we put them through the same trials.

SKIMMING THE BASICS

THE ADVANCED TOOLS sailed along where some SOHO tools could only dog-paddle. Every product we tested performed our basic tests, but Photoshop earned the best overall score here, including a perfect rating for its sharpening tool. Photoshop also has some automatic tools, but the custom tool is all you'll need. It brought our test image into focus without making it look too sharp or pixelated (photo-editing neophytes may find themselves clutching the manual as they



make adjustments). One nuisance we noticed: Neither Photo-Paint nor Photoshop can save a photo as a GIF file until the program converts the image to an 8-bit color file, a task most other photo editors handle automatically.

MASTERS OF MANIPULATION

PHOTOSHOP AND Picture Publisher offer better cloning tools than our basic Best Buys; Photo-Paint, however, doesn't fare as well. Its clone tool appears straightforward, but reset-

ting the target area proves more difficult than with the other programs. Picture Publisher lacks a feather feature, though you can simulate a degree of blur around the edge of the image by using a camera-aperture effect.

PRO PHOTO TWEAKING

ALL THREE UTILITIES completed the advanced tasks, but with varying degrees of ease. Both Photo-Paint and Photoshop offer a vignette effect similar to Picture It's soft-edge finish. Photo-Paint lets you change the shape of the border—to add an elliptical effect to a rectangular photo, for example. Picture Publisher offers somewhat less control over the final product but managed to produce a similar image in our testing.

TIME EXPOSED

IF YOU DECIDE to invest in a high-end photo editor, prepare yourself for an enormous hit to the wallet. Photoshop will set you back at least \$650. And though Corel's and Micrografx's applications are less pricey, all three present a steeper learning curve than you'd experience with the other tools we tested. Don't expect to use any of these advanced programs effectively without training; more often than not, finishing a job requires a lot of know-how.

Advanced Projects

OUR ADVANCED TEST involved creating a photomontage of a woman in front of a building. Though no program won hands-down, Paint Shop Pro and PhotoImpact did the best job with the advanced tasks:

- removing a palm frond that obstructed the view of the building's clock tower
- using darkening and lightening tools to alter areas of the photo
- adding and resizing the image cut from another photo
- feathering the background of the image to create a sense of depth
- reducing the number of colors in a GIF image, permitting a smaller file
- altering the compression settings of the photo and saving in JPEG format



TEXTURE TRICK: To bring out some detail from the shadows, we used Paint Shop Pro's texture tool and painted the underside of the arch with large bricks.

LEAF BURNING, ARCH DODGING

REMOVING THE palm frond from our test image required tools and techniques similar to those we used to erase the dings in the car photo, but this task relied more heavily on cloning tools. The toughest part involved removing a blade of the palm frond that partly blocked the clock tower. Most of the frond hung against clear blue sky and was relatively easy to clean up.

But some of the leaf dangled in front of the building itself, blocking part of a narrow wrought-iron railing—a dramatically more complicated removal. Luckily, most of the cloning tools were up to the task, as long as we handled them with sufficient caution and precision. Picture It faltered a bit on this job: It cloned the leaf out of

the picture, but it also altered the surrounding sky, which ended up a shade lighter than it should have been.

Darkening or lightening specific areas of the photo proved significantly more difficult for most of the programs. Neither LivePix Soho nor PhotoDeluxe was able to accomplish this task at all, though the other basic-level programs provided some way to lighten (dodge) or darken (burn) sections of an image. But our photo test required us to lighten the excessively shadowed archway of the building we photographed. None of the available methods were simple. In Photo House, for example, we selected the eraser tool and adjusted transparency settings so as not to erase too much color.

Paint Shop Pro has the best dodge tool of the bunch. In most of the other programs, adding light under the archway caused the whole area to appear smudged. But Paint Shop Pro lets you add light over a texture, much like making a rubbing of a name from a monument. We decided on the large-brick option as the image's texture—it's one of several dozen textures available in the Jasc package—and gave the building a realistic stone-block appearance.

With the exception of Kai's Photo Soap, every one of the programs capably added the cutout figure to the new image, but again with differing degrees of difficulty. Professional-level tools like Photoshop let you manipulate the edges of dropped-in images to help them blend more realistically with the background. Of the basic- and intermediate-level packages we examined, only PhotoSuite offers capabilities comparable to Photoshop's.

Our next task was to feather the background of the image—adding a textured edge so that the image would appear to have a border and some additional depth. The applications provided some interesting (and surprising) options for achiev-

ing the desired look. LivePix, Picture It, and Photo House are limited to creating a soft edge around the entire image, imparting the appearance of an old-fashioned vignette photo. Other programs approximate a real feathering effect: Kai's ▶

Photo Soap, for example, includes a frame that adds a smoky black edge; and PhotoImpact offers a series of frames that have different border options.

Three of the programs we looked at offer less-than-impressive feathering tools. PhotoFinish's effect simply didn't work at all, and PhotoSuite's process proved to be unnecessarily complex. The procedure consists of a frustrating four-step process. First you have to jump from the photo section of the program to the project section; next you're required to pull up a frame, add the frame, and finally send the rest of the photo behind the frame. Since a frame is essentially just the area surrounding the outer edge of an image, the designers of PhotoSuite could have programmed the frame so that it automatically sat on top of the image.


Even the versatile Paint Shop Pro photo editor could not easily create a feathered effect—a rather glaring weakness in this otherwise solid and straightforward program. Paint Shop Pro's convoluted, tiring process forces you first to painstakingly create a transparent feathered effect and

then to choose a foreground color in order for the effect to appear on the image.

WORKING THE WEB

THE FINAL TWO TASKS of our test suite required the programs to optimize the color palette in a GIF file and change JPEG compression settings—both impor-

though, this strictly-for-business tool lurks under the Fun Effects menu in Photo House. The precise tools in PhotoImpact enable you to specify the exact number of colors needed for optimum viewing. Although it includes a number of other high-level functions, Paint Shop Pro lacks palette optimization features.

tant capabilities for Web publishing.

Only three of the programs that we review here—Paint Shop Pro, Photo House, and PhotoImpact—provide users with a way to optimize color palettes. Oddly,

Almost all the programs we looked at for this article let users tinker with JPEG compression and quality ratios. The exception is Picture It, which saves files in JPEG format but lacks custom settings.



TINKER TOOLS

OF THE DOZEN programs we tested, only Kai's Photo Soap is a one-trick pony—it only lets you touch up your photos, nothing more (and it doesn't even do that very well). The rest of the programs offer extra features ripe for the picking. Cool effects filters can change the entire look of your photo, giving it the appearance of an impressionist landscape, say, or dripping wet paint. Other tools can make your photo appear to be composed of a mosaic of smaller images, sketched in charcoal, or drawn on a wad of just-uncrumpled paper. Micrografx's Picture Publisher 8 stands out in the special effects ranks; its Effects Browser generates thumbnails of multiple effects in one window.

Advanced programs allow impressive control over effects. If you want to create a mosaic effect using Adobe Photoshop 5, for example, you can change not only the size of the tiles, but also the color and thickness of the grouting between them. But simple editing applications have some nifty extras as well. They include task-oriented project templates, notably lacking in the more-advanced programs. For example, Picture It offers templates for flyers and business cards and lets you mat your pictures, much as a frame shop would. Similarly, LivePix Soho, MGI PhotoSuite 8.0, Adobe PhotoDeluxe Business Edition, and Corel Photo House 2.1 feature business-oriented templates, generate on-the-fly slide shows, and can store images in searchable albums (which are useful for archives of related images).

CLOSING THE SHUTTER

MOST BASIC photo-editing programs handle the common tasks adequately. You can avoid the complexity and higher price of an advanced photo-editing application by sticking with tools that focus specifically on the jobs that most home or small-office users perform: adjusting contrast and color, and cropping images. These tasks demand only a basic-level program, especially if you lack an artist's ability.

But if you seek more control, invest in an intermediate-level photo editor. The affordable Paint Shop Pro can perform most standard business tasks well. On the other hand, if you're resolutely determined to use Photoshop for every job, prepare to spend a lot of money—and a lot of time—learning to use its high-end features.





Trading Places

The Top Online Brokers

Point, click, trade—

these three little words sum up the allure of online stock brokers. Using nothing more than an Internet connection and an account with an online broker, you can buy and sell shares of stocks and mutual funds with mere keystrokes. No waiting to place an order with a brokerage house, no high commissions gobbling up big pieces of your nest egg.

Little wonder, then, that 6 million plucky investors have already exchanged the security of traditional brick-and-mortar brokerage houses for the promise of cheap, fast online transactions and reams of late-breaking information about the hottest properties on the market. But is the trade-off worth it?

UNDERCOVER TRADERS

POSING AS ORDINARY investors, we opened accounts with eight online brokers: market leaders Ameritrade, Charles Schwab, Datek, DLJdirect, E-Trade, and Waterhouse, as well as promising upstarts Discover Brokerage Direct and Suretrade. At each site, we tested how easy it is to open an account, place a stock trade, and get help. We pestered each firm's customer service department via e-mail and by telephone, both while the market was open and when it was closed. We also gauged the site's ease of navigation and the usefulness of its stock research tools.

We discovered that no broker has it all. Your choice will depend on what's important to you. If you need a little hand-holding, you'll want a firm that excels at customer service. If you want fast, no-nonsense stock trades, look for a broker that caters to frequent traders. And if you crave the cheapest trading, be



prepared to wing it when it comes to getting answers to your questions. Check out "What Kind of Broker Is Right for You?" on page 180 for our recommendations based on four different investment strategies—one of which is probably yours.

GOING FOR BROKER

IF YOU THINK you can start trading as soon as you finish this article, think again. While some brokers, like DLJdirect and Suretrade, don't require a minimum deposit to open an account, most want at least \$2000, and they don't take plastic.

Allow at least five business days for your check to arrive and clear before your account gets started. The only exception: DLJdirect lets new customers trade as soon as their accounts are approved, usually within seconds of applying.

You'll probably need an hour or two to find and decipher the brokerage's minimum deposit requirements, fees, commissions, and account terms. Discover and DLJdirect were the best at providing this information; at E-Trade and Suretrade, we couldn't find it easily. But once our deposits had landed, trading was easy. In most cases, our initial order to buy shares of stock was filled in mere seconds—before we could even move from the confirmation screen to the order-status screen.

Of course, the more you trade, the more you pay in commissions. That's why low-cost Web brokers are attractive to investors who trade a lot. Instead of the typical \$100 to \$175 fee a traditional broker charges, you can pay anywhere from \$8 per trade (Ameritrade and Suretrade) to \$30 (Schwab). A limit order, which designates the maximum price you're willing to pay for a stock, might cost a few dollars extra. And with most online bro-

kerages, placing trades by phone—via an automated system or by talking to a flesh-and-blood broker—will run you a bit more.

One great advantage of online trading is easy access to more reports and charts than you'll find in any discount broker's office. Though this information is available elsewhere on the Web for free, the best brokers merge it directly into your portfolio display—offering links to quotes, charts, and news of your holdings, so you can keep tabs on your investments. Charles Schwab, Discover Brokerage Direct, and DLJdirect are the best at integrating research into customers' portfolio views.

And keep in mind that though we only rated brokerages on their stock trading capabilities, you might also want to consider how a firm stands up when it comes to mutual funds, bonds, options, and other investments. If you're looking for a place to park your retirement funds, all of these firms offer IRA, Roth IRA, and other retirement accounts—just watch out for the annual fees that are frequently charged for these plans.

HELP WANTED

WHEN IT COMES TO PROVIDING HELP, nearly all the firms could use a lesson in customer care. Few of the brokers responded to our e-mailed questions in what we considered a timely fashion. The best of the bunch was Charles Schwab, whose representatives even telephoned us in response to one of our e-mail inquiries. At the other end of the spectrum, Suretrade's software system sent back immediate responses to our questions, but they were nearly always wrong or incomplete.

We also spent an average of 5 minutes on hold waiting for

customer service representatives, no matter what time of day or night we called. But once we were connected, most representatives were knowledgeable and helpful, if sometimes hurried—more than a couple rushed through our call.

IS YOUR MONEY SAFE?

IF THE THOUGHT of spending thousands of dollars trading stocks over the Web makes your stomach flutter, relax. All online brokers require that you use a secure browser to connect to their sites, so information flowing between the broker and

your computer is encrypted, and thus protected from prying eyes on the Net. Since brokers send funds only to an account's address of record, the account can't be raided. "The worst thing any hacker could do is make malicious trades," according to Steve Hall, senior analyst with Gomez Advisors, a financial services research group.

If you're concerned about getting online on a busy market day, don't worry. Most Web brokers provide online service guarantees, in which the online rate is honored

if the network goes down and you have to make a phone call. (Sometimes, of course, the market is downright volatile. *PC World's* Web site—see the box above left—has more on the ability of online brokers to handle such crises.)

Keeping these assurances in mind, we jumped feet first into the trading pit. Despite the occasional annoyance, we found online trading to be relatively painless. And while no online brokerage excels in all areas, we'd happily give up trading by touch-tone phone or talking with a live broker for the ease and speed of placing orders with an online outfit. ▶

WHAT KIND OF BROKER IS RIGHT FOR YOU?

THE FIRST QUESTION you should ask yourself before taking the online stock trading plunge is, "What kind of investor am I?" Once you determine what your personal investment style is, you can choose a brokerage firm that best complements your trading habits. Here are four types of investor and the road we think each should travel.

THE NEWBIE



IF YOU'RE new to the Web or new to investing, a brokerage site's overall service is the most important factor. A firm with highly rated customer service can help ease your nerves as you get started: Charles Schwab and Waterhouse might be good bets in this area. And if the Web still throws you for a loop, look for a site that offers telephone trading at no additional charge. The tops in this category are E-Trade and DLJdirect.

THE BUY-AND-HOLD TYPE



DO YOU BUY stocks for the long term? A \$30 commission on a stock you own for ten years won't dent your overall returns much. Since you'll want to do extensive studies of stocks or mutual funds before buying them, a site's research tools should be the most important factor in your choice. Charles Schwab and Waterhouse are great places to get the lowdown on potential purchases.


THE ACTIVE TRADER



DO YOU buy and sell stocks at least once a week? If so, low commissions could save you big. Just remember that frequent trading can be costly in other ways. Investors typically lose a few cents on each trade due to the "spread" (the difference between the selling and purchase prices of a

stock), which is pocketed by the brokerage. Look for a broker that offers "price improvement," in which the firm executes trades in alternative markets to get the best share prices. For the frequent trader, we like Datek for its near rock-bottom commissions and trader-friendly practices.

THE DELEGATOR



IF YOU don't think you've got what it takes to manage your own portfolio, a full-service bricks-and-mortar brokerage firm might be your best option. Though well-established firms like Salomon Smith Barney and Merrill Lynch don't broker trades online, they do offer online access to account information and background research. Still, most of your interactions will be face-to-face or on the phone with a personal account executive who can help with any financial questions you might have—from managing your portfolio to planning for your estate.

Ameritrade

A SQUARE DEAL

AMERITRADE IS a study in contrasts. Its opening pages are bold, colorful, and slow to download, but inside, the pages are sleek and stark. It offers one of the lowest minimum commissions around, but hidden fees quickly raise the ante. And though the site is festooned with testimonials from satisfied customers, its customer service policies are less than ideal.

The best part of Ameritrade is access to MarketGuide research, which includes a free stock screening tool and regular data updates. Unfortunately, there's no way to get information about a company from all of Ameritrade's research suppliers at once. And while the site features daily commentary from Andrew Tobias, one of the most knowledgeable financial writers around, you have to dig to find his daily gems.

Still, Ameritrade's \$8 commission for online orders ties with Suretrade's for the cheapest of the bunch. When you use the touch-tone service, the commission is \$12, and it jumps to \$18 if you place your order with a broker directly. Limit orders cost \$5 extra. Three of the firms in our survey charge extra for limit orders, and those little charges start to add up after a while. But because Ameritrade's fee schedule is buried, it's hard to know how much an account might cost you.

Ameritrade's customer service also seemed wanting: We're still waiting for a response to one of our e-mail queries. Phone service was better, but we were dismayed by some of what we heard. When we asked what would happen if Ameritrade's servers were down when we wanted to place a trade, the agent

said we could use the brokerage's touch-tone system or talk with a broker directly. Fair enough, but Ameritrade doesn't honor the online rate in that case. All the other brokers we surveyed assured us they'd honor the lowest commission if their technical problems prevented us from trading. For cautious investors, the less-than-friendly "market meltdown" policy might tip the scales against this otherwise decent site.

Charles Schwab

MR. POPULARITY

TAKING THREE times as many online trades a day as the next most popular site, Charles Schwab is the undisputed king of online brokers. Why do so many investors like Schwab? One reason is that the brokerage firm offers white-glove treatment, including discounts on commissions and the chance to participate in IPOs, for active traders and customers with big accounts.

Schwab's online securities research is another. Just type in a ticker symbol, and up pop news, charts, analyst and industry reports, earnings estimates, and updates on insider trading activity. You can find this information elsewhere on the Web, but you won't find it arranged as intelligently as it is at Schwab.

Of course, these extras will cost you. At a minimum of \$30 a trade, Schwab is the most expensive of the brokers in our survey. It also requires the highest minimum initial investment (\$2500) and levies a maintenance charge on accounts that are smaller than \$10,000. If you don't have at least \$10,000 to open a stock trading account, you should probably avoid ►



the firm—commissions will eat up too much of each purchase. If you do have \$10,000 to invest, you'll like Schwab's sensibly arranged order-entry screens, rapid confirmation messages, and customer service. We received timely responses to our e-mail inquiries—an agent even called us to respond to an e-mailed question three times, at work and at home. We did pretty well using the phone, too. It took an average of 11 minutes during off-peak hours and 2 minutes during the market day to reach agents, but they wasted no time answering our questions. And if you really need help, you can drop by one of Schwab's 270 branch offices and talk with someone face-to-face.

Datek
FAST COMPANY

IF YOU WANT your hand held online, steer clear of high-powered Datek. You won't find much in the way of research tools here, and it can be costly to place a trade with a real person. But Datek's claim to fame isn't customer-friendly accoutrements, it's speed.

Hard-core traders will appreciate the Express Server interface, which skips the standard "Are you really really sure you want to make this trade?" confirmation screen. For the less confident investor, Datek also offers the standard trading interface, as well as a "classic" interface free of fancy graphics.

If you place an order with Datek and it's not executed within 60 seconds, the commission fee is waived (assuming, of course, that the order is marketable). And Datek will honor the \$10 online commission rate if the network goes down during trading hours and you're forced to place an order by phone. If your own ISP ever fails, Datek provides a dial-up number so you can connect directly to its servers.

Customer support was pretty peppy, too. We got answers to some—not all—of our e-mailed questions within two business days, and the customer service people picked up the phone promptly, rattling off answers as fast we could ask the questions. With this emphasis on getting down to business, the site won't win any design awards. But it is easy to navigate. And if you feel the need for speed, Datek can't be beat.

Last December Datek announced plans to operate its Island trading network as a stock exchange. If that happens, customers might be able to get even better prices on stock trades, an important consideration for frequent traders.



TRADE SECRETS: TIPS FOR WEB INVESTORS

KEEP THESE TIPS in mind as you plan your online investment strategy:
Lower your costs. A good rule of thumb is to keep the cost of trading below 3 percent of your total investment amount.
Watch for Y2K bugs. Because the online brokerage industry is so new, it doesn't make much use of older systems, which can be riddled with millennium (year 2000) bugs. But these sites do interact with other computer networks that could have problems. Protect your investments by making sure your broker is Y2K compliant. Some firms, like Charles Schwab, publish a statement of their

Y2K readiness on their sites. If they don't, then find out what their policy is.
Be redundant. Open brokerage accounts with two or more companies and have a backup ISP available in case you can't dial up your usual provider. (Many ISPs offer limited-access accounts for \$5 to \$10 a month.) That way, you will always have solid backups in the event your online broker or ISP fails you.
Plan for Armageddon. For days when the market goes haywire, choose a broker with a



"market meltdown policy" that offers telephone trading at the same price as online trading, or will waive the difference if you can't log on to the site.

Stay on top. For updates on Web-based investing houses, visit Gomez Advisors, a research company that reviews and ranks online brokers. You can find the Gomez scorecard at www.gomez.com. And while you're surfing the Web, check out the site managed by Don Johnson, an independent investor. You can find his "Discount Stock Brokers Ranked" report at www.sonic.net/donaldj.



Discover

ROCKY START

DISCOVER BROKERAGE DIRECT is a site with big ambitions. An ad campaign last fall suggested that by trading with Discover, you could

earn enough to buy an island. But we hit some choppy water. For one thing, it took more than a week of e-mails, calls, and faxes to activate our account. Once it was open, we found some things to like. For instance, it's easy to customize your home

page with specifics about your favorite stocks, market indexes, and account information: Just point and click the items you want to see when you log on. And news, charts, reports, and quotes are available from your portfolio view. You can also purchase stock reports.

The order-entry screen was logically arranged, and our order was filled within two minutes. But at the confirmation screen, we had to scroll down to get details on our trades, listed in hard-to-read rows.

Discover's online and touch-tone commissions start at \$15 for a market order and \$20 for a limit order. But if you place a trade by phone, the commission jumps to 1.5 to 2 cents per share (depending on whether the stock you trade is listed on NASDAQ or an exchange), with a minimum of \$34.

Since Discover Brokerage Direct is owned by investment bank Morgan Stanley Dean Witter, we won't write off the site's chances for success. But it's hard to find many compelling reasons to fall in with Discover at this stage of the campaign.

DLJdirect

LIKELY TO SUCCEED

OF THE FIRMS we looked at, DLJdirect would have been "Most Likely to Succeed" in high school. Lean, good-looking, and a little aloof, the site took home mostly Bs on its report card, an occasional A, and only a few low grades.


The site's design made it easy to log on, move around, and place an order. But attractiveness comes at a cost: The site's reliance on graphic buttons and menus can slow things down—not a strong point for the active trader.

The application form, however, is good for those who want instant gratification. Upon completion, your account can be approved for trading, with no minimum opening balance. If your credit is

good, you can buy and sell stocks in seconds. Within a few days, you'll receive a form to sign and return with a check.

Our trade order was filled almost at once. The minimum commission is \$20, whether you trade by modem or phone. DLJ's telephone representatives, all licensed by the National Association of Securities Dealers, were helpful, and wait times were average—around 5 minutes—no matter when we called. But we never got a response to questions we sent by e-mail.

DLJdirect's selection of research tools, midrange commission rates, and 24-hour weekday phone access might be just the right mix for slower-paced investors. And if you have \$100,000 or more in an account, you could get in on the ground floor of an IPO offered by DLJdirect's parent company, the investment bank Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette.



E-Trade

IT AIN'T EASY

E-TRADE WANTS to be all things to all people. In addition to trading, the site offers a range of investment ideas, message boards, and other freebies to anyone looking to improve their financial well-being. But all these extras also make trading on the site a much more complicated affair than it needs to be.

E-Trade tossed a surprising number of obstacles in our path. Casual visitors must register as "members" to access some of the financial research tools. But if you decide to become a "customer," then you might have to memorize a cryptic new user name and password (as we did). And anytime we moved from a customer area to a member area, we had to log in. Worse: We also had to enter a password every time we wanted to buy or sell a holding. (Suretrade is the only other broker in the bunch that requires a separate trading password.) Still, minimum commissions are a flat \$15 for online or phone transactions, and the trading screens are intuitively organized.

Once we had all our passwords and user names straight, we were able to access E-Trade's research tools. By entering a stock's ticker symbol into a search field, we tapped into nearly 20 pages of detailed reports and charts, mostly provided by Disclosure's Baseline service. But to get real-time stock quotes, we had to fill out another registration





form. E-Trade does provide unlimited stock quotes once you do register—a bonus most other firms don't offer.

We spent more time on hold when calling its customer support line during the market day than at any other firm—over 10 minutes. Even so, the reps were knowledgeable

and helpful, and e-mail support was better than most brokers'. ceremony when it comes to customer service. The brokerage's e-mail support is based on a software program called "the Brain," which sends automated responses to questions. The answers we got from this "smart" software were laughably bad and consistently unreliable.

On a positive note, Suretrade charges no fees for extra services, including the issuance of stock certificates. But that's unlikely to convince most investors that Suretrade is a sure thing.

and helpful, and e-mail support was better than most brokers'.

With practice, a user could get used to E-Trade's registration levels and multiple passwords. But in the competitive Net broker business, we wonder how many will want to.

Suretrade NOT A SURE BET

SURETRADE EMPHASIZES no-frills services at a minimum commission of \$8. And no frills is what it delivers.

Opening an account at Suretrade is tedious work. You can do it on the site, but you have to fill out a long form, and then print, sign, and return an online service agreement along with your check. Suretrade then requires five business days for your personal check to clear. So while you can open your account right away, expect to wait another week or two before you can make your first purchase.

We also found it hard to navigate the site. Each area uses its own navigational buttons, links, and menus. And the research tools—a mix of resources from Thomson, Zack's, Reuters, BigCharts, Briefing.com, and Baseline—are delivered in frames, each with its own menu of options and system of navigation. While there's a lot to choose from, it's a mix of the same free information you can find elsewhere on the Web, with some premium services tossed in. A centralized ticker and lookup page would allow better access to these materials.

Once we started trading, a couple of minutes passed before our stock purchase was confirmed—one of the slowest responses in our survey. We also found the site to be a bit sluggish even during a normal trading day, which made us wonder about its performance on days when the market is hectic.

Suretrade's bare-bones approach means it doesn't stand on

Waterhouse RESEARCH ENGINE

FOR CUSTOMER service, it's hard to beat Waterhouse WebBroker. When you sign up, you get an account officer

who provides personal attention when needed. This privilege costs, though. Waterhouse's \$12 minimum commission jumps to \$45 when you place an order with an account officer.

In other ways Waterhouse has a way to go to catch up with its online brethren, particularly when it comes to opening an account. You can't apply for an account online, and once your account is open, you still have to call to get a password before you can trade on the Web.

We also had problems with the site itself. We often got stuck trying to use the JavaScript drop-down menus, in which you select an item from a drop-down box and the appropriate page loads automatically before you can click on "Go."


When you enter the site's Research section, be sure to type in a ticker symbol in the box at the top of the screen before selecting a report from S&P, Briefing.com, or MarketGuide. If you don't, you'll get an obscure error message. Navigation style also varied by page, from a text menu of choices on the side of the browser window to graphic buttons at the bottom of the page.

Despite the frustrating interface, it was easy to place an order.

The site's stock trading screen stepped us through the process, and the confirmation screen linked us right to the order-status area. Our order to buy was filled within 60 seconds.

Waterhouse's Standard & Poor's Stock Reports were the best research tools we saw. Other sites charge a dollar or two for each report, so having the library for free can save

money. One thing we couldn't find was a copy of the account agreement, and it wasn't for lack of trying. Guess we could have used that pricey personal account officer after all.





CHANCES ARE you'll buy your next PC over the phone, via the Web, through mail order, or even from a value-added reseller who gets a bounty direct from the manufacturer for each unit it sells. Though the players and the hardware remain much the same in this month's Top 20 charts, the way consumers buy computers has changed. Stores without doors are fast becoming the rule, and off-the-shelf systems may soon go the way of the dinosaurs.

DEATH OF A SALESMAN

MORE AND MORE PC vendors are marketing their wares to small and medium-size businesses, which value a low price tag. Selling direct allows companies to offer basic machines at the lowest possible prices, so it's no surprise that all our Top 20 Best Buys this month can be purchased direct.

Dell, Gateway, and Micron have been bypassing the reseller for years. But now they have company: For example, Compaq's new Prosignia Desktop 330 and IBM's PC300GL Small Business Edition (which we'll review in March) target small

Web, who also can select the exact components they want included in their PC.

Still, selling direct isn't exactly a new concept to companies such as Compaq, which have historically relied on channel and retail sales. In fact, Compaq has been quietly selling specific models from different product lines—such as the Armada and Presario series—on its Web site's Direct Plus and At Home sections for five or six years. The Prosignia line, however, represents Compaq's first product line that emphasizes direct sales across the board.

BLUE LIGHT SPECIALS

MOST SYSTEMS on our charts can be purchased direct. That's good news for consumers. In fact, the average power system this month costs just \$2381.

As they make way for PCs with new processors, vendors are pricing their current stock to move. (For more information, see "Your PC in the New Millennium," page 104.)

New technologies, expected to appear in PCs by April or May, could have a big impact on the charts, pushing Pentium II-400 and even Pentium II-450 machines onto the sub-\$2000 budget chart. That's great for folks who want good performance but don't need next season's top-of-the-line processor. Falling PC prices should begin to even more

closely mirror price drops in Intel processors (see "AMD-Powered PCs Get Big Cuts," next page).

BYE-BYE ISA?

DESPITE THE RAPID emergence of new technologies, old technology tends to stick around in PCs longer than you might expect. Many of us own Zip or LS-120 drives, yet we still use floppies regularly. Universal Serial Bus ports come standard in new PCs, but many users continue to connect peripherals via parallel or serial ports.

Last November, Microsoft and Intel introduced their "PC99" spec, which focuses on phasing out ISA slots. But here it is February 1999, and we still see ISA slots in all the PCs on our charts.

But don't expect ISA to vanish overnight. Sim Wong Hoo, chairman and CEO of Creative Labs, says that Creative has no plans to phase out the ISA-based Sound Blaster 16 card, targeted at corporate IT departments: "It's still a very big market because they buy in volume." He also says his company will continue to market the 6-year-old, \$49 product well into this year. In fact, he reports, "We're trying to stretch it into the year 2000."

Certainly PC users haven't abandoned their ISA-based peripherals. For one thing, PCI-based peripherals aren't always better. For example, though PCI modems use much newer technology than their ISA counterparts, they actually exhibited

businesses and can be custom-configured and bought over the Web or telephone.

To compete with computer vendors that sell direct, retail stores have had to change the way they do business. One large chain, CompUSA, sells built-to-order systems not only to in-store customers, but also to customers ordering via the phone or the

more reliable connections in our modem testing. That's because ISA modems normally come with their own built-in controller. (See January's *Top 10 Modems*, www.pcworld.com/jan99/modems, for more details.) In this month's *Top 10 Modems* chart on page 225, we list the top seven internal and top three external V.90 modems—the former based on either ISA or PCI technology. Next month, look for PC Card modems and more internal desktop modems as part of our modem rotation.

MONITOR PRICES: A NEW VISION

PRICES ON BOTH 19- and 21-inch monitors continue to drop. On the 19-inch half of the chart (page 221), only two monitors, Sony's \$699 Multiscan CDP-420GS and ViewSonic's \$699 MB90, are priced above \$600, while 21-inch models range from \$999 to \$1299. The best news: These price cuts don't come at the expense of image quality. The 19-inch Dell UltraScan P990, for instance, delivers bright, rich colors for only \$549.

Intriguing recent features on monitors include short necks and USB ports and hubs. Short-neck monitors can save a bit of space in cramped offices. About a year ago, the first such monitors we saw suffered from fuzziness in the corners of the screen. But Sony's 21-inch Multiscan CDP-520GS short-neck matches the display quality of its full-size peers.

USB monitors are beginning to make inroads into the Top 10 chart. The 19-inch ViewSonic MB90 with integrated speakers has a single upstream port—to handle the decidedly atypical demands of people who want to run two PCs on a single monitor—and four downstream ports for various USB peripherals.


POTENT PORTABLES

AFTER PROTRACTED delays, Accelerated Graphics Port technology has finally arrived in notebooks—including the WinBook XL2, which takes third place on this month's power notebooks chart (page 212). To see if the newly portable technology is worth its weight in pixels, we tested two AGP-equipped laptops against two using the standard PCI bus. While the AGP notebooks ran smoother and faster, their PCI counterparts produced jerky, blocky results. The improvements will cost you: Loaded with faster CPUs, more RAM, and higher-end video processors, AGP notebooks cost about \$500 more than their PCI counterparts.

AMD-Powered PCs Get Big Cuts

AVERAGE PC PRICES sank by about \$100 between October and November of last year. Systems based on AMD's K6-2-350 processor fell the furthest—\$174 on average.

QUESTIONS ABOUT OUR CHARTS? The following section should answer most of them.



How do the charts work? The Top 20 and Top 10 charts are evolving lists of the best PCs, printers, monitors, graphics boards, and modems we've tested. System charts are divided by price. Power desktops cost \$2000 or more; power notebooks cost \$2750 or more. We compare new products with previously reviewed hardware, updating the charts to reflect price cuts as well as other changes.



Where do you get your prices? We estimate street prices based on vendor information and our own research, including surveys of retail outlets. We recheck all prices every month.



What does the overall rating mean? This 100-point scale reflects results from our hands-on evaluations and performance tests. A score in the 90s is exceptional, while one in the 80s is among the best and one in the 70s above average.



What does the PC WorldBench 98 score mean? It's a measure of how fast a PC is in relation to our baseline machine, a Gateway PMMX-200 configured with 32MB of RAM, a 2GB hard drive, and 512KB of secondary cache. A PC that scores 200, for instance, is twice as fast as the baseline system.



Where do the scores for reliability, support quality, and support policies come from? Reliability and support quality scores are based on surveys of *PC World* readers and anonymous support calls made by *PC World* staff. The policies score is based on vendor support policies.



What do all those word scores mean? Word scores for performance and price are based on a product's rating in relation to other products in its category. For instance, we score the performance of Windows NT PCs separately from that of Windows 95 machines. (Based on our PC WorldBench 98 tests, Windows NT machines are faster on average than Win 95 PCs.)

STEEP DISCOUNTS ABOUND on this month's power chart, as five systems drop \$170 or more. Surprisingly enough, Hewlett-Packard makes the biggest cut, slashing \$490 off the price of its corporate Vectra VL Series 8 HE; this Pentium II-450 system replaces the PII-400 edition that made the chart last month. In fact, only three PII-400s remain on the power chart, but they're all especially good values. Two are Best Buys, and one of these, Dell's OptiPlex GX 1400, rises to become the first corporate-centric system to occupy the number one spot. Another managed PC, Gateway's new E-4200 450, also cracks the top five. It's somewhat slow compared to similarly equipped PCs, but it's cheap for its processor class.

This Month's Best Buys

1 DELL OPTIPLEX GX1 400

PRO: Attractively designed corporate system, easy access to interior, excellent monitor

CON: Relatively small hard drive, no AGP slot



Up one notch from last month, the Dell OptiPlex GX1 400 is the new number one Best Buy on our

power chart. This \$2145 corporate-oriented midtower features integrated remote management hardware and an easy-to-access interior, and logs an impressive PC WorldBench 98 score of 244. Dell's high reliability and service scores should clinch a spot for the OptiPlex GX1 400 on any corporate IS manager's shopping list.

The OptiPlex's modular case design allows every part of the system to swivel,

glide, or swing open for easy access. Removing the cover is a snap: Just press a button on the front and flick the case-lock switch at the back, and the cover swings up and out of the way. Expansion cards mounted on a separate chassis slide out as you press a lever—no scraped knuckles here. The power supply pivots upward and provides easy access to RAM slots and the motherboard. Unfortunately,

however, there's no AGP slot, so you won't be able to upgrade the integrated AGP graphics with a higher-end AGP graphics board in the future.

But in general, upgrades shouldn't enter into the picture for some time, thanks to the hardware Dell already includes. The 6.4GB hard disk suffices for most uses, but all the other Best Buys this month come with 10GB. Dell's bundled UltraScan 1000HS monitor, one of the best 17-inch Trinitron displays currently available, delivers excellent image quality.

Dell ships the OptiPlex with the Windows NT 4.0 operating system and covers the machine with a three-year warranty on parts and labor. Telephone support lines operate around the clock.

2 MICRON MILLENNIA 400 MAX

PRO: Fast Windows 95 PII-400, 4X DVD-ROM drive, Zip drive, affordable, good reliability

CON: Mediocre audio and monitor, sparse documentation, lackluster labor warranty



The Micron Millennium 400 Max set the performance standard among Pentium II-400 systems when we first reviewed it in July 1998. Seven months later, its PC WorldBench 98 score of 210 still stands as the highest we've seen for a

Windows 95-based PII-400. At \$2028, it's easy on the wallet, too. The Millennium 400 Max comes



loaded with attractive features, and our readers tell us that Micron's systems are reliable.

nal storage slots. The system comes with floppy, Zip, and DVD-ROM drives; the ports on its back are helpfully color-coded; and the midtower case opens easily to reveal a tidily arranged interior with plenty of open drive bays, card slots, and DIMM sockets.

The Millennia 400 Max's Diamond Fire GL 1000 Pro AGP card delivers snappy graphics, but the 17-inch monitor is less impressive: Images appeared washed out and a bit fuzzy at the edges. The bundled Advent AV390PL speakers and subwoofer are sufficient for common business use, but you have to crank up the volume to get any bass out of the subwoofer. Micron also bundles Microsoft Office 97 Small Business Edition and an x2 56-kbps modem from 3Com.

Beyond information on individual components, documentation is sparse. Micron offers 24-hour phone support and a five-year warranty on CPU and RAM, but the company covers labor for only one year.

3 GATEWAY GP6-450

PRO: Good performance, includes network card and modem, easy setup

CON: No DVD-ROM drive



With a price of \$2314—\$179 lower than last month—and a respectable PC WorldBench 98 score of 213, the GP6-450 balances affordability with solid performance. Ultimately, the GP6-450 is built for business, packing both a 56-kbps modem and an ethernet card that's ready to plug into a cable modem or small business network. It also

ships with a 19-inch monitor—great for really large spreadsheets—but lacks a DVD-ROM drive; our test system included a 13X–32X CD-ROM drive instead.

During the PC World Test Center's 2D tests, the GP6-450 delivered high frame rates, guaranteeing sharp business presentations. The system's Altec Lansing speakers are okay for casual music listening but lack extended bass and treble.

Gateway systems tend to be easy to set up and use, and the GP6-450 is no exception. Color-coded ports make plugging in cables a breeze, and terrific documentation smooths out installation rough spots. The intuitive monitor and multimedia controls include such welcome extras as audio adjustments and programmable application-launching keyboard buttons.

Three open slots ensure trouble-free expandability, and if the 10GB hard drive begins to fill up, you can use one of the three free externally accessible drive bays to add a second hard disk, a Zip drive, or a tape backup unit.

When the system is configured with 64MB of RAM, the tall midtower's roomy interior includes two free memory sockets, though you might want to order yours with 128MB, since doubling the RAM can cost as little as \$100.

Bundled with the GP6-450 are three extremely useful software titles for small-office/home-office use: Microsoft's Bookshelf 98, Expedia Streets 98, and Office

97 Small Business Edition. In our recent reliability and service survey, *PC World* subscribers rated the reliability of Gateway's business PCs highly, but the company earned only fair marks for service, as readers reported long waits for tech support. In our anonymous calls to Gateway's 24-hour line, however, our average wait was between 5 and 10 minutes, and the courteous reps gave good advice.

4 DELL DIMENSION XPS R450

PRO: Impressive performance, extensive features including high-quality 4.8X DVD-ROM drive and MPEG 2 playback

CON: Modem is not V.90 standard



If you're venturing away from the corporate fold, Dell's latest Windows 98 midtower is a terrific

choice. At \$2529 it isn't a pocket-change purchase, but its fast performance, multimedia features, and strong reliability and support make it one of our top picks for power-hungry small or home businesses.

This Dimension sports Intel's 450-MHz Pentium II, and it shows: The R450 loads Microsoft Word and Internet Explorer on the screen almost instantly, chalking up a PC WorldBench 98 score of 212. File junkies and pack rats will benefit from the spacious 10GB hard drive.

Multimedia capability is one of this system's strengths. The DVD video output is as smooth as a baby's forehead, thanks to the XPS R450's effective MPEG 2 playback, substantial 128MB of RAM, and 17-inch Trinitron monitor. Even with half a dozen apps churning away in the ▶

background, playback remained flawless. The included Turtle Beach Montego sound card and Altec Lansing ACS295 speaker-subwoofer combination offer powerful sound with a crystal-clear tone. Just make sure you have enough space under your desk to accommodate the subwoofer, which is approximately the size of a small microwave oven.

Besides price, the only nit we found to pick involves the

system's x2-standard 56-kbps modem. Unlike many of its competitors, Dell has yet to equip its PCs with modems built to the global V.90 standard. In every other respect, though, the Dimension XPS

R450 is a well-built, well-documented system. Dell backs it with a support policy that includes 24-hour telephone support seven days a week, and our readers rate Dell's system reliability as good.

5 GATEWAY E-4200 450

PRO: Comprehensive warranty and support, sharp 19-inch monitor, remote management

CON: A bit slow for a PII-450 PC, difficult-to-access memory.





and a 3Com Fast EtherLink XL network adapter as standard equipment. Toss in a 19-inch monitor, and the \$2399 price is a bargain. As with most corporate PCs, however, a modem costs extra.



Gateway E-4200 450

If you're searching for cutting-edge performance, you had best look elsewhere. This computer's PC WorldBench 98 score of 204 is higher than

most PCs', but low for a Pentium II-450.

Though not as stylish as Gateway's G or GP machines, the E-4200 has a nice overall exterior design and easy-to-find ports on the back of the PC. Gateway's VX900 19-inch monitor, combined with ATI's Rage Pro Turbo graphics adapter, displayed clear text and brilliant images.

A chassis intrusion switch alerts IS of forced break-ins, while thumb screws make the case easy for users to open. Our system included five open drive bays, two free DIMM sockets, and three unused expansion slots—more than enough for most upgrade needs. The only major flaw is the location of the memory sockets, which are buried behind the case's internal power cables.

Gateway offers free 24/7 telephone tech support, and its three-year warranty on parts and labor qualifies as one of the most generous in

the industry. Gateway's marks in our reliability and service survey were only fair, but in answering our anonymous calls, the company's support reps were knowledgeable, courteous, and helpful.

15 QUANTEX QP6/450 SM-4X SE

PRO: Excellent speakers and graphics card, attractive software bundle, 4.8X DVD-ROM drive
CON: Mediocre monitor, confusing reset button

Quantex's QP6/450 SM-4x SE takes an entirely different approach from Gateway's corporate-oriented E-4200 450. As part of Quantex's high-end multimedia line, the QP6/450 SM-4x SE should appeal more to power users running their own businesses. Fast graphics, a 4.8X DVD-ROM drive, great speakers, lots of extras, and a moderate \$2499 price distinguish this Quantex system.

But stylish it's not. The large square chassis has a utilitarian look. It also has one annoying feature: It's difficult to tell at first glance which of the two buttons on the front panel is for power and which is for system reset. Clearly, though, Quantex put its dollars behind such

highly desirable extras as a Zip drive, a V.90 56-kbps modem, and a 4.8X DVD-ROM drive. For multimedia tasks, STB's Velocity 4400 graphics board (powered by NVidia's hot TNT chip) gives you great 2D and 3D graphics, and Altec Lansing's ADA305 Digital PowerCube speaker set delivers terrific sound. The one unimpressive component is the 19-inch Quantex monitor, which displayed somewhat pixelated images.

The software bundled with the system targets personal productivity. In addition to Microsoft's Office 97 Small Business Edition, Quantex

tosses in packages like Softkey Labels Unlimited and Softkey Day Planner.

If you need to upgrade this PC, getting inside the case is relatively easy, and a generous array of four open slots and five open drive bays is available. There's only one open memory socket, but that should not limit most users, since the system comes with 128MB of RAM.

On the other hand, the documentation included with the QP6-450 SM-4x SE is woefully inadequate. It covers the basics but doesn't drill down any specifics about the machine. If you run into trouble, you'll probably end up calling Quantex's toll-free tech support line, which fortunately is open 24 hours every day of the week. Based on our anonymous calls, the quality of support seems to be adequate.

17 COMPAQ PROSIGNIA DESKTOP 330

PRO: Direct-purchase model from Compaq with unusual service options for small-business support, network interface card and modem

CON: Pricy for a direct-purchase system, case requires special tools to open, messy interior
Compaq aims to distinguish itself amid the crowd of direct vendors by offering the Prosignia Desktop 330. But the main reason most people buy direct is price, and the Prosignia, at \$2429, is no bargain for a direct-purchase system. For a mere \$70 more, Quantex's QP6/450 SM-4x SE has many more high-end components.

True to its business focus, the Prosignia Desktop 330 has a basic configuration: a V.90 56-kbps modem, a crisp 17-inch monitor, a network card, and plenty of memory and hard drive space. The Prosignia's PC WorldBench score of 210 is slightly below average for a Pentium II-450 system.

The Prosignia Desktop 330 also comes with a somewhat unusual list of extra-cost small-business support services, such as online backup, secure online document delivery, and assistance in establishing an online storefront.

Our biggest problem with the Prosignia Desktop 330 is its case design. You need to buy a set of specialized Torx screwdrivers just to get inside. Moreover, the sloppily organized power cables, which are situated next to the I/O slots, make adding DIMMs a chore. In our anonymous calls to Compaq's technical support line, we received adequate advice but had to wait on hold 20 minutes each time. ▶



THIS MONTH'S BUDGET SYSTEMS range in price from the bare-bones, 16th-place Unicent Avanta E333 at \$999 to the Micron ClientPro 400, which barely missed winning a Best Buy at \$1999. Price cuts have turned former power-chart contestants like the ClientPro and the NextPC N6-350 into affordable budget machines. But of the budget Best Buys, only the Micro Express MicroFlex-35A comes in at under \$1600, indicating that cheapness alone won't boost a system to the top. The seventh-place CyberMax Enthusiast KII 350 is our top-rated new system this month, thanks to a big 8.4GB hard disk, a DVD-ROM drive, and a low \$1149 price. Slow performance and a poor monitor keep it from rising higher.

This Month's Best Buys

1 GATEWAY E-3200 400

PRO: Well-supported corporate PII-400 system with easy-access interior

CON: Limited expandability, mediocre monitor



Corporate PC buyers looking for a high-quality managed PC for less than \$2000 should seriously con-

sider Gateway's E-3200 400 desktop. For \$1813 you get a network-ready computer that's easy to service and has built-in remote management hardware. Performance isn't the E-3200 400's strongest suit, however. Despite the PC's speedy Pentium II-400 processor and Windows NT 4.0 operating system, it turned in a PC WorldBench 98 score of 224—about 6 percent lower than those of similarly

configured Windows NT-equipped systems, whose scores averaged 234.

But the E-3200 400 compensates for its less-than-thoroughbred gait with smart remote management features and a clever modular design. The motherboard packs DMI 2.0 and Intel LANDesk Client Manager software, which enables IS personnel to monitor the computer remotely. Such

powerful management tools make the E-3200 400 a good fit for small companies that want more control over their fleet of PCs and for large businesses looking to outfit an entire division.

The E-3200 400's design also makes it remarkably easy to service. Normally tedious tasks that involve removing the case cover and exchanging a component (whether system memory or the processor) require very little time and very few tools. You have unimpeded access to the memory and expansion slots, and you can even remove and replace the entire motherboard in less than a minute. Best of all, putting the pieces back together is as straightforward as taking them apart. Color-coded cables for the keyboard, mouse, and monitor make it a cinch to get the system running again.

This Gateway's components, though not state-of-the-art, suffice for general business applications. The motherboard integrates a Crystal PnP sound chip and an ATI 3D Rage Pro AGP graphics chip, but you can install an additional 4MB of video memory if you need it. The 17-inch Gateway EV700 monitor offers unremarkable display quality for images and text. But image adjustments are easy enough: A flywheel control lets you change on-screen settings by turning a knob. The E-3200 400 also comes with a pair of unexceptional Altec Lansing GCS speakers, but multimedia isn't a priority for this PC. If you must have better speakers, you can pay \$30 more for the superior Boston Acoustics BA635 sound system.

The PC is backed by a generous three-year warranty on both parts and labor, and by around-the-clock tech support ▶

every day of the week. In our survey, readers rated the reliability of Gateway's business systems as good; and in responding to our anonymous calls, the company's representatives provided acceptable answers to our questions.

2 MICRO EXPRESS MICROFLEX C400B

PRO: Generous amount of memory, 3X DVD-ROM drive, good technical support policies

CON: Difficult-to-remove cover, mediocre monitor, outdated documentation

 The Micro Express MicroFlex C400B, formerly known as the C400A, jumps from fourth place to second this month. At \$1699, this Pentium II-400 PC is less expensive than many of its similarly configured peers. It

also comes with solid multimedia features, offers good upgrade potential, and carries generous warranty and tech support policies.

The new MicroFlex earned a PC WorldBench score of 204, which is about average for its processor and price class. But it packs 128MB of memory—double what most comparably priced units have—and such multimedia perks as a 3X DVD-ROM drive, S-video, and RCA cables. It also boasts a MIDI port, along with a set of Altec Lansing PowerCube speakers that are backed by a robust subwoofer and powered by a superior Creative Labs Sound Blaster PCI 128 sound card. The 17-inch Impression 7 Plus monitor is easy to adjust, thanks to

straightforward hardware controls and a helpful on-screen menu. In our tests, text and graphics looked sharp, but the corners of the screen tended to be fuzzy.

Upgrading the system is easy. But as with most MicroFlex mid-towers, getting inside means you must remove four screws and then lift off an awkward three-sided cover. Once you've cracked the case, you'll find plenty of room to move around in—and no nasty cable clutter. Unfortunately, putting the cover back on is as inconvenient as taking it off. You get numerous manuals with the system, but the outdated owner's guide, designed for Windows 3.1 users, contains nary a word about Windows 98.

Micro Express backs the MicroFlex C400B with an exceptionally long four-year warranty on both parts and labor and provides free 24-hour telephone technical support every day of the week.

3 MICRO EXPRESS MICROFLEX-35A

PRO: Neat interior, long warranty, good speakers

CON: Case is hard to open

Though it features a great interior design, a good audio subsystem, and a lengthy warranty, Micro Express's MicroFlex-35A couldn't hold its number one position for a second month. Nevertheless, Micro Express's MicroFlex-35A continues to offer the budget-conscious power user high-quality components, impressive performance, and

an extremely attractive \$1199 price.

You would pay approximately \$400 more for a comparably equipped computer powered by a Pentium II-350 processor. But opting for the bargain doesn't mean that you have to sacrifice speed. Inside the MicroFlex-35A's plain beige midtower case lies a 350-MHz K6-2 processor, the fastest yet from AMD. The system's PC WorldBench score of 179 equals that of an average Pentium II-350 system.

Despite its modest price, the MicroFlex-35A doesn't skimp on hardware. The combination of a 7.5GB hard disk, a 56-kbps modem, and a 12X-32X CD-ROM drive make it suitable for most business applications. And if you build

heavy-duty multimedia presentations, the included Diamond Viper V330 graphics card won't disappoint. The Viper series has fared well on our *Top 10 Graphics Boards* chart. The MicroFlex-35A's sound system is also powerful: Creative Labs' standard Sound Blaster PCI 128 audio card surrounds you with sound when it's connected to a four-speaker audio system. The card doesn't quite match Altec Lansing's ACS44 PowerCube speaker setup—two tiny but powerful cubic satellites and a subwoofer half the size of the midtower—but it still delivers great sound.

Though text and graphics images appeared crisp on the 17-inch Impression 7V color monitor, the display ▶

made a poor impression on us: The monitor we reviewed had a bluish cast we couldn't eliminate. The MicroFlex-35A's interior is so neat and well-organized you'd think that a drill sergeant had designed it. If only getting inside were simpler. You have to remove four Phillips-head screws, and then lift off the three-sided steel case. Reseating the cover is even trickier; we had trouble aligning it and sliding it securely back into place.

The MicroFlex-35A comes with numer-

ous helpful manuals, and Micro Express backs its systems with an above-average four-year warranty on parts and labor, including one year of free on-site service. Toll-free phone support is available around the clock. In answers to our anonymous calls, Micro Express's technicians were helpful. They answered our easy-to-intermediate questions accurately and succinctly, but didn't bother to explain the particulars in their responses to our more difficult questions.

4 DELL DIMENSION V333C

PRO: Speed on a par with PII-333 machines, includes Zip drive and 4.8X DVD-ROM drive
CON: Still not a great bargain, even following a \$220 drop in price



Dell's Dimension V333c is a small-business machine with multimedia on its mind. The Celeron-333 processor at the heart of this system helped it achieve a PC WorldBench 98 score of 170, which is competitive with PII-333 systems. But even after Dell pared

\$220 off its price tag, the \$1629 V333C remains more expensive than its Celeron-333-powered peers—probably due to

multimedia extras including a Zip drive and a 4.8X DVD-ROM drive.

Dell's setup and user guides are comprehensive,

and color-coded cables that match the well-labeled ports on the back of the case make initial setup a no-brainer. The warranty on this system is the same as for all Dimensions: Parts are covered for three years, labor for one. Toll-free technical support is available 24 hours every day of the week. In responses to our anonymous tech support calls, representatives answered our questions adequately.

5 DELL DIMENSION XPS R350

PRO: Ties for fastest PII-350 we've tested, DVD-ROM drive, huge hard disk, Trinitron monitor

CON: Pricey, case is difficult to open

Dell's \$1899 Dimension XPS R350 comes with all the goodies you'll find in more expensive peers. And this Pentium II-350 turns in a PC WorldBench score of 188, tying it for first among systems we've tested in its processor class.

The system includes a robust 10GB IBM ATA-33 hard disk, an Iomega Zip drive, and a 4.8X DVD-ROM drive. The stunning 17-inch Trinitron monitor, fast STB Velocity 128zx graphics card, and hardware-based MPEG 2 decoder deliver blazing graphics and video. The software bundle, anchored by Microsoft Office Small Business Edition, is all business.

The XPS R350's midtower case includes a platform base for extra stability, but the side panel is hard to remove. The well-arranged interior includes a fan that blows air directly onto the heat sink.

Dell's helpful documentation includes a foldout setup guide and troubleshooting manuals. Our readers rate Dell's 24-hour toll-free tech support as good. Reps were polite during our anonymous calls, but unwilling to help us without

system identification numbers. Additionally, they gave incorrect advice when we asked difficult questions about FAT32 and updating drivers.

7 CYBERMAX ENTHUSIAST KII 350

PRO: Great set of features for the price

CON: Poor monitor quality

It's astounding how much computer a little over a grand will buy you these days. For just \$1149, CyberMax's Enthusiast KII 350 offers such features as a DVD-ROM drive and a 17-inch monitor along with plenty of expandability and acceptable performance.

The Enthusiast, powered by AMD's K6-2-350 processor, scored 161 on our PC

WorldBench 98 test suite, on a par with systems running on Pentium II-300 CPUs. Its performance is also about average for computers priced under \$1200—so speed shouldn't be your first, or even second, priority if you are considering this machine.

The 17-inch CyberMax monitor bundled with this PC disappointed us. Displayed images lacked crispness, and colors seemed a bit dull. The system's sound quality, on the other hand, was quite pleasing, thanks in part to the Altec Lansing ACS 45.1 speaker and subwoofer combination. If you like to listen to music through your PC while you work, these speakers are a fine choice.

Open drive bays and adapter slots abound inside this midtower. Once we removed the screws and the sturdy casing, we found a spacious interior—and a tangle of wires. But we also found six free drive bays and four open expansion slots.

The Enthusiast ships with

both a quick setup guide and a thorough system manual to get you up and running. CyberMax backs its systems with a warranty of three years on parts and one year on labor. Technical support representatives are available around the clock.

10 MIDWEST MICRO OFFICE PRO 350

PRO: DVD-ROM drive, comprehensive warranty

CON: Undersize keyboard

If you're in the market for a versatile small-business or home-office system, MidWest Micro's newly reconfigured Office Pro 350 may hit the spot. At \$1499, it qualifies as the lowest priced Pentium II-350-powered PC we've seen with a 4.8X DVD-ROM drive, and is a good \$100 less than the average Pentium II-350 system. With a PC WorldBench 98 score of 181 (at the median for its configuration) it

commands excellent performance for the price. Microsoft's Office 97 Small Business Edition is included in the package, enabling you to get up and working quickly.

Whether you display text or graphics, the Office Pro 350 more than holds its own. The 17-inch Clearmax CM-1726 monitor, in association with the ATI Xpert@Play 98 graphics adapter, gives a sharp picture even at 1280 by 1024 resolution. The ATI adapter nicely supports Toshiba's latest-generation 4.8X DVD-ROM drive. Finally, Altec Lansing's ADA 305 Digital PowerCube speakers round out this strong multimedia package.

The easy-to-open midtower case houses four free drive bays, four open expansion slots, and two unused DIMM sockets—all with unobstructed access. In fact, just about the only main thing we disliked about this system was its small, difficult-to-use keyboard.

MidWest Micro provides a longer-than-average parts and labor warranty along with unlimited 24-hour telephone technical support. Our anonymous calls to MidWest Micro's support line were an- ▶

swered by knowledgeable representatives who went the extra mile to help us, making sure we understood their answers to our more difficult questions.

13 NEC DIRECTION SP B350

PRO: Inexpensive, plenty of room for expansion, good support

CON: Slow for its processor class; small hard drive and monitor, limited RAM

NEC's Web site touts the Direction SP B series as "superior performance systems for the power enthusiast." Speed-hungry users should look elsewhere, however. The SP B350's PC WorldBench score of 170 makes it the slowest Pentium II-350 system we've ever encountered; it trails

the average PII-350 by 8 percent.

Performance aside, the Direction SP B350 is a no-frills system

with a relatively low price of \$1299. No frills means a petite 4.3GB hard drive, 32MB of RAM, and a 15-inch monitor. That's downright lilliputian compared to other Pentium II-350 systems we've seen, which typically carry at least a 6.4GB hard drive, 64MB of RAM, and a 17-inch monitor.

The Direction heads the right way on several fronts, though, with three free PCI slots, one free ISA/PCI slot, and a clean, easy-to-access interior. And NEC systems earned an outstanding reliability score in our recent subscriber survey.

15 QUANTEX QP6/400 M-2X

PRO: Generous software bundle, built-in Zip drive, 4.8X DVD-ROM drive, and V.90 56-kbps modem

CON: Somewhat outdated graphics card; insufficient system documentation

You won't mistake Quantex's \$1949 QP6/400 M-2X for an overachiever: Its price, performance, and features are all middling for its class.

Highlights include a built-in Zip drive, a 4.8X DVD-ROM drive, a V.90 56-kbps modem, and an 8.4GB hard disk.

Quantex seems to have used the grab-bag approach in selecting components for this general-use system. For instance, the

Diamond Fire GL 1000 Pro graphics card in our review unit, despite using latest-generation technology, doesn't rate as one of the stronger boards for after-hours gaming. On the other hand, the system offers sound good enough to challenge some stereo systems, and a stack of useful software including Corel's Office Suite 8, Compton's Interactive Encyclopedia, and the American Heritage Talking Dictionary.

Getting inside the system for upgrades proves easy—just turn three thumbscrews and pull. But once you're in, you'll have to push some of the clutter aside to access any of the three free card slots or the one free DIMM socket.

Unfortunately, if you experience any problem with an upgrade, the system manual won't offer much help. The user guide includes lots of information on system tools, viruses, and multimedia, but it doesn't outline the system design or cover basic system setup. Thankfully, Quantex offers toll-free technical support around the clock, and its courteous reps provide good support. All of our anonymous calls were answered in less than 10 minutes. Quantex backs its systems with a three-year parts, one-year labor warranty.

18 ACMA NPOWER 6350 PII-350

PRO: Well-designed for the office; Zip drive; network card and modem; remote management

CON: Pricey for a Pentium II-350; second-rate graphics card and speakers

Most corporate computers on the market come from giant vendors like Compaq, Dell, and IBM. But there are some little-guy exceptions, like Acma. This company's NPower 6350 PII-350 supports DMI 2.0 remote along with a good array of special features. As with most corporate systems, however, you pay a premium for the business-oriented profile. The average Pentium II-350 machine costs \$200 less than the \$1895 NPower.

With a PC WorldBench 98 score of 188, the NPower 6350 PII-350 won't leave many of its users suffering from performance anxiety. Among similarly config-

ured systems running Windows 98, the NPower earns one of the top speeds.

Office-minded extras include both a network interface card and a V.90 56-kbps modem, and, for added storage, a Zip drive (though the system comes with a voluminous 10.1GB hard drive). As is the

case with many business-focused systems, the NPower's perks don't extend to state-of-the-art multimedia components such as a DVD-ROM drive—instead, you get a 13X-32X CD-ROM drive.

The 17-inch monitor displays crisp, rich color, but the Diamond Stealth II G460 graphics card is outmoded. Audio is so-so—you probably won't be happy playing one of Mozart's concertos through the SoundBlaster SBS50 speakers—but it will suffice for the workplace.

There's no need for your IS department to padlock the Acma NPower 6350 PII-350's case—taking the top off requires that two people simultaneously push on two tabs in the lower corners of the case and pull at the chassis. But once inside the machine, you shouldn't have any trouble accessing the two free card slots or two free DIMM sockets. The NPower limits your peripherals, however, by including only one free drive bay. This means that, for example, you can't add both a hard drive and a tape backup unit.

Acma backs its systems with a fairly standard three-year parts, one-year labor warranty and unlimited toll-free technical support around the clock. The quality of support seems to be high; in answering our anonymous calls, the company's technicians provided us with quick, direct, and helpful answers to our intermediate and difficult questions. ▶





It's not the first time a Dell system has enjoyed a long run as a Best Buy, even though the company's notebooks are no more cutting-edge than those from other vendors. High scores in reliability and service—two categories our readers value greatly—help keep Dell on top.

To be sure, we occasionally hear from a reader who's hopping mad about a Dell support fumble. But in our surveys, the latest of which polled more than 6800 *PC World* readers, Dell consistently ranks among the vendors with the largest percentage of satisfied customers. For the Latitude line, the company offers one of the best support packages, including a three-year warranty on parts. Notebooks in Dell's Inspiron line, which also appear regularly on our charts, are backed for three years on labor, too. Only Gateway comes close to matching Dell's record.

On the budget chart we have a new Best Buy, a lightweight Pentium II-266 from Unicent. The only one of nine new note-

books tested this month to earn a spot on our list, the \$1899 Voyager 1212 is an outstanding performer for the price.

AGP GOES PORTABLE

A YEAR AFTER becoming standard equipment in Pentium II desktops, the Accelerated Graphics Port—a bus designed to improve computer graphics—is beginning to appear on some high-end notebooks. Does AGP make a difference? In our informal tests (for details about these, see *PC World Online*, www.pcworld.com/nov98/agpnotes), notebooks equipped with AGP rendered both 2D and AGP-optimized 3D graphics, such as bar and pie charts used in presentations, much more

smoothly than laptops that transferred graphics data through the older PCI bus. Programs launched faster, and 3D graphics lost the jerky, pixelated appearance familiar to users of PCI-based notebooks. But the improvements aren't due to the bus alone: AGP-equipped notebooks usually come packed with lots of video RAM, faster processors, and bigger hard drives. Though many AGP portables are too expensive at the moment to gain widespread acceptance, they'll eventually become the standard. And so will good-looking 3D applications on the go.

But not all advances are as welcome. For example, we're sorry to say good-bye to energy-efficient Pentium MMX mobile chips; they'll be replaced very soon by a new generation of power-hungry Intel CPUs. Intel claims most notebook users are willing to sacrifice battery life for power. What do you think? Frustrated by the few hours you get off a battery charge? This Month's Best Buys

POWER NOTEBOOKS

1 DELL LATITUDE CPi D300XT

PRO: Very fast; excellent keyboard

CON: Modem not included

 Another price drop, this time to a reasonable \$3148, seals this corporate-targeted notebook's place at the top of our power chart for another month. A pleasure to use, the Latitude CPi D300XT earned a PC WorldBench score of 159, placing it among the fastest notebooks we've ever tested.

As with its predecessor, the nearly identical Latitude CPi D266XT, the D300XT's pleasing charcoal-gray case measures 1.75 inches thick (a little thinner than the current notebook standard of 2 inches) and includes one modular bay on the side. Weighing in at 7.4 pounds and offering slightly more

than 3 hours of battery life, the D300XT is more than adequate for work away from the office. You can increase its travel life by buying the optional \$169 second battery and using two batteries at once.

The Latitude CPi D300XT comes with a responsive, accurate touchpad and an excellent keyboard. Its adequate-size keys offer crisp action and occupy the expected positions, so adapting from a desktop keyboard to the D300XT's is a breeze. And you shouldn't have to worry about upgrading the unit's hard drive any time soon: At 6.4GB, it's one of the largest notebook hard drives currently available.

The CPi D300XT's brilliant screen produces a sharp image from edge to edge. We do have one gripe with the casing around the display, though: It's wider at the top of the screen, so when the lid is closed, it protrudes slightly over the edge of the notebook's case. As a result, if the portable should ever fall onto its side, the fragile

screen would absorb much of the shock.

As with most notebooks, the D300XT's built-in stereo speakers yield tinny sound. But MIDI music sounds better thanks to a software wavetable synthesizer.

Though Dell generally earns high service and reliability marks from *PC World* readers, we've sometimes encountered long waits during our anonymous calls to its technical support line.

 Unicent, a direct marketer that made a name for itself with its supercheap desktop systems, now tops our budget notebooks chart with the phenomenally inexpensive Voyager 1212.

We've practically never seen a Pentium II-266 laptop with active-matrix screen and 4GB hard drive selling for less ▶

than two grand. So the \$1899 Voyager is a nice choice for individuals or small businesses on a budget, especially when you consider its long battery life. Just don't expect top-drawer components.

The modestly equipped Voyager's plain, boxy, silver-colored case won't turn many heads. And its convenient but limiting configuration—which includes built-in floppy and CD-ROM drives—prevents you from swapping in a DVD-ROM drive or adding a second battery. On the other hand, the Voyager features an easy-to-remove hard drive: Just press a lever and pull the drive out of the right side of the case. The battery also lifts out easily.

Some of the Voyager's other features clearly indicate that the notebook was designed for travel. The battery lasts 3 hours and 22 minutes, at least 20 minutes longer than most Pentium II-266 notebooks with 12.1-inch screens we've tested. With a case measuring 1.75 inches and a traveling weight of 7.3 pounds, the Voyager is a hair thinner and a feather lighter than a standard notebook. A built-in modem means you don't have to bother with a fragile PC Card connector.

Durability, though, doesn't seem to be one of the Voyager's strengths. The laptop's touchpad and keyboard are comfortable, but the keys felt so loose and springy

we half expected one to pop off. Using the external volume control buttons also gave us pause; we had to press so hard on the strangely designed and fragile-looking buttons located at the top of the keyboard that we feared they'd break.

Like most small vendors, Unicent provides a support package that looks skimpy next to a Dell or Gateway plan. The Voyager's manual, presented successively in four languages, covers little beyond the basics. The company limits technical support hours to 12 hours on weekdays and 7 hours on Saturday. If you don't need wall-to-wall coverage, though, the Voyager offers first-rate speed at a bargain-basement price.

Near Misses

Eight of the notebooks we tested this month failed to make our charts. Three are highlighted below; the other five are listed in the "Beyond the Top 10" box on page 215.

THIS MONTH'S chart missers ranged from a jumbo corporate model from Compaq to a new version of a thin IBM ThinkPad. Of these, a Pentium MMX-233 from Progen came closest to earning a

spot, narrowly missing our budget chart.

Progen's \$1499 Venture M233 reminds us of a pair of sensible shoes: not flashy, but affordable and comfortable. The boxy, black, 8.3-pound notebook comes with

just about everything built in—a floppy drive, a CD-ROM drive, and a 56-kbps modem. The entire notebook, including the firm keyboard and the smooth touchpad, feels well built. At this price, you don't get a big hard drive (just 2GB), but you do

get a spacious 13.3-inch active-matrix screen. The Venture M233 has a middle-of-the-road battery life of about 3 hours and a modest PC WorldBench 98 score of 112, which is nevertheless higher than most similarly configured notebooks.

The notebook's audio features, documentation, and support plan are nothing to write home about—phone calls aren't answered on weekends—but they'll do in a notebook this cheap. If nothing on our budget chart grabs your attention, take a close look at this inexpensive option.

FLEXIBLE FUJITSU

NO OTHER NOTEBOOK—not even one from NEC's trailblazing Versa line—offers as many mix-and-match drive and

battery options as Fujitsu's LifeBook E350. If you can afford these extras, you can configure this attractive 8.2-pound desktop replacement in dozens of ways, depending on your computing needs. Unfortunately, Fujitsu's spotty record on support and notebook reliability prevents us from recommending its portables for now.

We're also not crazy about the LifeBook's ErgoTrac—a big round button that takes the place of a touchpad—because we suspect that some users will find it hard to master. And the E350's mouse buttons are hard plastic slivers that our thumbs missed nearly every time.

On the positive side, we found the E350 easy to type on, once we got used to the slightly rounded wrist rest (which at first gave our hands the sensation of being pushed away). The LifeBook's brightness slider, one of its better features, beats the pants off standard hot-key combinations for screen adjustments. We also loved its LED status indicator. Located at the top of the keyboard, it reports on notebook activities with easy-to-see flashing letters.

The LifeBook accommodates a wide range of devices thanks to the two multi-purpose bays on its front. The left bay accepts the floppy drive; the right bay takes a DVD-ROM drive, LS-120 drive, Zip drive, or second hard drive (all sold at

extra cost). Either bay will hold the CD-ROM drive or a battery, an unusually flexible arrangement. According to Fujitsu, all the options can be hot-swapped and shared across the E series of notebooks.

We haven't tested any similarly configured notebooks, but the E350's PC World-Bench 98 score of 146 is about what we'd expect from a PII-300 equipped with Windows 95 and only 32MB of RAM.

A useful "Getting Started" foldout guide labels parts of the notebook, lists the utilities, and provides tips on how to optimize battery life. The thorough user guide includes a glossary, a big troubleshooting section, and lots of helpful illustrations.

HORSEPOWER IN HAND

YEEE-HAW! AMS Tech's Rodéo 1010CT is a frisky little filly whose long-lived battery will let you ride the range half the day before heading back to the ranch. She's a mite homely, with a gray, boxy finish, and she's not built to take lots of extra accessories. You'll have to scrape by with less documentation and shorter support hours than those big-city companies offer, too—that's why the Rodéo doesn't make our chart. But those are the only burrs under our saddle. For a Pentium II-300 with a DVD-ROM drive and an active-matrix screen, \$2495 is pretty darn good. The

Rodéo's basic design includes fixed DVD-ROM and floppy drives, so you can't swap in other options. The Rodéo's touchpad and keyboard worked just fine, but we noticed that the keys have a loose, springy sound and feel to them, giving us a slight case of the yips about its durability. Screen resolution is limited to 800 by 600, but that's not a problem unless you have a hankerin' for every last millimeter of desktop or spreadsheet.

The Rodéo's stereo speakers, which are located near the notebook's hinges, deliver that sheriff's star sound—slightly tinny. We cottoned to AMS Tech's unique solution for adjusting audio, though. Instead of a dial, three function keys—for turning the sound up, down, and off—make controlling volume from the keyboard as easy as falling off a horse. ■

WHEW! The holiday madness is finally over. We're left with pounds of poultry, dollars of debt, and (for those of us still shopping) more home PC choices than ever. In the past three months we tested 33 home systems ranging from fast, expensive muscle machines to no-frills budget systems. What did we learn from the latest holiday rush? That there's a home PC to match every need.

The PCs we tested this month illustrate our point. Of six new systems, two made the Top 10. Gateway's speedy Pentium II-450 is designed to satisfy the power hungry, while consumers on a budget will welcome an affordable Celeron-333-based system from Quantex that perfectly balances performance and price.

POWER-PACKED PCS

GATEWAY'S NEW G6-450, number four on the power list, is a slightly reconfigured version of the G6-450 that we first tested in December. Costing \$254 less than last month, this \$2489 PC lacks the Philips CDD3610 CD-R/RW drive found on the earlier model—though that drive remains available as a \$225 option—and comes

with less expensive (but still crisp-sounding) Boston Acoustic BA635 speakers. On the other hand, Gateway beefed up other components. The company increased the size of the hard drive from 10GB to 14GB and upgraded the graphics card from an STB Velocity 128 ZX to an STB Velocity 4400, which packs 16MB of RAM. That advance, together with an updated Toshiba DVD-ROM drive, helped the G6-450 post the highest graphics scores we've seen yet.

The new Gateway machine has plenty of room for expansion, with three free PCI slots (plus one shared) and three open external drive bays. It comes with a bonanza of software as well as Gateway's own

HelpSpot, an easy-to-use program for diagnosing PC problems.

The system's top-notch performance and features were slightly offset by Gateway's middling reliability scores, which prevent the PC from earning Best Buy honors on the power chart.

Two powerful, well-built home PCs won those honors this month—Dell's Dimension XPS R450 and Micron's Millennia 450. Their close overall scores are due, in part, to some new tests that help determine a PC's graphics capability. For instance, tests of DVD-ROM drives to gauge a PC's audio and video playback quality now factor into the overall Graphics score.

Though the Dell and the Micron raced to a photo finish, there are differences between the two. The Dimension XPS R450 is slightly less expensive, but it has fewer

features. The Millennia 450 Max, on the other hand, is a gamer's dream machine that comes equipped with loads of goodies like a joystick, a game pad, and lots of cool games. For more details about both the Dell

LOW-COST WINNER

DEBUTING AT number one on the budget chart, Quantex's brand-new QP6/333 M-1c pushes last month's Best Buy, Dell's Dimension V333c, down a notch to second place.

At \$1099, the QP6/333 M-1c is not quite a sub-\$1000 system, but it is the first Celeron-333-based system on our chart

to come close. It's a great choice for anyone who needs real speed and expandability at a good price, plus the backing of a company with good reliability and service ratings.

The 15-inch CTX VL500 monitor included at this price, however, is a little disappointing: Its text display is crisp, but colors in graphics look washed out. In addition, the keys on the keyboard feel somewhat loose and insubstantial (read: cheap). The limited software bundle does include Corel's WordPerfect Suite 8, Internet the City, and Amazon Trail II.

OFF THE CHART

THIS MONTH we also tested one of IBM's latest offerings, the Aptiva E4N. Its high price, slightly disappointing performance, and mediocre service rating kept it from making the budget chart. The E4N, powered by AMD's K6-2-350 processor, posted a PC WorldBench 98 score of 165—closer to Pentium II-333 performance. For \$1498, the E4N carries only a 15-inch monitor, one free expansion slot, and one free drive bay.

You don't get much software, either—just Lotus SmartSuite 97 and a CD with IBM's proprietary system apps. But while demanding buyers may want to pass, buyers seeking a hassle-free system will like the clear documentation and well-marked cables, which help ease setup.

Another newcomer that didn't make the budget chart is Packard Bell's Platinum 7800. At \$1278, it's priced very aggressively for a Pentium II-350 system with a 17-inch monitor. Setup is a snap, thanks to clearly written documentation and the monitor's built-in speakers; and an abun-

dance of easily accessible expansion slots and drive bays should make the task of adding new components every bit as easy. Like all Packard Bell systems, this one comes with loads of troubleshooting and maintenance utilities, such as CyberWarner, CyberCoach, and CyberTrio.

So why didn't the 7800 make the chart? Poor service ratings and performance that's well below average for a Pentium II-350 system hold it back.

COLOR PRINTER PRICES are dropping like stalks of sugar cane before a machete, which means you can find great bargains for your office or home (or plantation), such as our Best Buy

Canon BJC-5000. Despite the reshuffling atop our Top 10 chart, however, price reductions on older printers prevented five pricey new models we tested this month from making the list; only one newcomer, the Tally T8104, earns a spot.

SLASH AND BURN

DO YOU LUST after a color laser printer? You just got lucky. Prices of color laser have gone from about \$8000 to \$3500 in the past two years. Lexmark, for example, now sells its Optra SC 1275 for \$2149. Our favorite color laser back in November—when it cost \$2999—the SC 1275 still impresses us with its speed and versatility.

Ink jets are getting cheaper by the minute, too. Canon knocked \$20 off its wide-format BJC-5000, which assumes top spot on our small-business/home chart. The \$229 BJC-5000 costs less than any other ink jet we've seen that prints large-format pages (a maximum of 11 by 17 inches), and it can run two black or two color cartridges simultaneously, speeding up intensive print jobs. We also like the BJC-5000's text print quality, features, and paper handling.

Canon lopped \$30 off the price of another ink jet, the BJC-4400, which now costs \$149 and has jumped from seventh place to third. A home office bargain, the BJC-4400 handles a wide range of papers, though its print quality could be better.

Epson announced an even steeper price reduction—from \$799 to \$499—on its wide-format Stylus Color 1520. Outmaneuvering several new models with similar network connectivity, paper handling, and performance but with price tags around \$800, the 1520 rises to fourth place. (For details on these older printers, see "All Color, All the Time," December 1998,

www.pcworld.com/dec98/printers.)

Meanwhile, most of the new color printers we looked at this month could use price cuts. We tested three: NEC's SuperScript 4400, Tally's T8104 (built on the same engine), and Lexmark's Optra Color 1200. We also examined three new ink jets: Epson's Stylus Color 740, Lexmark's Optra Color 45, and Xerox's DocuPrint C20. The latter two use the same software.

NEW AND NOTEWORTHY

IF YOU NEED to print 11-by-17-inch pages and want office-level speed, paper capacity, and networkability, the expensive (\$5999) Optra Color 1200 may fill the bill you foot. The 1200 produces sharp text, but it distorted some colors on our tests. It's much faster than the new tabloid-format ink jets, churning out almost 9 text pages per minute compared to the Xerox C20's and Lexmark 45's 2.7 ppm, for example. The 1200 also supports two extra 250-sheet paper trays and an optional hard disk; you can even receive (but not send) faxes by adding a tri-port device. But move the furniture: With all its paper trays extended, this model measures about 4 feet by 2 feet.

NEC's \$3499 SuperScript 4400 fell just shy of the chart despite strong text quality and good speeds. Colors were a bit green, but still remarkably appealing. The Tally T8104 was the only new printer to make

the chart, debuting at number two among corporate color models. It produces clean text and realistic grays and colors, though all prints look a little light. We liked the Tally's print speeds and its low price of \$2429—including ethernet connectivity.

Even as color laser prices lurch toward affordability, new networkable, high-speed ink jets shoot for small businesses. This month we tested two office-minded ink jets, Lexmark's \$899 Optra Color 45 and Xerox's \$799 DocuPrint C20. Both tabloid-format models are costly, and we weren't impressed with their speeds (both printed text at 2.7 ppm and graphics at 0.3 ppm). The two produced readable text and good, albeit somewhat gritty, gray-scale and color graphics. But the software they share needs work: users face nightmarish installation and a confusing driver.

This month's only new ink jet geared toward home users—Epson's Stylus Color 740 was admirably swift for a \$279 unit: 3.3 ppm on text and 1.1 ppm on graphics. A USB port comes standard, and the software bundle includes Adobe PhotoDeluxe and Broderbund's PrintShop PressWriter. But the 740 generated merely adequate text, spotty grays, and middling color.

Absent from our charts after a long run is Hewlett-Packard's DeskJet 722C, an enduring favorite and our December Best Buy for small businesses. We'll test its successor, the DeskJet 882C, as soon as we can get our hands on one.






OF THE FIVE new graphics cards entering the ring this month, two are true heavyweights: STB's Velocity 4400 triumphs over Matrox's Millennium G200 SD on the PCI chart, while the AGP ver-

sion of the Matrox wins over the STB by a split decision. Among the other contenders, Metabyte's Wicked3D Vengeance PCI card lives up to its name with wickedly fast 3D performance, and new boards from Diamond and Creative Labs crack the AGP list. ■







WINDOWS TIPS

Format Floppies on the Fly



FLOPPY DISKS ARE almost universally reviled for being too slow and too small, yet almost everyone depends on them for backing up individual files and sharing data among computers. But formatting floppies is a chore. You have to open Explorer, then navigate to the floppy drive, and choose the Format command from a menu. This is where a batch file can come in handy.

If you just want to format a disk, fire up Notepad and type **format a: /autotest** (type **b:** instead of **a:** if that's the drive you want to use). Save the file to a desired folder as something like **fmt.bat**, making sure to use the three-letter BAT extension. (I keep a separate folder just for batch files.)

But be warned: The **/autotest** switch

tells DOS to format a floppy disk without prompting you for confirmations. If you accidentally execute this batch file on a floppy containing data, use the DOS **Unformat** command to reverse the dire effects. Unfortunately, this rescue technique works only with Windows 3.x and DOS 6.x. If you use Windows 9x, look for

the file 'mirror.com' on your hard disk. You may have to dig out your old DOS floppies and find a file called 'mirror.co_'. Start a DOS window (choose *Start•Programs•MS-DOS Prompt*), and at the C: prompt, type **expand a:\mirror.co_ c:\dos\mirror.com** (your path may differ), and then press **<Enter>**. Now open the **fmt.bat** file in Notepad and add the line **c:\dos\mirror a:** above the format line in Notepad. Mirror takes some space on the floppy, but it'll let you recover data after an unintended format.

Note that this batch file won't work with NT, nor will it allow for quick formatting. To overcome these limitations, change the format line to **format a: /q <c:\windows\cr.txt** (your path may be slightly different).

If you're not using NT, you can include the mirror line as before. Save and close the file. Now right-click an empty area of the folder identified in the command line (here, it's the Windows folder) and choose *New•Text Document*. Name it **cr.txt**. Double-click the new file to open it for editing. Press **<Enter>** twice to insert two carriage returns, then type **N** followed by **<Enter>** again. This will reply to the Format command's prompts. Save the file, and exit.




FIGURE 1: START THE WINDOWS format dialog box from a shortcut containing this command line.

If you prefer to see the normal Windows Format dialog box (Windows 9x and NT only), right-click the *Start* button and click *Open* or *Explore*. Double-click *Programs*, then navigate to the folder from which you'd like to launch the formatter. Right-click an empty area and choose *New•Shortcut*. In the Command Line box, type **rundll32.exe shell32.dll,SHFormatDrive**, taking note of the lowercase/uppercase letters as shown (see **FIGURE 1**). Click *Next* and type a name for your shortcut (like **Floppy Formatter**). Click *Finish*. If you want, you can assign a keyboard shortcut to launch this formatter: Right-click the new icon, select *Properties*, click the *Shortcut* tab, then click in the 'Shortcut key' field and type a letter or number. The system will

automatically add 'Ctrl + Alt +' to what you type, and that key combination will be your keyboard shortcut. Whenever you want to format a floppy, just choose your new command from the Start menu or press its keyboard shortcut.

LOST IN DISK SPACE

FILE MANAGEMENT often requires knowing how much space your files occupy and how much disk space you have left. Here are some quick takes on making assessments:

Files only. Need to take stock of the number of files you have and the space they consume in a folder or drive? You'll need the status bar handy, so if it's not visible, choose *View>Status Bar* (in Explorer) or *Options>Status Bar* (in File Manager). If you're running NT or Windows 9x, make sure no files are selected to get a proper reading. To deselect all files, click an empty area of the folder (see FIGURE 2). Note that the status bar object count includes everything in the folder, including subfolders, but that the size listing does *not* count subfolders.

Files and folders. To get a measure of the files, folders, and subfolders occupying a drive or folder, do the following: In Win-

dows 9x and NT, select the objects, right-click on one, and choose *Properties* (or press <Alt>-<Enter>). (If you care only about how many objects are in your selection, look at the status bar.) In Windows 3.x, display a folder in File Manager, choose *File>Search*, and make sure *.* appears in the Search For box (or change the file spec to analyze only a certain file type). Verify that *Search All Subdirectories* is selected and click OK. Press <Ctrl>-/ to select all files in the Search Results window and choose *File>Properties*, or press <Alt>-<Enter> to see the Properties box that lists the number of files and the space they occupy.

Free space. Often the question isn't how much space your files take up, but rather how much room is left. Open an Explorer window (the two-pane window in Windows 9x and NT) or click the left pane of File Manager. Then, with the status bar visible, deselect all objects as explained earlier. Another option is to select a folder in the tree pane to make the status bar show, among other things, the free space available on that disk or partition.

Graphic reminder. If you run Windows 9x or NT, you can get a pie chart representation of free and used disk space. In My Computer, right-click the icon for the disk you want to examine, and choose *Properties*. With Windows 98 or Internet Explorer 4, make sure *As Web Page* is checked on the View menu, and select a drive (in the right pane if you're using Explorer) to see the pie chart in the preview area.

RELOCATE WALLPAPER FILES

WALLPAPER GRAPHICS are a great way to customize your desktop. Unfortunately, Windows plunks wallpaper files into the Windows folder, amid the million other files located there. In IE 4 and Windows 98, Microsoft has added a folder just for wallpaper files (the Web\Wallpaper folder in your Windows folder). But if you already have your wallpaper files stored elsewhere, or for space reasons would prefer to keep them on another drive, you can designate a different folder for those image and HTML files. Prepare to fudge with the Windows Registry to do it, though. Here's what to do: First, back up the fol-

lowing files in your Windows folder: user.dat, system.dat, user.dao, and system.dao. Next, choose *Start>Run*, type *regedit*, and press <Enter> to launch the Registry Editor. Travel down the folder tree in the left pane until you come to 'HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE\SOFTWARE\Microsoft\Windows\CurrentVersion'. With the CurrentVersion folder selected in the left pane, look in the right pane for an icon labeled 'WallPaperDir'. Double-click it and edit the path in the 'Value data' box to reflect your preferred wallpaper folder. Then click OK and exit the Registry Editor.

To see the effect, just right-click the desktop and choose *Properties*. With ►

the Background tab in front, the list of wallpapers you see should include all wallpaper-compatible files (.bmp, .gif, .jpg, and .html) in the Windows folder and in the folder you designated. And if you click




FIGURE 3: WINDOWS MAY start a wee faster if it doesn't update floppy info each time.

Browse, you'll see the contents of the folder containing the currently selected file in the list. Happy decorating.

SKIP THE FLOPPY BOOT CHECK

98 AT BOOT-UP, Windows 98 checks to see if a floppy drive is present, which adds a few seconds to the process. You can start your system a bit faster by bypassing this drive check.

Right-click *My Computer* and choose *Properties*. Click the *Performance* tab and then click *File System*. In the File System




FIGURE 5: SEE HOW MUCH space you can gain on your hard disk with FAT32.

Properties dialog box, click the *Floppy Disk* tab. Then uncheck *Search for new floppy disk drives each time your computer starts* (see **FIGURE 3**). You may need to press **<F5>** in *My Computer* to refresh the floppy drive listing after each boot.

HIDDEN TREASURES

98 NOT ALL of the new utilities in Win 98 are available on the Start menus. But if you have the Windows 98 upgrade CD, you can install the Windows 98 Resource Kit Sampler, which includes the following little programs of varying usefulness:

ClipTray lets you place frequently used text into the Windows Clipboard, so you can paste it into documents—great for entering boilerplate copy. To select a saved text element, just right-click the *ClipTray* icon in the Windows 9x taskbar tray (see **FIGURE 4**). Put *ClipTray* in your StartUp folder to keep it running every day.

Fat32 Conversion Information estimates how much disk space you'll gain by converting your drive to FAT32 (see **FIGURE 5**).

Link Check Wizard analyzes all your Windows shortcuts and determines which ones no longer point to existing files or applications. Select the ones you want to remove, click *Finish*, and your system is suddenly a little tidier. This tool is a handy little housecleaner, particularly if program uninstalls leave a boneyard of dead shortcuts in your Start button's Program area.


Microsoft File Information may not answer every question you have about your Windows installation, but if you can cope with the geekspeak, it can show you which .cab archive houses which files.

QuickTray lets you add application or file icons to the system tray for one-click launching of your key files or applications.

TextViewer is just what its name implies—a basic way to view the contents of

WINTIME IS YET ANOTHER utility yearning to occupy space in your taskbar's tray area. Its many functions let



you hide windows or make them stay on top, hide buttons on the taskbar, hide the Start button, and even hide its own tray icon (a great way to discourage tampering on demo or classroom PCs). Other options allow you to start the screen saver from a customizable "hot corner," or schedule task reminders. You can display a menu for digging up

buried windows, and for minimizing, maximizing, restoring, or closing applications. Download it for free from PC World Online's FileWorld (www.fileworld.com/magazine).


.htm, .txt, .ini, .inf, .bat, or other text-only files (.html files appear as HTML code, not as they would in a browser). Unfortunately, it suffers from the same file-size limitations as Notepad.

Tweak UI is the indispensable Control Panel icon for customizing the Windows interface, the same one you get if you download the free Microsoft PowerToys from FileWorld (www.fileworld.com/magazine). *Tweak UI* lets you hide desktop icons or erase telltale history lists, prevents "Shortcut to" from being added to all your shortcut names, and replaces tiny icons with large ones (to relieve eyestrain).

WinDiff has an awkward interface, but it's a handy tool for comparing two text files or two directories, highlighting the differences in color. It's great for puzzling through multiple .ini file updates or dueling config.sys files. *WinDiff* even compares Explorer file listings.



How to Run Both NT and Windows 95/98

SWITCHING OPERATING systems is a gut-wrenching decision. Even if the upgrade works, you face a steep learning curve and a litany of hardware and software hassles: NT may spell curtains for games and utilities, and will inactivate nifty Universal Serial Bus devices. The solution: Keep Windows 9x as you move to NT, and choose which OS to run at start-up.

HAPPY TOGETHER

YOU CAN RUN NT alongside Win 9x or even Win 3.x by pointing to a directory other than the existing Windows directory when you install NT. But first decide how you will manage data and applications on your dual-boot system, since each OS works with disk drives in its own way. If you want NT and Win 9x or 3.x to have free access to all files and partitions, you must sacrifice some features. NT's own File System (NTFS) offers password-protected file access and on-the-fly file- and folder-level compression (for selectively saving disk space). Win 98 and OSR2 versions of Win 95 feature the FAT32 file system, which includes efficient file storage and the ability to defragment as needed. Unfortunately, NT won't recognize FAT32 disk partitions, and Win 9x can't make sense of NTFS. (All versions of Win 9x and NT support FAT16, the file system found in the original Win 95 and 3.x.)

So what should you do? You can install NT onto the same disk and partition as

Win 9x, but the partition must be formatted in FAT16. Because FAT16 can only handle partitions that are 2GB or smaller, large hard disks will be split into three or more partitions (which get separate drive letters). Install NT and Win 9x to different partitions, and you can adopt an optimized file system for each OS and use larger partitions.

Dual-booters must also contend with program installation. When you add Windows NT to your PC, you must reinstall all your applications—the NT Registry won't take configuration data from the Windows 9x Registry. To avoid keeping duplicate program files on your hard disk, when you reinstall those apps, direct the setup programs to write files to the application directory that already exists for Win 9x. Remember, format your Win 9x partition using FAT16; otherwise you won't see the existing program directories from NT. See **FIGURE 1** for more on this.

TAILOR YOUR DUAL-BOOT START-UP

IN A DUAL-BOOT setup, your system will boot by default into Win 9x. But before it does, a 30-second delay gives you time to select another OS from a list of installed operating systems. If you want, you can



Assess NT's Performance

WINDOWS NT Performance Monitor provides detailed performance data, but a quicker way to obtain that information is from the Windows NT Task Manager. Right-click the taskbar, select *Task Manager*, and click the *Performance* tab. You will see real-time graphs and data on CPU and memory usage. To track CPU activity without hogging screen space, click *Options•Hide When Minimized*, and minimize the Task Manager window. A small icon in the taskbar tray will now graph CPU usage.

speed up the 30-second delay from the NT System Properties box:

1. Click *Start•Settings•Control Panel*.
2. Open the *Systems* icon.
3. In the System Properties dialog box, click the *Startup/Shutdown* tab.
4. From the Startup drop-down list, select the operating system to which you wish to boot by default.
5. In the 'Show list for' field, enter the time in seconds you want the OS list to appear before the default OS loads. Then click *OK*.

To force the system to wait until you pick an OS, modify the file *boot.ini* in the root directory of your NT partition. Open the file using Notepad or another text editor, and find the line that starts with 'Timeout='. Change the numeric value in this line to -1, which NT interprets as an indefinite amount of time. Note: The 'Show list for' item in the Startup/Shutdown sheet rejects negative values. You must enter it directly into *boot.ini*.







YOUR QUESTIONS ON: Going back to Windows 95 ♦ Saving electricity

Reinstate Windows 95, Ever So Patiently



I'VE BEEN HAVING problems with Window 98 and want to go back to Windows 95. I'd upgraded to FAT32, which my version of Windows 95 doesn't support, so I tried to use a third-party utility to reconvert to FAT16. But now when I try to reinstall Windows 95, a dialog box warns me that if I proceed I could render both operating systems useless. Is there any way I can return to Windows 95 safely?

ONCE YOU convert your system to FAT32, you can't easily go back. (Read more about these file systems in *Windows NT* on page 236.) Here's a step-by-step way to restore Windows 95, but the job is dangerous and difficult—and it may not even work. If you have all your application disks and can back up your data, the best option may be to count your losses, reformat the hard disk, and reinstall everything.

Assuming you want to proceed with the attempted rescue, you first need to back up all your data and key configuration information (including stuff like Internet access settings and passwords). To get started, select *Start•Shutdown•Restart in MS-DOS mode*. Place your Windows 95 CD into its drive, and at the DOS prompt, type **d:setup**, where *d*: is your CD-ROM drive. When asked if you really want to do this—and you'll be asked often—click yes.

GET USED TO THOSE ERRORS

AT THIS POINT, you'll see a dialog box that reads, 'A file being copied is older than the file currently on your computer. It is recommended that you keep your existing file.' Select *No to All*.

The fun really begins when you boot into Windows 95. You'll get a passel of error messages, most complaining about files that can't be found or launched. The first prompts will flash by too quickly to read, but eventually you'll



see a series of 'Cannot find a device file' messages, each offering half a screen of explanatory text and a 'Press any key' prompt. Write down the file names before continuing. After your PC switches from text to graphics mode, you'll get additional error messages. Again, write down the names of the files and the programs that are causing problems.

To fix the first set of errors, you must edit *msdos.sys*. Select *Start•Shut Down•Restart* in MS-DOS Mode, and type the following commands, in sequence, at the prompt:

```
attrib -r -h -s \msdos.sys
start /w notepad c:\msdos.sys
attrib +r +h +s \msdos.sys
```

You can open *msdos.sys* manually by doing the following:

1. Open *My Computer* and select *View•Options*. On the View tab, select *Show all files*, then click *OK*.
2. Right-click *msdos.sys* and select *Properties*. Uncheck *Read-only*, then click *OK*.
3. Select *Start•Run*. Enter the command **notepad c:\msdos.sys** and press **<Enter>**.

No matter how you open *msdos.sys*, go to the end of the file and delete the lines that follow the large block of Xs—these

Convert BMPs to Icons

YOU CAN TURN ANY .bmp file into an icon simply by changing its extension to .ico. Click the bitmap file you want to change, select *File•Rename*, and then replace the .bmp extension with .ico. Press **<Enter>**, and Windows will immediately replace the application icon with a tiny version of the image. Keep in mind that the icon image may look small, but Windows must still deal with the contents of the .bmp file. System performance will suffer if Windows must redraw dozens of these images.


are Windows 98-specific commands that confound Windows 95. Exit Notepad and save the file. Now turn the read-only option on *msdos.sys* back on. Reboot, and make sure that the first set of errors—the group that flashed by too fast for you to read—isn't there anymore.

FIND THE CAUSE

YOU'LL HAVE TO FIX the other errors one at a time. Repeat these steps for each error message to eliminate its cause:

1. Select *Start•Run*, enter the command **regedit**, and press **<Enter>**.
2. Press **<Ctrl>-F**. In the 'Find what' field, enter the file name from the error message—without the extension. For instance, if the error is 'Cannot find file *ntkern.vxd*', enter **ntkern**. Press **<Enter>**.
3. When the search stops, delete the highlighted key or value (a *key* is an entry in the left pane that looks like a folder, and a *value* is found in the right pane and looks like a tiny page). Confirm the deletion, then press **<F3>** to find the next occurrence of the name. Repeat the process until the file is no longer mentioned.
4. When you've removed all mentions of the file, close RegEdit and reboot. That particular error message should no longer appear. If the error persists, you may need to repeat the previous step, because some stray references to that driver may have eluded you during the first attempt.

Further tweaking may be needed. For instance, when I tested this tip, I had to reinstall the driver for my Matrox Mys-

tique video card. Again, no promises, but this recourse is your best hope for restoring Windows 95.

TOO GOOD TO BE TRUE?



I USE A SECOND hard drive to back up my primary one. Since hard disks are so inexpensive, I wonder why this method isn't more prevalent. Is there an inherent weakness in my solution?

BACKING UP A HARD DRIVE to a second hard drive is easy and fast, but not carefree. You can't easily separate an internal hard drive from your computer, the way you can separate tape or other removable media. That means your backed-up data is not protected against power surges, fire, or theft.

I suspect that their hair dryers use more power than the PC. Is there a way to calculate this usage and its cost?

SURE, MINUTE FOR MINUTE, a computer and a monitor use a lot less electricity than a hair dryer, but I sincerely doubt that these students keep their hair dryers humming "24/7."

How much power a computer consumes depends on its processor, components, and design and the amount of time it is actively in use. Not uncommonly, a computer designed to handle 200 watts (exclusive of the monitor) draws about 100 watts when in use and 50 when idle.

The real power hog is the monitor.

A 17-inch monitor that's left on all the time can easily use 160 watts; even a 14-inch model can consume 100. Do the math: At an average cost of 12 cents per kilowatt

hour, a 17-inch monitor that never goes to sleep will cost over \$150 a year to operate. See **FIGURE 1** for details on other peripherals and their juice consumption.

If your daughter must keep her PC on, she should use its power-saving features. Unless her monitor is more than three or four years old, it is almost certainly Energy Star compliant. She can set the power saving options by right-clicking the desktop, selecting *Properties*, and clicking the

Download Lots of Files




FIGURE 2: GETRIGHT LETS YOU schedule overnight file downloads and resumes partial (failed) downloads so you don't have to start over.

IF YOU USE A modem, downloading lots of files off the Web is a pain. With each file you start downloading, surfing speed diminishes; and if you have six or seven files to download, Web browsing comes to a screeching halt. HeadLight Software's GetRight manages downloads and makes them easy. Just click a file in your browser, and GetRight puts it in its database (see **FIGURE 2**). It will automatically dial in to your Internet service provider and download the files while you do something that doesn't require bandwidth—like sleep. As a bonus, this utility will also resume failed downloads so you don't need to wait another hour for that 20MB file to download. GetRight is available on FileWorld.

Screen Saver tab. She'll get options at the bottom of the window to send the monitor to standby mode—where it uses about 20 percent of full power—or to shut it off almost entirely during idle usage.

Your daughter is less likely to have a computer that goes into power-saving mode. Tell her to run the following sequence: From the Windows desktop select *Start•Help*, click the *Index* tab, and type **power**. Double-click *Suspend command, showing or hiding*. In the resulting Help window, click the arrow icon. She'll get either a pop-up box saying that her computer doesn't support power management or a dialog box of options. But today's computers aren't all that energy efficient; most of them still gobble up about 30 watts even when powered down.

Teach Your Old Browser New Navigation Tricks

WHEN YOU CLICK Internet Explorer's Search button, the browser brings up a special search menu in its Explorer Bar—a pane to the left of the browser. What makes using this search bar better than heading to the search site itself? All the search results display in the left pane, so you don't have to keep clicking the Back button to return to the search site. You can toggle the search frame on and off by clicking the Search button.

If you're using Internet Explorer 4, you can configure your browser to rely on almost any search engine. Set this preference on home.microsoft.com/search/lobby/searchsetup.htm. IE 5 makes things easier still, by combining several search engines into a one-stop search tool. With IE 5, the key to effective searching is the Next button in the search bar, which lets you scroll through results from all participating search engines.

It also removes cache files, cookies, and the Recent document list. It works with IE and Navigator. Get it from www.swanksoft.com/historykill or from www.fileworld.com/magazine.

HOME-MADE SPAM FILTER




FIGURE 1: TELL NETSCAPE MESSENGER to discard or file away any incoming message that isn't intended for you personally.

HERE'S A GREAT way to filter out junk e-mail, suggested by Anthony Ferrer via the Internet. Since most spammers send their messages to mailing lists, just set your mail client to reject any message not intended for you personally. In Messenger 4.x, press **<Ctrl>-<Shift>-1** to go to Message Center, and select *Edit•Message Filters*. Name the filter, and then click the down arrow next to all fields in the next line (see **FIGURE 1**) to create an expression that reads "the TO of the message doesn't contain *address@server.com*."

In Eudora (version 3 or higher), select *Tools•Filters* and click next to *Incoming*. Under *Header*, select *To*. Then, in the next line, select *Doesn't Contain*, and type your e-mail address. Under *Action*, select *Transfer*. Click the box to the right of that field and select the mailbox where you want junk mail to be deposited while it awaits future perusal (or deletion).

Outlook Express lacks an option for creating this filter.

ANATOMY OF AN E-MAIL HEADER

WHETHER YOU SEE it or not, every e-mail message you get comes with a digital "paper trail" known as the e-mail header. Some mail administrators (such as your Internet service provider or your IS manager) may trim these before they reach you, but you see them when others forward you mail. E-mail headers tell you where the message came from, what machines it traveled through in its jour-

Alternatively, you can find what you're looking for by typing a keyword into IE's address bar. Internet Explorer treats any two or more words, separated by spaces, as a search query and directs these to a special area on Yahoo devoted to IE searches. If the expression you're looking for consists of a single word, precede it

with a question mark followed by a space, or with the word **find** or **go** followed by a space. ney from the sender's mail server to your own. This information is usually discarded and ignored, but you should look for it when you want to track down the source of an insistent spammer.

To view a message's header in Netscape Messenger, select *View•Headers•All*. In Outlook Express, open the message, select *File•Properties*, and click the *Details* tab. In Eudora simply press the button labeled *Blah Blah* at the top of the message.

Reading message headers is an art, because sophisticated spammers can forge certain elements to obscure their

trail. The image in the center of the page shows an example of a message header sent by a spammer whose e-mail address is supposedly `snodgrass@ditznet.com`.

1 This line identifies the message's supposed author, but anyone can fabricate the "From" information in most Internet mail programs.

2 This section records the path the message took through the network of computers at Bob's ISP FrogHoleNet.Com. The mail server named "Big" received the message and sent it to the mail server named "Little"; then Little sent it to Bob's mailbox. At 3:46 a.m. Greenwich Mean Time (which is 7:46 p.m. PST of the previous day), FrogHoleNet.Com received the message. The ESMTP ID is the message's identification number on the originating mail server.

3 Don't trust the accuracy of the Return-Path data. This bit of information is easy to forge—and spammers know it.

4 Another detour: FrogHoleNet.Com's mail server Big received the message, not from a DitzNet computer, but from a computer called Bigdopa at an ISP called Gomer.Net. If we had blithely proceeded to send a message of complaint to the mail master at DitzNet (`postmaster@ditznet.com`), as popular wisdom recommends, it would have gone to an ISP that probably had nothing to do with

the spammer or the spam. The trick is to focus instead on the numbers that follow a computer's address (in this particular example, `000.67.176.22`); these numbers make up the computer's DNS (domain name server) address, which identifies it to the rest of the Internet. Forward this information to your ISP and request that it block all future messages from that server.

5 The originating mail server assigned this ID number to the e-mail message. This is a final, important clue in ascertaining where a spam originated. Though spammers can forge the From, Return-Path, and Reply-To fields, they can't counterfeit message IDs. Together with the information in the Received field, the data in this line proves conclusively that the message originated at Gomer.Net.

6 This nasty spammer has set up his or her mailing so that any angry replies will get redirected to some poor schlub at MCI.Net. That's why, when you receive a spam, you should refrain from hitting the reply button immediately to dash off a note of outrage.

7 The anonymous To field is the spammer's best friend. It won't help you at all.

AOLians can change the music by replacing any of the six sound files in AOL's main directory—`drop.wav`, `welcome.wav`, `filedone.wav`, `goodbye.wav`, `gotmail.wav`, `im.wav`—with other .wav files. (We'd recommend harp music.) Copy your preferred .wav file to the AOL main directory, and rename it with the file name of the AOL tune you're replacing. Or silence AOL's completely by erasing those files.

Eudora To have Eudora Pro play a tune to herald e-mail from a specific person, create a filter. Select *Tools•Filters*, and check *Incoming*. After *Header:*, select *From:*. After *Contains*, enter the sender's e-mail address. Under *Action*, select *Play Sound*.

To configure Eudora Pro or Lite to play a favorite tune when mail arrives, select *Options* from the Tools menu. Under *Category:*, scroll to and click the *Getting Attention* icon. Place a check beside *Play a Sound*, and click the blank bar beneath it. In the *Select a Sound File* box that appears, browse to your preferred .wav file. Select it and click *Open*. Click *OK*.

Outlook Express Head to Windows' Control Panel (*Start•Settings•Control Panel*). Open the *Sounds* icon. In the *Sounds* tab, under *Events:*, scroll to *New Mail Notification*. Browse to the .wav file you wish to play. Select it and click *Apply*. Next, in OE, select *Tools•Options*. In the *General* tab, place a check beside *Play sound when new messages arrive*. Click *OK*.

Netscape Messenger To set Messenger to play a sound when new messages arrive, select *Start•Programs•Netscape Communicator•Utilities•Netscape Mail Notification*. A mail icon will appear in your system tray. Right-click it and select *Options*. Choose *Play This Sound File*, and click *Browse*. Find the .wav file you'd like Messenger to play, and click *Open*. You must also configure Messenger to play sounds. From the *Edit* menu, select *Preferences*. Head to *Mail & Groups*, and check *Enable sound alert when messages arrive*. Click *OK*.

Create Instant Graphics Shortcuts in Word

WANT TO INSERT an oft-used image into your documents without futzing with menus and dialog boxes? There's an easy way to do it in Word 6.0 and later:

1. Open a new document in Word and select *Insert•Picture*. In the resulting dialog box, choose the image you plan to use frequently. (In Word 97, you must select the image's type from a submenu before you'll see a list of images.) Click *OK* or *Insert* to insert the image into the blank document.

2. Click the picture in the document to select it.




FIGURE 1: HANDY MISNOMER: Word's AutoText lets you create shortcuts to embed images.

3. In Word 6 and Word 95, select *Edit•AutoText*. In the AutoText dialog box, you'll see a preview of the graphic (see **FIGURE 1**). Type an abbreviation, such as **logo1**, in the Name box, and then click *Add*.



In Word 97, select *Insert•Autotext•New*. Type an abbreviation, such as **logo1**, in the Create AutoText dialog box, and click *OK*.

4. To insert the image in another document at any time, type the abbreviation you selected and then press **<F3>**. The image will appear at the cursor location.

PICK YOUR DEFAULT TEMPLATE

USERS WHO NEED to work from a specific template in Word (other than the default one) often use the *File•New* command right after launching Word to start a new document and pick a template. But if you almost always use a particular template, why not make it the default and save yourself a few keystrokes? Here's how to substitute another template for the default *normal.dot* template:

1. Exit all open copies of Word.
2. Use File Manager (in Windows 3.1) or

Explorer (in Windows 9x) to find the version of *normal.dot* that goes with your version of Word. Can't locate it?

Select *Tools•Find•Files or Folders* or use File Manager's *File•Search* command, and search for *normal.dot*.

3. Select *normal.dot* from the choices in the file list; then select *File•Rename* and type **default.dot**. Next, press **<Enter>**. In Explorer, right-click the file and select *Rename*. This step will preserve the original file in case of a mishap.

4. Locate and select the file you want to use as the new default template.

5. Select *File•Rename* and type **normal.dot**.

From now on, Word will automatically load the new *normal.dot* template at launch. Whenever you want to use the plain old template, simply select *File•New* and choose the *default.dot* template that you created earlier.

If you run Word in a networked environment, consult your IS department before making any changes.

SIMPLIFY WORD 97'S INTERFACE

IF YOU'RE LIKE MOST people, there are many Word 97 menu commands and toolbar options you never use. Wouldn't it be convenient if you could strip down Word's baroque interface to suit *your* needs and dump the dross? You can.

1. Exit all open copies of Word.
2. Using *Start•Find*, locate *normal.dot* on your hard disk.



A Quick Format Undo in Word

IF YOU'VE CREATED a large block of text that includes boldface, italics, or underlines, you can eliminate all the special formatting in one quick pass. First, make the entire selected text assume that formatting: Select the block of text, and click the appropriate toolbar buttons for boldfacing, italicizing, or underlining. Then click those same toolbar buttons again to remove the formatting.

To remove *all* formatting from your text and revert to the default style, select the text and press **<Ctrl>-<Shift>-Z**.

3. Select *normal.dot* and then select *File•Rename*. Type **default.dot** and press **<Enter>**. Doing this preserves the original *normal.dot* file so you can revert to the full interface later if you wish.

4. Start Word 97. If you've renamed *normal.dot*, the program will create a fresh version with all its factory defaults.




FIGURE 2: THE CUSTOMIZE dialog box helps you configure your toolbars and menus.

5. Select *Tools•Customize*. Click the *Toolbars* tab (see **FIGURE 2**).

6. Get rid of any unwanted toolbars by removing the check mark from the box to the left of those toolbar names. Mark any toolbars you want visible by clicking the box to the left of those toolbar names so that a check mark appears there.

7. Click the *Commands* tab in the *Customize* dialog box; then click any icons you *never* use, drag them to the document

window, and drop them there. Not sure of an icon's function? Right-click it and read its name in the context menu.

8. Keep the Customize dialog box open as you click each main menu command and examine the submenu commands that appear. If you find a command you *never* use, click and drag it to the document screen. A triangle will appear to the right of menu commands that have submenus. Remove individual submenu items by clicking them and dragging them down, off the toolbar or menu.

9. To activate your changes, click *Close* in the Customize dialog box. **Note:** Any time before you close the Customize dialog box, you can click *Reset* to undo all the changes you've made up to that point. But once you close the dialog box, you can't undo the changes from within Word.

10. If you wish, you can change other default settings from the Options dialog box (select *Tools•Options*) and in the View menu's *Toolbar* item.

11. Exit Word. The next time you run it, you'll see your changes implemented as the new default interface. Your formerly complex program is now tamed and customized to suit your precise needs.

This tip also works well if you want to hide tricky or treacherous features from innocent novices or subordinates in the office. If you need to regain the full Word interface temporarily, select *File•New*; then select the *default.dot* template you created in step 3, and click *OK*. To return to Word's defaults permanently, exit

Word, delete *normal.dot*, and rename *default.dot* back to *normal.dot*.

Hint: If you foul up Word's interface irreparably or if you inherit a PC with a scrambled Word interface, and you need to reinstate Word's original default settings, simply delete *normal.dot* when Word isn't running. The next time you run Word, the program will create a new template that uses the Word default settings. All versions of Word can do this.

REMOVE ITEMS FROM LETTER WIZARD LISTS



I RECENTLY WROTE a business letter in Word 97, using the Letter Wizard for the first time. Under the Other Elements tab, I checked the References Line box and typed in my reference number. Now that number permanently appears in the Reference Line pull-down menu. How can I delete this number?




FIGURE 3: THE LETTER WIZARD in Word 97 is simply a collection of AutoText entries.

THIS IS A FLAW in Letter Wizard. If you type new text in any of the lists that appear under the Other Elements tab, your addition becomes a permanent part of the wizard. Fortunately, you can easily clear unintended entries, which, oddly enough, Word stores as AutoText. To remove an entry, select *Tools•AutoCorrect*, and click the *AutoText* tab (see FIGURE 3). Scroll down the list of AutoText entries until you find the item you unwittingly inserted into the Letter Wizard. Select it, click *Delete*, and then choose *OK*. It'll be gone the next time you use the Letter Wizard.

REPLACE SYMBOLS IN WORDPERFECT 6.1 AND LATER

YOU PROBABLY ALREADY know that WordPerfect permits you to use the *Insert•Symbol* command to "type" special characters (smiley faces, pointing hands, and so on) into documents. But what if you want to replace a symbol with another throughout a document?

Here's a simple way to avoid unnecessary manual input. You can also use this method to replace international charac-




FIGURE 4: REPLACE SYMBOLS or international characters just as you would any text.

ters—say, if you want to replace *rèsumè* with *résumé* (see FIGURE 4).

1. In a document, select the symbol or character you want to change. Select *Edit•Find and Replace*.
2. When the Find and Replace dialog box opens, the selected character will appear in the Find field. Press **<Tab>**.
3. Press **<Ctrl>-W** to open the Symbols or WordPerfect Characters dialog box. Select a different character, and then select *Insert and Close*. This sequence inserts the replacement character in the 'Replace with' field.
4. Select *Replace* or *Replace All*, and you've finished the job.

Hint: You can use the same technique to insert special characters in any WordPerfect dialog box. For example, when you're working in WordPerfect's Styles Editor or QuickCorrect dialog box, just press **<Ctrl>-W**, and you'll get access to the entire set of symbols and characters available in WordPerfect.

Display AutoFilter Criteria in Excel

EXCEL'S AUTOFILTER feature, which you access by selecting *Data•Filter•AutoFilter*, gives you a fast and easy way to view rows that meet certain criteria. It works with a range of cells set up as a database. When AutoFilter is turned on, the row headers display drop-down arrows that let you specify criteria (such as "Age greater than 30"). Rows that don't meet your criteria are hidden—but are redisplayed when you turn off AutoFilter.




FIGURE 1: THIS IS THE VBA code for the FilterCriteria function. Use the function to display AutoFilter criteria.

One problem is that Excel doesn't tell you which criteria are in effect. To overcome this deficiency, Stephen Bullen, a UK-based Excel guru, sent me a custom VBA worksheet function that displays




FIGURE 2: FILTERCRITERIA displays the AutoFilter criteria currently in use (see row 1).




FIGURE 1: THE TEXT-BASED BIOS SETUP (in this example, it's by Phoenix), lets you set a password for ironclad security.

a cell's AutoFilter criteria (see FIGURE 1).

To create this function in Excel 97 or later, press **<Alt>-<F11>** to in-



sert a new module for the active workbook. Then enter the code shown in Figure 1. In Excel 5 or 95, select *Insert•Module* and enter the code in the new module

sheet. Once you've entered the code, you can type in a formula such as `=FilterCriteria(A3)`. The single-cell argument for the FilterCriteria (in this example, A3) can refer to any cell within the column of interest. The formula will return the current AutoFilter criteria (if any) for the column of the cell specified in the FilterCriteria function.

FIGURE 2 shows the FilterCriteria function in action. The cells in row 1 contain formulas that use FilterCriteria. As you can see, the list is currently filtered

to display a table in which column A contains the word *January*, column C contains a code of either *A* or *B*, and column D contains a value greater than 125 (column B is not filtered). The rows that don't match these three criteria are hidden.

RANKING DATA IN EXCEL

EXCEL'S RANK() function returns the ranking of a particular number in a list of numbers. For example, you can use this function to generate a performance ranking of your sales staff or of your students on a test. The Rank() function is certainly useful, but when it yields a tie, the result may not be what you had in mind.




FIGURE 3: DISABLING WRITE TESTING will save time when ScanDisk scans the surface of large hard disks.

FIGURE 3 shows three different ways to rank ties. Use the method most suitable for your needs. Column C displays the

Alternate-Row Shading

ONE WAY TO MAKE your data legible is to apply cell shading to every other row in a range. In Excel 97 or later, select the range and choose *Format•Conditional Formatting*. In the Conditional Formatting dialog box, select *Formula Is* from the drop-down list, and enter this formula: `=MOD(ROW(),2)=0`. Click *Format*, select the *Patterns* tab, and specify a color for the shaded rows. Click *OK* twice and you're done! You'll find that the row shading persists even if you insert or delete rows within the original range.

rankings produced by the Rank() function, column D shows an alternative ranking method in which ties are ignored, and column E shows a method that assigns each tie value the middle rank.

There's no easy way to generate the rankings shown in Columns D and E. But I've developed a custom worksheet function called AltRank() that gives you extra flexibility for handling ties.





Reset Your Forgotten System Password

FACE IT: COMPARED to Windows 9x's security features, the fold-lock top of a cereal box is impenetrable. Almost anyone can get past your log-on password just by hitting <Ctrl>-<Alt>-<Delete> to restart the PC and boot into DOS. Once there, a hacker can delete the PWL files in your Windows directory to disable password protection. For tighter security, you must rely on the CMOS password, which comes into play before Windows loads. CMOS (an acronym standing for *complementary metal oxide semiconductor*) is part of the firmware on your motherboard that holds your BIOS code and settings. Once you have enabled the password option in your CMOS setup program, your system will prompt you for the password at boot-up, before it gets to the operating system.



there's no quick workaround, but the first step is to try to find another password that works. Default passwords—also



known as *backdoors*—can be added by the manufacturer of the BIOS, motherboard, or PC. In some cases, when you initially set up your password, the CMOS setup program may ignore what you have typed and instead activate a default password. In that event, call your PC manufacturer—or if need be, the makers of your motherboard and BIOS—and ask whether a default password exists. Also try these words: **AMI**, **AWARD SW**, **password**, and **cmos**. These passwords are often case sensitive, so you might try using all-capital and all-lowercase variants.

Failing that, many systems permit you to physically reset the CMOS contents from the motherboard. Check your computer's or your motherboard's manual for a jumper that can clear the current CMOS password. If the jumper is there, you can just set it and be back in business.

If your system lacks a password reset, you can still hack your way in by using a motherboard jumper to reset the entire contents of the CMOS program. Of course, this wipes out vital system information, including hard disk settings, power settings, and time and date. So write down your hard

Why Won't My CD Play?

HAVING TROUBLE getting audio CDs to play over your PC's speakers? When you play CDs on a CD-ROM drive, the signals bypass the digital pathways of your PC and travel directly from the CD-ROM drive to the sound card via a small wire and then out to the speakers. This wire can come loose, so make sure it's securely connected. Most CD-ROM drives include a headphone jack and volume knob. Even if your system doesn't have an audio patch wire installed, you can plug your headphones into the drive and listen away.

disk configuration and other key CMOS settings before refreshing the CMOS. Though most CMOS programs auto-detect the hard disk configuration, it won't hurt to have this information handy.

No reset jumper? You can erase the BIOS settings by removing the CMOS battery from the motherboard. The battery is typically a round, metallic unit that rests on the motherboard near the power connector; check your manual to make sure. If the battery is removable, pull it out and keep it out for several hours: It may take a while for the charge to drain out of the CMOS circuitry.

In many motherboards the CMOS battery is soldered down, but don't let that discourage you. If your motherboard has a connector for adding a second battery, you can set a jumper to disable the old battery, wait several hours for the CMOS to drain, and then connect the new battery. If no such connector is present, you'll have to take your PC into the shop to get the

CMOS battery replaced. Don't forget to tell the technician to let the CMOS settings clear before replacing the battery.

HARD DISK DILEMMA



MY SYSTEM HAS been in the same spot on my desk since I bought it new a year ago. But yesterday I ran ScanDisk as part of my weekly maintenance and found a bunch of errors. Do I have bad sectors? How did this happen? Is it old age?

Nancy Bronto, El Paso, Texas

BAD SECTORS CAN be an indication that your hard disk is starting to break down, but that seems improbable here. A year-old hard disk usually isn't a candidate for the scrap heap. More likely, you're looking at residue left behind by Windows.

Windows 95 and Windows 98 maintain frequently used files in quickly accessible RAM rather than on the slower hard disk. That boosts performance, but it also means that key system files aren't safely ensconced on the disk when your system shuts down prematurely—after an application crash or a power outage, say. Be-

monitor the health of their hard disk data. To launch ScanDisk, click *Start•Programs•Accessories•System Tools•ScanDisk*. The program examines your hard disk's file structure and tests the physical surface of the disk for damaged sectors.

ScanDisk commonly reports three types of errors: lost clusters; invalid clusters and lost file fragments; and cross-linked clusters. Of these, lost clusters are the most frequently identified problem. Clusters are chunks of storage space on the hard disk where files are kept. Every file takes up at least one cluster, and the size of the cluster depends on the size of the disk partition and on the file system used. A 1GB drive formatted under FAT16, for example, employs relatively wasteful 32KB clusters (so even a 1KB file consumes 32KB of space). The same drive formatted under FAT32, however, uses clusters that are much smaller—4KB. Files larger than a single cluster are stored in groups of clusters known as *chains*.

ScanDisk's 'lost clusters' error message means that Windows' File Allocation Table has lost track of a cluster and doesn't know where it should go. The program lets you save lost clusters to a file or delete them. In most cases, you should just delete these wayward clusters and move on. Though you can attempt to salvage the lost data, doing so means spending a lot of time rebuilding files with a low-level editing utility like Norton's Diskedit—or turning to an expensive data recovery service.

An 'invalid cluster' or 'lost file fragment' error message indicates that a portion of a file has been separated from the rest of that file. Again, you can choose to delete the fragment or save it to a file if you're desperate.

Finally, the 'cross-linked clusters' message indicates that multiple files are sharing a single cluster. You can untangle cross-linked files by using the applications that created them to resave the affected files. Or you can have ScanDisk create rescue files that contain the original data, writing the results to .chk files in the root

directory of your computer's C: drive.




FIGURE 2: SELECT SCANDISK'S THOROUGH option to test the physical integrity of the hard disk's surface.

Of course, physical damage to the disk is a serious problem. To prevent data loss, your system must recognize and mark damaged disk sectors so Windows won't write data to them. ScanDisk will do this work for you, but only if you instruct it to. Select the *Thorough* test option from the opening ScanDisk screen (see FIGURE 2), and the program will conduct a disk surface scan. Don't be surprised if running this test takes a long time, especially if you have a multiple-gigabyte disk peppered with FAT32's tiny 4KB clusters.

You can speed things up by clicking the Options menu item and checking *Do not perform write-testing* before you start (see FIGURE 3). This option limits testing to data reads only, letting you identify surface flaws while paring down the workload.

If you suspect that a hard disk crash is imminent, test your system area files. If ScanDisk finds errors in these sectors—where the master boot record, as well as other critical disk information, is stored—you have a real problem. The configuration data in these sectors can't be moved elsewhere on the disk, and if the data becomes corrupted, you may lose access to your hard disk. If physical errors turn up here, back up the disk immediately and consider replacing it right away.

cause Windows doesn't have a chance to write those cached files back to disk, you can end up with orphaned file fragments, lost clusters, and other nuisances. The bad sectors ScanDisk encountered may be the result of unexpected shutdowns.

Windows 95 OSR2 and Windows 98 address this problem by running ScanDisk when the PC boots up following a crash. But all Windows users should also run ScanDisk on their own periodically to

Move Up to Windows NT 4.0

IS YOUR PC an essential part of your job? Do you use it for more than Web surfing and occasional word processing? Are you having stability problems with Windows 95 or 98? If the answer to these questions is yes, then it may be

time to consider moving to NT Workstation 4.0, which is a more solid platform. And it looks and works like Windows 9x.

Yes, the next incarnation of NT—Windows 2000—is expected to be available sometime this year, but if you've made up your mind that you need to upgrade, don't wait; go with NT Workstation 4.0 now. With the arrival of the Service Pack 4 update and bug fix, most of NT 4.0's


problems seem to be ironed out. And you'll run into fewer unexplained crashes than with Windows 9x. NT's design also ensures that one buggy application won't crash your entire system, meaning fewer reboots and assured, constant operation.

But naturally, there are caveats. For one, Windows NT Workstation retails in the \$275 range, while Win 98 costs about \$100. Win NT also lacks Plug and Play,

1 Be prepared. Installing NT requires a few more initial steps than when installing 9x. Most peripherals that require drivers include versions for NT 4.0, but chances are the ones you have are old. Your best bet is to download the latest drivers from the manufacturers' Web sites. Make sure you get all the drivers downloaded and copied to floppy disks before you start the upgrade. If any of your peripherals lack NT driver support, you'll have to consider a hardware upgrade (see step 5).


You can find out if your hardware is supported under NT by perusing the interactive Hardware Compatibility List on Microsoft's Web site (www.microsoft.com/hwtest/hcl), as shown below. This list will let you know if your hardware will work under NT and will even point you to the latest Microsoft-certified drivers. If you don't have Internet access, the NT 4.0 installation CD-ROM includes a device list, though it will be somewhat out of date.

Of course, you need to back up all your data and applications. It's also a good idea to test the backup media afterward, to make sure the data you've written is readable.



2 Start the installation. Three floppy disks come with NT. Insert Setup Disk 1 into your floppy drive and start your PC. Be patient as NT loads a bunch of files. Depending on your PC, you may be asked to insert one or both of the other floppies.

Eventually, you'll see the welcome screen. Note the "R" option, which lets you restart the installation if something unexpected happens. Other screens, including the obligatory license agreement, also appear.



3 Choose partition, file system, and directory. When you see a screen that shows the partitions on your PC's hard drives, read the instructions very carefully. The first partition is always highlighted. Don't press D, because that will erase everything on your disk. If you're setting up a dual-boot system, you can press <Enter> to use the existing partition. You can also set up NT on a second partition, in which case you can make use of the NT File System. NTFS will let you gain access to NT-specific features such as on-the-fly file compression and security, but only when you are running NT.

The next screen provides your file system options. By default, the 'Leave the current file system intact (no changes)' choice is highlighted. For dual booting, you'll get best compatibility with this option. If you intend to dual-boot and want to go with the 'Convert the partition to NTFS' option, make sure you install NT into a different partition from Windows 9x. Otherwise, Windows 9x won't run at all. (For more on dual-booting and file system issues, see this month's *Windows NT* column on page 236.)

In general, you should install NT to the default directory \WINNT if you want to dual-boot. Installing to the existing \WINDOWS directory will wipe out your 9x files. Unlike Windows 9x, however, NT doesn't limit you to installing the operating system on your C: drive.

At this point, you'll be prompted to enter an administrator name and password. Write them down—you'll need them to gain access to your NT system. Eventually, you'll be asked to remove the floppy disk and reboot your system.



USB support, and power management features. Finally, NT uses considerably more hardware resources than Windows 9x—older Pentium systems will run noticeably slower under NT than under 9x. Still, a 200-MHz Pentium MMX with 64MB of RAM will run quite nicely, putting NT within reach of many users.

Most 32-bit Windows applications work better under NT than they do under Windows 9x. Exceptions include some system utilities, virus checkers, and gaming software. Check your software for NT compatibility before you forge onward. If you still run DOS apps, stick with Win 9x—it

works better with older, 16-bit software.

For best results, you should install Windows NT “clean,” on a freshly formatted hard disk. If you aren’t ready to give up on 9x entirely, you can install NT so that it runs side-by-side with 9x, under a dual-boot configuration. When your PC starts, you will see a text menu that lets you choose which operating system to run. Be aware that you must also reinstall your applications under NT.

Installing NT is more challenging than installing 9x. Because NT lacks Plug and Play, it won’t automatically recognize and configure devices. You must input device

configurations yourself after the initial setup is complete. And connecting to a network or Internet account requires some technical background. Carefully review the extensive setup information that comes with NT. If you feel overwhelmed, call your local computer dealer or a knowledgeable friend for help.

Below is an overview of the NT Workstation setup. See also this month’s *Windows NT* column on page 236.

4 Follow the setup screens. From this point on, installing NT is similar to installing Windows 9x, although with a few crucial differences. Read each screen carefully—you’ll see a lot of them.

If your NT system will be connected to a network, you’ll need to watch your step. NT Setup can automatically detect your network card and let you choose from a list, or install a driver from a floppy disk (if one came with your network card). In any case, planning is critical. Your network hardware must be configured and working before you can proceed.




You’ll also need to choose and install protocols for networking. TCP/IP is used for the Internet, while NetBEUI is best for connecting to Windows PCs on a local area network (although you can

use TCP/IP for this as well). If you have NetWare servers on your LAN, consider the IPX/SPX protocol. Many other network protocols are available, so review your NT documentation to ensure you have all the information you need to set up your network connection. Work closely


with your system or network administrator, if you have one.

The final steps allow you choose a time zone, create an emergency repair disk (a crucial task), and copy required files. Eventually, you’ll be asked to restart your PC.

Unlike with Windows 9x, you need to press <Ctrl>-<Alt>-<Delete> to log on to NT, and enter the password you chose during setup. Once you’ve logged on to the system, the desktop will look almost identical to Windows 9x.



5 Install drivers. The next step is to install drivers for components such as your graphics card and sound card. Check the documentation that came with your components for NT instructions. If no such instructions exist, you can install most components by selecting *Start•Settings•Control Panel* and then selecting the associated icons, such as Multimedia, Display, or Modem.



6 Install the latest service pack. See if your version of NT 4.0 includes Service Pack 4, with updates and bug fixes needed for a solid system (as shown above, it may have SP3 instead). If it doesn’t, download SP4 from www.microsoft.com/windows/downloads/contents/updates/nt4svc4, and follow the install instructions.

Avoid the Desktop-to-Doorstop Blues

IF YOU SUCCUMB to PC manufacturers' hype, it's easy to believe that computers are less like toasters and more like toast: not durable goods, but perishable commodities. Can this possibly be true?

Seems that way. I bought a new car in 1987. Since then I've replaced two desktop machines, three notebooks, two modems, a printer, and a monitor, not to mention a parallel cable and minor

items I've undoubtedly forgotten. The only pieces of pre-1987 computer equipment I'm still using are a serial cable and a phone cord.

The car still runs fine, and most of the PC equipment from that era probably would too, if I had it today. But the feeble memory, tiny hard disks, and inability to run modern software would make them about as useful as an eight-cylinder car with one spark plug.

Today's cheap computers add a new wrinkle to the calculation. With system prices so low, I'm tempted to simply buy a \$500 PC today and replace it with another one next year. But I probably won't, mostly because Microsoft has made upgrading to a new machine so ugly that I'll do just about anything to avoid it. In the DOS days, you could buy a new system, move your old files to it with LapLink, and get back to work. Now you can spend a day or a lifetime reinstalling your software and moving your files. That's a great incentive to stand pat. So is the certain knowledge that the thoroughbred you buy tomorrow will seem like a candidate for the glue factory in a matter of weeks.

MAKE OBSOLESCENCE OBSOLETE

THOUGH WINDS OF CHANGE constantly fan the computer industry, there are ways to insulate yourself from them—at least for a while. At the risk of sounding like a shill for overpriced PCs, here are my five rules for delaying the agony of upgrading:

Think fast. People rarely complain that they bought a machine that's just too darned powerful. That goes for just about every

aspect of computing: I agonized over buying a 1200-bps modem instead of a 300-bps model—until I got it home and understood the difference. In retrospect, I've made the worst purchases when I've aimed low. Want a 14.4-kbps PC Card modem, cheap? I thought I did.

Think big. No matter how big the memory, the monitor, or the drive, it always seems inconceivable that you can possibly make use of it—until you actually try. People laughed when I bought my first 10MB drive; I rue the hours I've wasted clearing files from my current 2GB unit.

Run it till it drops. Once you buy a new system, ignore new models for at least two years. Upgrades sooner than that are rarely worth it. When I bought my P-90 four years ago, it was state of the art. Today it's a dog, but if I weren't in the business of writing about products that can't run on it, I'd squeeze another year out of it. Obsolescence is in the eye of the beholder.

Know when to quit. The best reason to buy a new machine is to accommodate must-have hardware or software that just won't work with the old one. But there are others. On the road, I could live with the speed of my old 486 laptop. But I couldn't live with the built-in 14.4-kbps modem, the two laptop batteries that held charges inconsistently, or the half-gig hard drive that I sometimes had to remove, slam on a desk, and reinsert. Instead of spending hundreds trying to fix these things, I put that money toward a new PC that's better in every respect.

Avoid notebooks. I know: You have to buy notebooks. I have to buy notebooks. But they're still a bad deal in the long run. Less reliable than desktops, portables are also more expensive and difficult to fix. Because they come with slower CPUs, less memory, and smaller hard drives than desktops, they have shorter useful lives

even when you don't drop them onto concrete. Besides, toting a beat-up old clunker makes a statement about you and your business. If the message you want to convey is frugality, fine. If not, plan to upgrade notebooks about twice as often as desktop units.


But at least you can get a unit with a durable magnesium case. It may not last any longer, but when you replace it, you'll have a doorstop that will be the envy of your friends and colleagues.


